PLANS RELEASED FOR MOSCOW-LATAH CO. LIBRARY

Moscow--- Plans were released Monday on the proposed new addition to the Moscow-Latah County Library which will be voted on at a special City election March 30.

According to Nelson Miller, AIA, Moscow architect with Hummel Jones Miller Hunsucker, the 6,000-sq. foot expansion includes a new main entry to the expanded library. He explained that a sloping sidewalk from the Jefferson-First Street intersection will ease access for the handicapped and elderly.

The current structure occupies 5,800 square feet including the basement. Plans call for the exterior of the new portion to be finished with glazed brick of a similar size and color as the existing building which was completed in 1906.

Miller said that architectural features of the new section would complement but not compete with the CASE NO. Spanish Mission style of the older structure. For example, he pointed out, new arched windows would continue the similar theme from the old building.

The project includes substantial renovation of the current library, specifically, cleaning and repointing the brick exterior, new ceilings, light fixtures and chandeliers as well as lower profile library shelvng, particularly in the Children's Department which will enable children to reach books. The Children's Department will relocate upstairs to the remodeled and carpeted main floor of the existing building while the basement will accommodate technical services.

A new heating system for the entire library will be installed, and other features such as double-pine windows will improve energy efficiency.

The election on March 30 will authorize a \$485,000 general obligation 622 Main Street bond which will build the addition. P. O. Box 573 Some \$150,000 of additional funding Lewiston, ID 83501 will complete the project.

Voters must be registered to vote in the City of Moscow. Registration is at City Hall and the County Courthouse through March 19.



The only way to accurately identify the cans is by the code stamped on one of the ends. The cans have a pub. dates: March 10, 17, 24, 1982 two-line code. The code consists of five numbers or letters on the top line and four numbers or letters on the bottom line. The cans subject to this request all have "K13" on the three middle positions on the top line.

The 7% ounce cans of salmon with these codes should not be opened or eaten. Stores with these on their shelves should immediately pull them off their shelves. The District Health Department should be contacted if any of these cans are found.

An FDA investigation conducted recently revealed that some cans may have been damaged when they were found at the canning plant, permitting the formation in the can of botulinum, toxin, a poison tehat can cause botulism, a possibly fatal dis-



going to come back into the Pacific Northwest agricultural picture in a big way a University of Idaho plant breeder predicted in Moscow.

Speaking at the Palouse Symposium on Dry Peas. Lentils and Chickpeas, Dick Auld said improved new varieties of peas are expected to overcome most of the problems Idaho and Washington growers of Austrian winter peas have been having in recent years.

"Several new varieties of winterhardy peas are currently being developed at the UI. These varieties will have short vines resistance to 6 diseases, higher seed yields and less lodging problems," he said.

Since 1974, production of Austrian winter peas in the Palouse region has been declining. Low seed yields


