Bad Weather Could Push Hay Prices Up

Moscow—Hay prices could become volatile in the months ahead, rising in the event of severe winter weather and increased demand, Pacific Northwest Agricultural experts predicted.

In the year-end economic report, agricultural economists of the U.I. WSU and Oregon State University said high interest rates have curtailed sales of hay to dairies and feedlots.

"The demand for all hay will be very sensitive to weather conditions this winter since buyers may not have reserve stocks because of high interest charges," the report said.

Total U. S. hay production increased about 8 percent in 1981. In the Pacific Northwest, production was down slightly from 1980.

In Idaho, harvested alfalfa acreage totalled 1.1 million acres, averaging 3.5 tons per acre. Oregon had 410,000 acres with an average yield of 3.5 tons and Washington's 500,000 acres averaged 3.75 tons per acre. The Pacific Northwest still has a large carryover of hay stocks from the 1980 marketing year, the report said.

"In the early months of 1982, top quality dairy hay will be in relatively short supply and feeder hay will be more abundant," the forecast said.

Idaho Farmers Urged to Buy Wheat Seed Early

Idaho wheat farmers are urged to purchase their spring wheat seed as soon as possible, according to Phil Lampert, president of the Idaho State Wheat Growers Association.

Due to the epidemic of stripe and rust in 1981, the demand for rust resistant varieties will be high this spring. Unfortunately, the supply of rust resistant varieties such as Owens, Dirkin, and Twin, is not adequate to fill the projected demand.

Compounding the tight supply problem are several out-of-state firms which are buying large quantities of the remaining seed supply. According to Lampert, "the purchasing of wheat seed by out of state customers is becoming more prevalent each year. This results in less seed available to Idaho growers. To insure a supply of seed for this year and in future years, growers will have to buy their seed early."

It is hoped the chemical Bayleton will be made available in 1982 to help control stripe rust. The Idaho State Wheat Growers Association has petitioned the E. P. A. to grant an emergency use label for the chemical. Bayleton was used on a limited basis in 1981 and it proved to be quite effective in controlling rust if it was applied early.

At this time, no indication has been received from the E. P. A. as to whether or not Bayleton will be available in 1982.

EXERCISE, DIET AND WEIGHT CONTROL

In the quest for the 'ultimate diet' to solve a weight problem, many people try a variety of ways to manipulate their food intake—the kind of food, the amount, or both. Unfortunately, many people forget the other side of the energy balance—exercise. The amount of energy burned up in daily activities and in an exercise program affects weight control as much as, if not more than the amount of food eaten.

Lack of regular exercise may contribute to obesity in two ways: 1) Excess calories are stored as fat rather than burned for energy. 2) At low levels of activity the internal mechanism which regulates appetite operates improperly. In other words, moderate exercise, rather than increase appetite, actually helps control it.

Both eating habits and exercise behaviors need to be changed permanently if weight loss is to be permanent. A sensible diet plan including basic foods and limiting sugar and fat intake can be followed for life. Start slowly, and build up. Don't expect to run five miles the first day, or you'll be too discouraged to continue the next day.

Idaho Wheat Farmers Lose \$45 Million In 3 Weeks

Rumors of wheat embargo to Russia have dropped Idaho wheat prices 54¢ per bushel since December 3, costing Idaho farmers over \$45 million. The latest estimate of wheat stored on Idaho farms and elevators waiting to be sold is at a record 83.5 million bushels.

Rumors of a wheat embargo have depressed wheat prices for several weeks, but an announcement by Secretary of Agriculture Block on Dec. 15 that a new grain embargo probably would be recommended for consideration by President Reagan if the Soviet Union invades Poland, sank prices and the trend is still down. Wheat prices in Portland dropped to \$3.75 per bushel on December 21 which means, after paying transportation, most Idaho farmers would receive less than \$3.00 per bushel. USDA estimates that it costs approximately \$5.30 per bushel to produce wheat.

Phil Lampert, president of the Idaho Wheat Growers Association, is especially unhappy with the farm bill passed by Congress on December 18. He said the loan and target price levels are \$1.00 to \$1.50 per bushel too low to keep farmers in business. All four of Idaho's congressional delegates voted for the weak farm bill which the Wheat Growers opposed.

John Burton, a farmer from Worley and a member of the Idaho Wheat Commission, stated that he was concerned about the financial losses among young farmers. Burton said maybe farmers could make money by selling their losses to profitable corporations under President Reagan's 1981 Economic Recovery Act. He stated that a very conservative Congress passed a very liberal tax credit allowing profitable corporations to purchase tax deductions from unprofitable corporations. Burton said that since profitable corporations are the ones furnishing farmers with their production needs, possibly farmers could interest them in purchasing farmers' losses.

