## Hunting, Fishing Fees Increase January 1

A new schedule of Idaho Fish and Game license and tag fees will be in effect January 1 with as much as a \$50 increase for a nonresident trapping license to as little as a dollar on others. Some fees did not change.

The changes, approved by the 1981 legislature, represent the balance of increase requested by the Department of Fish and Game two years ago.

They are expected to raise about \$445,000 in additional funds for the last half of fiscal year 1982 and \$1.5 million in a full year.

Department director Jerry M. Conley has said that the extra money is needed to offset the cost of inflation and maintain services at current levels. Any added services would be limited primarily to conservation enforcement, he said.

The only few hikes to be proposed to the 1982 legislature will be for those who use fish and wildlife principally for commercial purposes. If approved, they would raise about \$12,300 in added funds to help pay costs of administering the licenses and permits, according to the director.

A nonresident hunting license will go to \$75.00 up \$15 from the fee charged in 1981, and nonresident tag fees for elk, bighorn sheep and mountain goat will each be increased by \$25 to \$150.00. The fee for a nonresident trapping license also will be \$150.00.

Other examples of 1982 nonresident tag fees—deer, \$50.50; bear, \$25.50; and turkey, \$12.50. Antelope and mountain lion tags remain at \$50.50.

A nonresident season fishing license will cost \$30.50 instead of \$25.50 and a non resident 7-day license is \$14.50.

The fee for a resident combination license will be \$15.50—a three-dollar increase—and a fishing license goes to \$10.50 from \$8.50. Cost of a resident hunting license however, remains at \$6.50.

Fees for resident deer, bear, and turkey tags are \$6.50 each, a dollar more than in 1981, and resident elk tags will be \$12.50, instead of \$10.50.

Other examples of resident tag fee increases—antelope, \$25.50, and moose, bighorn sheep and mountain goat, each \$60.50. All represent \$10 increases.

## HUNTER EDUCATION PROGRAM RECEIVES "AA55 RATING"

Idaho's hunter education program administered by the Department of Fish and Game has received an AA rating for 1981—the second highest possible.

Mill Williams, hunter education coordinator for the department, said the rating was awarded by the International Association of Fish and Wildlife Agencies which makes an annual evaluation of hunter education programs throughout the nation.

During the 1981 evaluation period, 9,884 students were enrolled in Idaho hunter education courses and 8,781 were certified. The courses are taught by volunteer certified instructors.

Idaho law specifies that all youngsters under 15 years of age must pass an improved hunter education course before they can obtain a license to hunt.

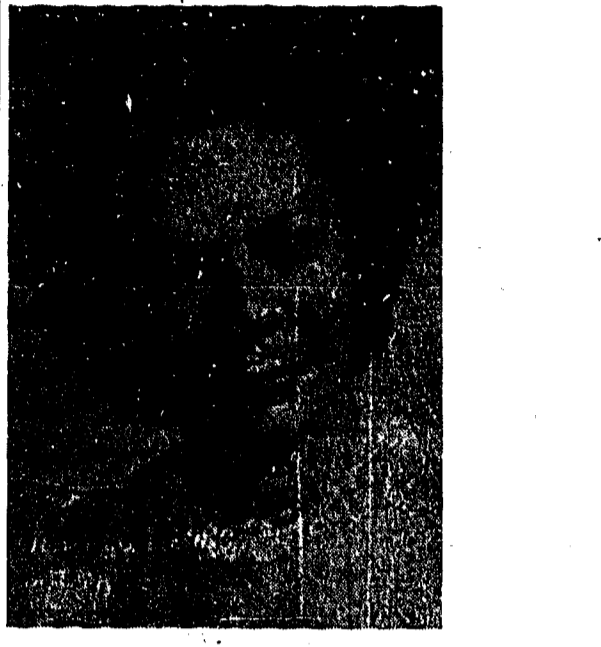

## Bette Deobald, 56, Claimed by Cancer

Elizabeth (Bette) D. Deobald, 56, a long-time Kendrick resident and Latah County native, died of cancer Wednesday, December 16 at 9:00 a. m. at Gritman Memorial Hospital. She had been ill since June.

She was the wife of Charles E. Deobald and the bookkeeper for the Kendrick Garage since 1978. Her husband is an oil distributor and part owner of the garage.



Mrs. Deobald was a former beautician and operated a beauty shop in Kendrick from 1949 until 1951. She was an active member of Baker-Lind Post 3913 Auxiliary of the Veterans of Foreign Wars and a former treasurer. She was auxiliary state president in 1968-69 and served in the national council of the VFW Auxiliary in 1971-72.

