Winter Weather Still Plagues Area

Winter weather and all the discomforts it can bring still plagued the Kendrick-Juliaetta and Genesee areas this past week. More snow, high winds and sub-zero temperatures were all part of the picture for the past seven days. Schools remained open in Kendrick and Juliaetta, but snow and high winds forced closure of the Genesee school.

The coldest day of this year, or for the past several years, was recorded last Wednesday, January 6, when Genesee residents woke up that morning to find the mercury had skidded down to minus 20 degrees during the night. Kendrick and Juliaetta recorded 11 or 12 below zero that same morning. The sub-zero weather caused the usual rash of frozen water pipes and stalled cars and trucks.

More snow fell Thursday and Friday and while it was calm in the valley, the winds gusted up to 35 miles per hour on the hills, drifting many of the country roads closed. For a brief period Friday, county road crews just practically gave up in their efforts to keep some of the rural roads passable, as the winds were putting the snow back on the highway as fast as the plows cleared them.

Temperatures moved back up into the twenties and low thirties over the weekend but Sunday night more snow fell and continued on into Monday morning. The snow forced another closure of the already plagued

Genesee school, but Kendrick and Juliaetta ridges did not get the high wind that swept over the Genesee area and school buses made it over the routes.

Tuesday evening, Dick Flodin, foreman of the South Latah Highway District reported that all the country roads in the Genesee area were open. There were a few of the roads his crews were able to open to just one-way traffic for the present time. Fred Arnett, who handles most of the road work of the district in the Kendrick area said all the roads from Kendrick east had been opened. During periods of bad weather such as this, Rick Arnett is employed by the district to work with his father. Up in the Genesee area, Bob Bumgarner is employed in the same capacity.

Following the big snow and wind storm of last Thursday and Friday, Arnett reported drifts of nearly five feet in one section of American Ridge and the district patrol needed the help of a tractor to buck it open.

Long hours have been a regular way of life for the South Latah Highway crew for the past two weeks. Flodin said Tuesday evening that the men have been putting in from 11 to 18 hour days in their battle to keep the roads passable. Dick had an emergency call one night last week and ended up putting in a 21-hour day.

Further Snow Problems May Develop In Idaho

Moscow — While last weekend's heavy snowfall has already created a year's worth of trouble for some Idaho residents, a University of Idaho agricultural engineer says the snow could raise even more problems later, especially if it rains.

Many parts of the Palouse region of northern Idaho received more than 18 inches of snow in less than three days while other areas of the state also received unusually large amounts of snow. The UI Plant Sciences Farm near Moscow received 19 inches of snow that contained .85 inch of water.

"This is pretty light stuff," says

Dr. Myron P. Molnau, a professor of agricultural engineering and state climatologist. "As a general rule of thumb, weather forecasters expect 10 inches of snow to produce one inch of water. The colder it gets the lighter the snow. This snow had only half of that." The temperature ranged from 3 degrees to 20 degrees during the snowfall.

The snow, nevertheless, has a tremendous potential of absorbing additional water which, if let loose all at once, could create serious erosion and flooding problems, says Molnau.

For example, take a foot of snow on the ground that contains about one inch of water. As the temperature approaches freezing, a rain-storm arrives. The snow absorbs the rain, not allowing it to run off and be gradually absorbed by the soil.

"That foot of snow is going to hold the water until there are 4 or 5 inches of water in it," says Molnau. If you squeeze a snowball and water drips out, the snow is probably saturated and any additional rain will simply run off.

Once the temperature rises above freezing the water will be rapidly released, perhaps too quickly for the soil to absorb it, particularly if the soil is already saturated.

The water-logged snow will also create excessive loads on some improperly-constructed buildings, the engineering professor adds. A foot of water-logged snow will weigh close to 30 pounds per square foot while most buildings in Moscow are designed for 35 to 40 pounds per square foot.

Molnau states the ideal way for the snow to melt would be to have the temperatures in the 30s during the daytime and in the mid-to-low 20s at night—with no rain.

More of the water can be absorbed into the soil this way and farmers will be able to better utilize it, Molnau adds.

Some of the water in the snow may already be disappearing even if temperatures are below freezing. According to Molnau, the water in the snow will change directly from solid ice into a gaseous state, not going through the usual liquid stage.

This process is called sublimation, says Molnau. The reverse process creates the frost people find on their windows and trees.

Molnau said scientists aren't quite sure how much sublimation takes place. The climatologist is setting up an experiment to measure the sublimation that takes place immediately above the snow surface.