Genesee Energy Survey Conducted

The City of Genesee, with assistance from the North Idaho Energy Extension Service, is evaluating the use of energy in the city. The project is sponsored by the Planning and Zoning Commission and the Division of Energy Resources of the Idaho Department of Water Resources to determine the potential for several conservation and renewable energy measures. The results will help the commission recommend policies to the city council to encourage energy stewardship and development of energy resources in the community.

A major objective is to develop an understanding of energy use in Genesee, with particular attention to structural conservation practices, such as weatherization and the use of and interest in renewable energy resources such as solar and wood heating. Genesee residents are being surveyed to determine how old their residences are and what has been accomplished to reduce their dependency on centralized energy sources, especially electricity and oil.

"At this point the findings are inconclusive, due to a poor return rate of the questionnaire," said Ron Boyans, the chairman of the Planning & Zoning Commission. He added, "This survey will help us determine how the city can assist the public in the effort to save and produce energy. Ultimately, we are trying to protect the economic health of the city. Along the way, of course, we expect to save the city money by reducing our energy costs."

The first step is completing the survey project. Then we will analyze the results and go from there to developing policies. HOLIDAY "HIGHS" WITH ALCOHOL

As millions of Americans sip their egg nog and other alcoholic beverages this holiday season, some feel a little "high." How does alcohol produce the euphoria that so many people enjoy? It may reduce blood in our brains. A new study suggests that even small amounts of alcohol may curtail blood flow to the point that some brain cells do not get enough oxygen to function properly.

Based on our animal experiments, we believe that alcohol makes us euphoric and lightheaded because it constricts blood vessels in the brain, thus reducing blood flow to the point that some neurons are starving for oxygen," reported Burton M. Altura, Ph. D. A professor of physiology at the State University of New York Downstate Medical Center in Brooklyn, Dr. Altura made the report in November (1981) to the 54th Scientific Sessions of the American Heart Association.

Dr. Altura and his wife, Bella T. Altura, Ph. D., associate professor of physiology, used a system incorporating a high-powered microscope and a television camera to look at the reaction to alcohol of tiny blood vessels in the brains of rats. They found that when they increased the dose of alcohol, blood flow in the rat's brain was decreased. Even small doses produced some narrowing of blood vessels.

Feelings of euphoria and lightheadedness when the brain's cells are starving for oxygen were a factor in the deaths of some World War II pilots, Dr. Altura says. "Early in the war, many of the planes did not have pressurized cabins. When some pilots flew above 15,000 feet, they became euphoric and didn't realize they were losing oxygen and their ability to control their bodies. Some blacked out and died in crashes.

"If what we discovered in the rat brain represents what happens in the human brain, then we may have a good explanation for the various stages of alcohol intoxication," Dr. Altura says. As the amount of alcohol consumed increases, the increasing curtailment of blood flow effects more areas of the brain. Thus, the euphoric stage is followed by partial loss of certain abilities (such as the ability to walk a straight line), unconsciousness, coma and—in rare cases—death. "Alcohol can be lethal," he says. "Cutting off the blood supply to the brain cells that regulate breathing can result in death."

The two researchers also have studied blood vessels from other parts of the rat's body. Only high concentrations of alcohol produce narrowing in vessels not from the brain, Dr. Altura reports, adding: "The vessels of the brain appear to be unique in their high degree of sensitivity to low concentrations of alcohol."

THE "AMORUS" VITAMIN E

Throughout history, a seemingly endless array of foods have been touted as aphrodisiacs—substances with "mystical qualities" that were believed to heighten sexual desire and potency. Onions, garlic, sunflower seeds, oysters, caviar (fish eggs—for women, of course) and even bull testes (for men, naturally) are just a few of the foods that, at one time or another, joined the parade of passion potions.

These days, though, it's vitamin E. One might well ask whether vitamin E, can in any way enhance sexuality. Actually, it depends. If we're talking about gobbling megadoses of the stuff as though we'd stumbled upon the secret of eternal virility, the answer is a flat no.

But if we mean getting all the nutrients needed for proper nutrition—including vitamin E—then the answer is "yes." That's because one's sex life is intrinsically related to one's health. And sound nutrition—which means eating foods from the milk, meat, fruits, vegetables and grain groups—is the basis of sound health.

Since your body needs only a minute amount of vitamin E, it's almost impossible to experience a deficiency of this nutrient if you eat a variety of foods. In fact, there has never been a vitamin E deficiency observed in adults in the U. S. (the exception being among persons whose intestines cannot properly absorb nutrients).

Still, vitamin E plays several significant roles in your health. As with all vitamins, it functions in your enzyme system. It also protects various nutrients as they travel through your bloodstream toward the cells where they're needed. Additionally, vitamin E keeps the walls of your red blood cells strong and durable.

