OCCUPATIONAL HEALTH HAZARDS

Is your job making you sick? It could be, says the Idaho Lung Association, if you are inhaling hazardous substances during working hours.

For manufacturing workers in particular, certain materials in the air can be hazardous to lung health.

Dusts, gases, fumes, mists or vapors can contain substances that can cause lung disease or other diseases.

Heavy exposure to breathing hazards, such as in accidental spills, explosions or fires may result in immediate, acute lung damage.

But most exposures to breathing hazards at work are the result of smaller amounts of substances inhaled over a period of time.

Work-related chronic lung diseases usually develop slowly—over years. Symptoms, like shortness of breath, may not be noticed for 20 to 40 years after you are exposed to hazards.

Smoking adds to the risk of developing lung and other diseases, especially for people exposed to workplace hazards.

Since most chronic lung diseases are difficult to treat or impossible to cure, prevention is important.

RADIOACTIVE WATER

Radon, a gas, is very difficult to trace through the human body, Funderburg said. Thus, it is difficult to set a dose rate harmful to humans. However, Funderburg said estimates would put a radon standard at about 2000 pci/L.

Radium 226 concentrations for the 12 samples chosen varied from 0.1 to 0.2 pci/L. The standard is 5.0 pci/L.

Maximum uranium concentrations were measured in two Boise samples —16.0 and 12.7 pci/L and U234 and 9.1 and 6.4 pci/L for U238. No standard for safe uranium levels in drinking water have been set for technical reasons, Funderburg explained. However, if one were adopted, it would be 10-20 pci/L based upon dosage estimates.

Funderburg said that the maximum uranium concentrations measured in Idaho are lower than those found in many other areas of the United States where the water is considered safe.

Radioactivity occurs in water when it passes through natural deposits of various soluble radioactive isotopes, Funderburg explained.

The 1961 data are preliminary. The U. S. Environmental Protection Agency will have a complete report in about 18 months, Funderburg said.

The regular meeting was then called to order. After transacting current business, the meeting adjourned to enjoy snacks provided by the April serving committee.

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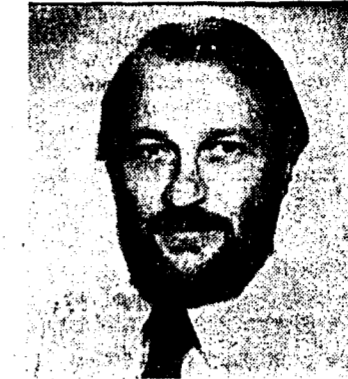