He had planned to conduct the experiment last winter, but the region failed to get enough snowfall. This winter, Molnau, like thousands of other Idaho residents, has plenty of snow to work with.

Genesee Rural Mail Deliveries Running Late

"We would like Genesee postal patrons to know that with the prevailing weather conditions every effort is being made by the mail carriers to deliver the mail," Postmistress Leslie Wilson said Tuesday morning. Mail carriers have been running 2 to 3 hours later than usual but are still delivering. A reminder to all patrons on the rural route to keep mail boxes shoveled free for access to the boxes.

Jay Nelson Re-elected Chairman of Latah County Board of Commissioners

Jay Nelson, a Genesee farmer, was re-elected chairman of the Latah County Commission Monday. Nelson has been commission chairman for the past year, and was again selected by the other two commissioners, Wilmer Cox and Laverne Nelson. Jay has been on the board for the past three years.

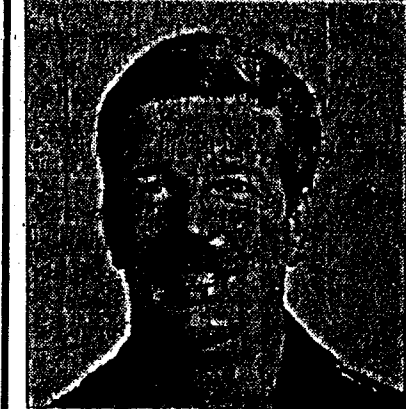
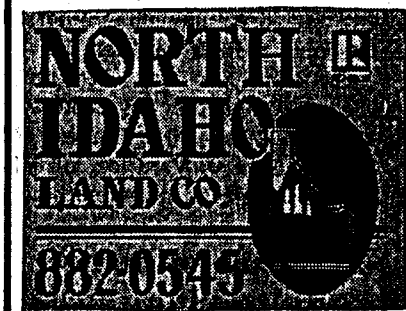

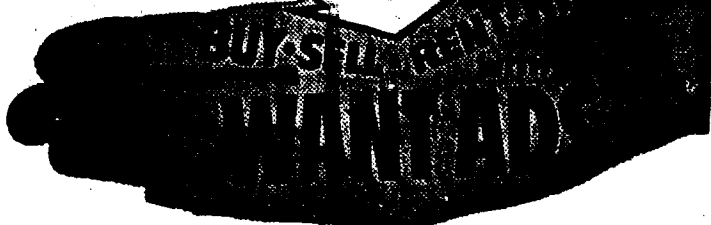
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Winter Driving - Not So Bad When You're Prepared

Outdoor winter enthusiasts should be in the element with snow in practically every section of Idaho and the surrounding states. For drivers it's another story unless you are prepared for winter and then cold-weather motoring really isn't so terrible.

The Idaho Division of Highways has over 640 maintenance men working out of 74 maintenance stations located strategically throughout Idaho. The crews are normally out on the road at 4:00 a. m. during the winter months removing snow, sanding and salting the more dangerous sections of the 5,000-mile state highway system so that travelers can arrive at their destination safely.

Tips for Driving

The most prevalent condition on Idaho highways during the winter will be packed snow and icy conditions. Motorists should expect this and be prepared to drive on them. Because of the varying elevations throughout Idaho more severe icing conditions occur in mountainous terrain and in shaded canyon areas.

Slow down when driving in bad weather and increase your following distance - it takes three to nine times as far to stop on snow and ice as on dry pavement.

Go easy on the gas pedal when driving on slick roads - quick acceleration may cause the wheels to spin.

When using the brakes, pump them gently, don't jam them on - abrupt braking can cause skidding. An intermittent pumping action keeps the wheels rolling and helps maintain steering control. Don't brake in the middle of a curve - brake only when traveling in a straight line.

Plan your trips before you go. Perform several errands each trip. And try to travel when the traffic is light.

For vehicles not equipped with front-wheel drive: If you are in skid take your foot off the gas - let the engine slow you down - never jam on your brakes, and be sure to turn the steering wheel in the direction you are skidding.

Again - for vehicles without front-wheel drive, shifting to a lower gear before you reach the top of a hill will slow the vehicle and reduce the need to apply the brakes while descending the hill.

Front-Wheel Drive Vehicles
The biggest handling plus for front-wheel drive is the improved traction resulting from the weight concentration over the front wheels. The front-wheel drive will often pull your car through mud and snow that would stop a full-size car. If you do use snow tires, remember they go on the front wheels.

