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Recession Continues To Deepen In Idaho Residential Construction

The recession in Idaho's residential construction industry deepened in January said James Hoogland, Jr. and Roselle Robinson, managers, quoting the Idaho Construction Report, a publication of First Security Bank of Idaho, N. A. The report, edited by Dr. Kelly K. Matthews,

vice president and economist for First Security Corporation, will be distributed this week.

There was a bright spot in the report, however. In Boise, \$13½ million in nonresidential permith were issued in January, most of which was for a new office building. Of the 54 reporting locations, 37 did not issue a single dwelling unit in January.

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Bean Prices to Depend on Mexico's Import Needs

Moscow—Pacific Northwest growers are wondering how successful Mexico will be in its current effort to produce annually 1.1 million tons of dry beans.

If Mexico's harvest next spring is short of the projected goal prices for U. S. beans will be strengthened. Conversely, success of the Mexican self-sufficiency program would reduce export demand and would be likely to have a depressing effect on bean prices.

Mexico's needs will be a key influence shaping U. S. bean prices in 1982, according to an economic report issued jointly by the University of Idaho, Washington State University and Oregon State University.

"U. S. domestic use has been stable and would not absorb the potential oversupply of dry beans," said the agricultural economists who prepared the report.

"More imports by Mexico this spring could keep bean prices in the \$22 to \$26 range. A reduction in imports by Mexico would pressure prices per hundredweight into the mid to high teens", they said.

President Reagan Proclaims "Year of the Bald Eagle"

This is the Bicentennial Year of the American Bald Eagle, as proclaimed by President Reagan.

June 20 has been designated by the president as National Bald Eagle Day, commemorating the 200th anniversary of the day when the Continental Congress adopted the majestic bird as the central figure in the Great Seal of the United States.

The action follows a campaign by the National Wildlife Federation to get official recognition of the bald eagle's role in history.

The bald eagle is classified as endangered in most of the "lower 48" states and the federation says the observance is meant to call attention to the plight of all endangered species.

"We Care About Eagles" has been chosen as the theme for this year's National Wildlife Week Mar. 14-20. Actor Robert Redford is the honorary chairman for the 1982 observance.

Recent firming in interest rates in the nation's credit markets implies little changes in mortgage rates in the near future.

Total construction value for authorized building permit construction in 54 major Idaho locations in January was \$19,294,132 or 23-2 percent above 1981.

New residential construction for 50 dwelling units totaled \$1,428,518 a decrease of 73.4 percent in number and a decrease of 80.3 percent in value compared with a year ago.

Nonresidential construction valued at \$13,752,794 was up 281.1 percent from last year, while alterations and repairs totalling \$4,112,820 were down 14.0 percent.

Local Student Makes Dean's List at N. Carolina

Greensboro, N. C.—Rowena K. Jackson, formerly of Kendrick, attained the dean's list at the University of North Carolina at Greensboro during the first semester which ended recently.

Mrs. Jackson of Greensboro, N. C., a clothing and textiles major, is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Henry Davis of Kendrick. She is a graduate of Kendrick High School.

To make the dean's list at UNC-G students must earn a grade point average of 3.5 or better. They also must be taking at least 12 semester hours of graded coursework, excluding physical education activity courses. Altogether 953 students out of a undergraduate enrollment in excess of 7,300 attained the dean's list. UNC-G also has over 2,800 graduate students.

The March Toward Rural America

An Editorial by W. F. 'Bill' Whitton Idaho Farm Bureau Federation Pocatello, Idaho

One of the most far reaching things the 1982 census will show, according to population experts who have just begun to analyze the billions of figures coming out of last year's county, is that for the first time since the census was begun in 1790, rural areas and small towns have greater rates of growth than the metropolitan areas. This trend is taking place in all areas of the country. At the same time, between 1970 and 1980 there was an accelerated movement of people out of the older industrial regions of the North and into the South and West.

Preliminary census data also confirm some of the other findings of earlier surveys including the decentralization of population within the metropolitan areas, and the aging of the U. S. population.

Perhaps the most unexpected result of the 1980 census was the size of the total count of the population, which exceeded the predictions of the experts by almost five million people. According to the preliminary count, the resident population of the U. S. on April 1, 1980, was 226,504,825, representing an increase of more than 11 percent over 1970. The original purpose of taking a census every ten years as laid down by the founding fathers in the Constitution was to provide a basis for apportioning representation in the House of Representatives and for