Like vitamins A and D, vitamin E is fat soluble. That is, it's stored in your body's fatty tissue until used. But unlike vitamins A and D, vitamin E doesn't reveal a deadly toxic nature if taken in megadoses. Of course, megadoses of E aren't completely free of side effects—nausea, dizziness and blurred vision among them.

You don't need to pop pills to get the vitamin E you require. Just eat a variety of foods and you'll get enough. Good sources are wheat germ, egg yolks, liver, cooking oils and green leafy vegetables.

EXPORTS TAKE BIG BITE OF FRESH FRUIT SHIPMENTS

Moscow—Foreign markets have become important to Pacific Northwest orchardists, agricultural college faculty members of the UI, WSU, and Oregon State University said in an economic report.

In Washington state, almost 25 percent of 1980 fresh apple shipments was exported. Nationally, fresh apple exports have increased 150 percent and fresh pear exports have risen 47 percent over the last five seasons," the report said.

"Continued strength in the export market will depend on continued growth in incomes in the importing countries, their balance of payments position and the strength of the U. S. dollar," the report said.

Use Nutrition Labels To Your Advantage

Most nutrition information labels probably get read at the breakfast table on days the newspaper doesn't arrive—days when the side of the cereal box becomes the most convenient source of literature. It's wiser, however, to read these

labels before you make your food purchases. That way, you can be sure you and your family are getting all the nutrients you need. Furthermore, you can compare labels and buy the foods that give you the most nutrients for your money.

Under U. S. Food and Drug Administration regulations, the following foods are required to reveal complete nutrition information on their labels:

• Foods that contain added nutrients ("enriched" or "fortified")

• Foods advertised or packaged with specific nutrition claims, such as "twice as much vitamin C" or "half the fat"

• Foods for special dietary use

Of course, not all foods fall into one of these categories. But some producers voluntarily put nutrition information labels on their foods just the same.

Nutrition labels tell you how many calories and how much (measured in grams) protein, carbohydrate and fat are in a single serving of the food item.

They also tell you how much of the U. S. Recommended Daily Allowance you're getting for protein and the following essential vitamins: Vitamin A; Vitamin C; thiamine; riboflavin; niacin; calcium; iron.

Other specific vitamins and minerals are listed on nutrition labels if a serving of the food contains at least two percent of the U. S. RDA for these nutrients.



come." Santa Claus prepares a similar budget every year, said Turner. He makes a list of the people to give gifts to and the price he can afford to spend for each one. He often will make a gift himself or have one of his elves make one.

"Gifts that you make will be appreciated for their attractiveness, and you will be appreciated for the cleverness and skill you put into making them," said Turner.

Many people sew or bake items, said Turner. Others may not be able to do that, but they will construct a sidewalk, a fence or even a bookcase. Some people may plant a tree or clothesline as a gift, or perform a task that another person might enjoy doing himself as much as most people enjoy eating Spam for Christmas dinner.

Families frequently are able to keep to their planned gift lists, but then fall victim to impulse purchases or the arrival of guests, said Turner. "It's fine to purchase something on impulse now and then," she said, noting that an occasional impulse purchase adds a little fun to shopping trips. "However, impulse buying shouldn't be allowed to bend your budget out of shape."

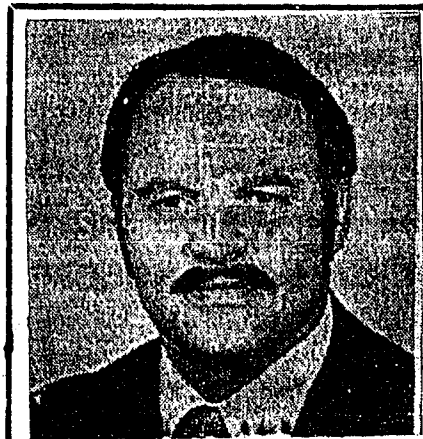
The holiday budget also doesn't have to be knocked out of shape by the arrival of visitors.

"Cavier and tickets to special events may impress the guests, but it will make an impressive addition to your later bills," said Turner. "Your visitors may feel more comfortable if they are involved in helping with the responsibilities of the host family, even helping wash the dishes."

Visiting families may also want to prevent a drain on their host's income by contributing to the food cost or recreational expenses," she added.

After the last visitors have left,

the Christmas tree has been hauled out to the curb and the last Christmas cookie eaten, it's a good time to start planning for the 1982 holiday season, said Turner. Not only will it keep you from slipping into the post-holiday blues, but it's a way to ensure that you'll wake up on New Year's Day 1983 without a financial headache.