Shifting to lower gear when coming down a hill with a front-wheel drive vehicle is not recommended because it could cause a spin-out and possible loss of control of the vehicle.

If you find yourself in a skid in a front-wheel drive vehicle, push gently on the accelerator to apply power to the front wheels. This should pull you out of the skid.

Call before Traveling

As a public service, the Idaho Transportation Department provides

a winter road condition report which includes the major roads on the state highway system. Information gathered from the maintenance personnel in the field and updated three times daily. For statewide reports, travelers may call Boise (208) 336-6600 and for southwestern Idaho reports (208) 376-8028.



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

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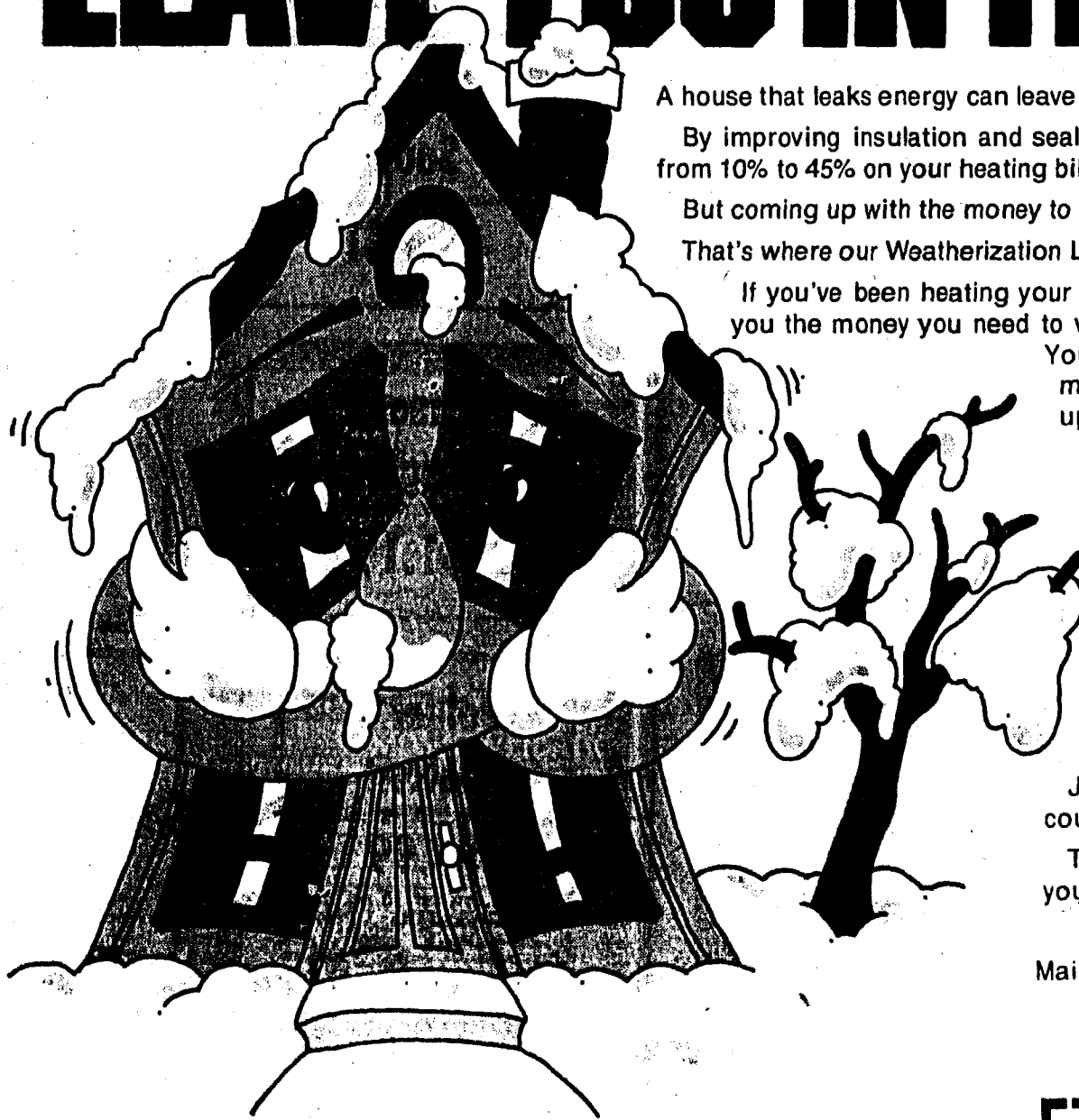