She was born May 2, 1925, to Jesse and Muriel Oylear, who farmed in the Lenville area southeast of Moscow. She also lived in Genesee and Troy. The family spent 1938-42 in Libby, Mont., where her father was a car salesman.

She graduated from the Ursuline Academy in Moscow in 1944 and was married in Lewiston, March 6, 1950.

In addition to her husband at the Kendrick home, she is survived by two sons, Dennis of Kendrick and Jed of Portland, Ore.; her mother and a brother, Bud Oylear, both of Harvard, and one granddaughter.

Funeral services were conducted Saturday, December 19 at 1:30 p. m. at Short's Chapel in Moscow, with the Rev. Jim Watson, pastor of the Kendrick United Methodist church, officiating.

ket "selling psychology" may be putting more of a drain in most consumers' pocketbooks than they realize.

"You may think you've exhausted all ways of cutting your food budget, but being aware of the sales techniques used to step up your buying can help you reduce impulse spending."

Swanson says supermarkets are

usually arranged so that shoppers must walk through most of the store to reach the major food items they need—such as meats, fresh fruits, milk, frozen juice and bread.

"Walking every aisle once a week is probably good exercise," she says "but you'll most likely exit with more than what's on your shopping list."

Most parents know that high-profit items such as candy, gum and toys are often placed strategically

at checkout counters so they won't escape the eyes of youngsters.

But few shoppers are aware that "stand-by" items like flour and sugar are stacked near the floor or high on shelves because buyers are willing to stoop or reach for these necessities. Impulse items, on the other hand, are more likely to be at eye level.

Swanson says food and non-food items are often displayed together so that shoppers will buy both. That

means that as you reach for the ice cream, you're likely to see cookies, sauces, dippers and parfait glasses. Scanning baby-food labels, your eye will fall upon children's clothing, toys and medicines.

Swanson says non-food items like soaps, paper goods, magazines and hand lotions now add up to about 23 cents of every dollar spent in food stores. She says supermarkets are making up for their low-profit food lines by carrying an increasing array of health and beauty aids, kitchenware, auto supplies and paints, which have a high mark-up.

Shoppers should also be wary of

mass displays often found at the ends of aisles. Instead of a bargain, they may be regularly priced articles simply displayed in a special way.

Swanson says more multiple pricing has a "remarkable power of suggestion". Sales soar when items are priced two for 56 cents rather than 30 cents each. **Traditional Mistletoe Didn't Come From Idaho**

Most of us, with so many other things hanging over our heads during the holiday season, may not always spot the traditional sprig of mistletoe hanging from the ceiling. But if we could receive the customary kiss or be the mistletoe, it probably wouldn't be from Idaho.

The mistletoe we generally find here is not the variety associated with that tradition, said Don Hamlin, extension forester with the U.S. Cooperative Extension Service. "The one we have here is a dwarf mistletoe and doesn't look at all similar," Hamlin said. The type of mistletoe associated with Christmas holidays is known as the "hoop oak" or hard wood tree, trees that are not commonly found in Idaho. There are more than 500 species of mistletoe.

Mistletoe is a parasite plant that grows on evergreen and deciduous trees or shrubs. It appears white, but from the tree, it has a green growth habit that is very different from the traditional mistletoe.

According to information from the U.S. Library, mistletoe is a parasitic plant, which is not a true plant and does not have roots. It has been used as a charm against evil and as a drug to affect the nervous system.

The Druids, the ancient Celtic religion, used mistletoe for the protection of study and knowledge.

**Idaho Gets 2 Million In Fish, Wildlife Aid**

Idaho will receive about \$2 million in federal share of federal funds for fish and wildlife restoration and habitat improvement.

About \$1.4 million is for wildlife restoration under the Pittman-Robertson (P-R) Act approved by Congress in 1937. Idaho's maximum contribution program is eligible for \$14,000.

Another \$350,000 is allocated for fish restoration from a program created by the Dingell-Johnson (D-J) Act of 1951. The appropriation to the Department of Fish & Game is the larger of two installments to be distributed during the federal fiscal year, which started October 1.

To qualify for the funds, the department matches the amount on a 25-75 basis and department projects involving P-R and D-J money must be approved by the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service.

P-R funds are reduced by an 11 percent excise tax on sporting arms and ammunition and a 10 percent tax on handguns and an 11 percent tax on certain archery equipment.

They go for such approved state programs as acquisition of land suitable for wildlife habitat, management and development of habitat and research.

A 10 percent tax on fishing gear provides D-J funds for approved activities that include development of access sites and facilities for anglers.


