

Single-Family **Home Loans**

Jack A. Suesz Farmers Home Administration (FmHA), County Supervisor for Latah County, announced today that the Department of Agriculture has changed its regulations to make it possible for more people to get single family home loans through FmHA. Jack Suesz said the revised rules change the income eligibility criteria, permit funds for approved solar heating, gency's single-family housing pro-

FmHA has a wide range of housing programs, including mortgage loans for single-family home, housing repair and rehabilitation loans, rural rental housing, farm labor housing and self--help housing loans.

One of the major changes is the elimination of a single nationwide income eligibility level. Previously, only families with annual adjusted incomes below \$15,600 were considered eligible for FmHA housing loans, except in Alaska and Hawaii. Income ceilings now vary by economic areas and are based on a percentage of the area median income using data developed by the Dept. of Housing and Urban Development (HUD). Low income is defined as 80 percent of the area median income. Applicants who qualify for moderate income loans will pay interest rates prevailing when the loan is closed which may be either FmHA established rate, currently 13.25 percent, or the HUD rate, depending on ability to pay. For those with incomes at or below 80 percent of the area median income level, the agency provides "interest credits" which reduce the amount of interest the Legion Auxiliary members assisted borrower pays, sometimes to as low as one percent. 

Veneral Disease: The Silent Epidemic Among Us


There is a silent epidemic in the United States. In recent years, gonorrhea has reached epidemic proportions in this country and has become the nation's number one reportable communicable disease. The other major venereal disease-syphilis-once thought to be under control, is increasing. The situation is no different in Idaho.

The reported cases of gonorrhea and syphilis increased last year in Idaho affecting more than 1,850 Idahonans. Half of these cases were young people under 25 years of age.

Except is very rare cases, the only way a person can become infected with a venereal disease is through sexual contact with an infected person. Venereal disease is not spread by water, food, or air. Gonorrhea or syphilis cannot be contracted from toilet seats, drinking fountains or eating utensils.

. The consequences of untreated syphilis or gonorrhea are extremely serious. Untreated syphilis can result in insanity, paralysis, blindness, deafness, heart disease, or even death. The results of untreated gonorhea can be sterility, arthritis, and blindness. If a pregnant woman contracts syphilis or gonorrhea and is not treated, she can pass the disease on to her newborn child.

Venereal disease causes blindness and blind ignorance can result in venereal disease. Information on the recognition, prevention, and treatment of venereal, disease is available from your physician, the

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


