The annual trustee election of the Latah County Free Library District will be held Tuesday, May 18, 1982. Polling will take place from 3:00 to 8:00 p. m. in six locations around the county. They are the Headquarters Library at 110 S. Jefferson in Moscow, and at the branch libraries in Potlatch, Genesee, Juliaetta, Troy and Deary.

Absentee ballots will be available from the clerk of the district at the headquarters library only after May 7, 1982.

It's a Bad Year for Ticks—

Area cattlemen are having serious tick problems in their cattle herds. According to Dr. Ray Turner, D. V. B. of Lewiston Veterinary Clinic, "In the latter part of April and early May, yearling cattle and some calves have been affected with tick paralysis. The areas with serious tick problems include Lewiston, Gifford, Anatone, and Cottonwood. The female tick feeds on the blood from the cattle and injects the toxin which causes the paralysis.

Prevention: Spray cattle with Lindane-Toxaphene spray every 2 weeks during the tick season. Down cattle should be sprayed for ticks or the ticks removed manually. These animals should be treated for

Genesee School Levy, Trustee Election 18th

Voters of the Genesee Jt. School District No. 282 will be asked to approve a maintenance and operation levy as well as vote for a trustee for Zone 5 on Tuesday, May 18, 1982. Polls will be open from 11:00 a. m. until 8:00 p. m. Patrons living in Latah County will vote in the foyer of the gymnasium; Nez Perce patrons will vote at the Ralph Baumgartner residence. Absentee ballots are available in the district's superintendent's office. If patrons need ballots or want to arrange transportation to the polls, they can do so by calling the school at 285-1161.

Martin Stout is the incumbent for Zone 5 and is the only name which will appear on the ballot. Mr. Stout has served on the board one three year term. If patrons are unsure of which zone they reside in, they may contact the district office.

Genesee schools are very proud of the educational program provided the students that attend the public schools. The curriculum offerings are much greater than state requirements. Student-teacher ratios are small thus allowing for individual attention. Graduates perform well in post secondary educational programs such as vocational training or college. Results of tests given show Genesee students well above average national and state norms. An excellent educational opportunity is provided for the students of the district; This requires more money than is generated from state and local tax revenues.

On May 18th voters of the district will be asked to approve a maintenance and operation levy in the amount of \$125,000. This is \$75,000 above the amount approved by voters in last May's election. On a house with a market value of approximately \$50,000 this would be a \$77.95 tax increase per year, or \$6.50 a month. This would be an increase of \$46.00 over last year's levy or \$3.90 a month.

Approximately \$50,000 of the proposed levy is planned for one-time maintenance projects or educational equipment purchase. Roof repair, heat system, energy conservation measures, gym floor, elementary classroom remodeling, and life safety codes (lighting, fire codes) are maintenance areas that need attention. Instructional equipment purchases planned include electric typewriters for the office practice classes and a microcomputer capable of word processing. The maintenance areas, for the most part, a continuation of efforts made over the past two years to improve areas that patrons have identified as being most in need of attention. We've made some good progress and wish to continue to improve on facility equipment. The instructional equipment is a must if we are to keep our students in pace with the more recent kinds of things they will see when they get out in the real world.

The remaining \$75,000 of the override request is to support our educational programs above that amount we receive from normal state and local tax support. In past years the district has operated on reserve funds for support of these programs. This reserve fund is depleted to the point that if the remaining funds are budgeted this year, we will probably have to borrow money to operate the school, and at the end of the year reduce our program costs to \$100,000. That would not be sound financial operation of the district, and educationally would devastate our secondary curriculum.

This override levy request is important to the district. Patrons are asked to attend the public budget meeting scheduled for May 17th in the multi-purpose room at 7:30 p. m. If you are unable to attend, please call the school. A favorable vote on the levy will determine if the Genesee schools maintain their excellence.

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

Planting Extends Space in Gardens

 Moscow: Try aerial gardening if your garden space is so limited that you cannot afford to have vegetable plants sprayed over the ground. "It's common to see string beans and tomatoes supported by stakes and trellises but few gardeners train cucumbers or small melons in this fashion. It's a practical way of expanding your gardening space," said Dr. Michael Colt, UI extension horticulturist.

The extension specialist said pole beans and other tall-growing vegetables should be located on the north side of the garden so they won't shade smaller plants.

"To get the best results from a limited garden space, plan before you plant. Get some graph paper and carefully mark where each vegetable will be planted," he said.

Inter-planting is a space-saving technique recommended by UI experts. Here, vegetables that mature quickly are planted between those late-maturing plants that will be needing more space later. Radishes, lettuce, spinach and beets are good filler crops.

After you have harvested spring crops, plant late-season crops in the same space.

To have a succession of a particular crop, plant a few seeds each month.

In a small garden, tomato varieties that bear fruit for several months may be better choice than sweet corn or other crops that are harvested over a comparatively short interval, Colt suggested.

"Root crops like beets and carrots keep for a long time in the soil, further extending your harvest season," he said.

If there isn't enough room in your garden for everything you want to grow why not plant some vegetables in landscaped areas?

"Asparagus, artichokes and rhubarb have attractive foliage and can be planted with ornamental shrubs. Strawberries make a nice ground-cover planting. Parsley and herbs can be worked into flower borders," Colt said.

"Growing vegetables in containers on a patio can be very rewarding. Drainage is important, so be sure there are drainage holes in the bottom of your containers. It's best to use a prepared soil mix because garden soil holds too much water and crusts on top when it is used in containers," the extension specialist said.

For gardening advice, Idaho residents may contact county offices of the University of Idaho Cooperative Extension Service.

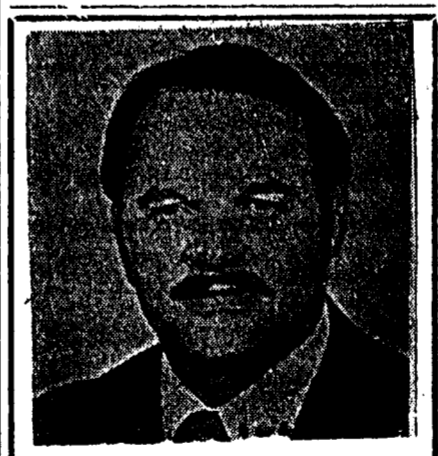

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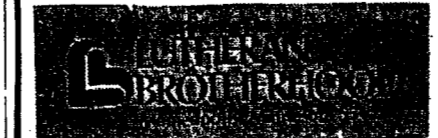
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Students Reminded About Social Security Changes

Students 18 to 22 getting Social Security checks are reminded about important recent changes that will reduce or eliminate future benefits. How students are affected will depend primarily on the type of school they are in and when benefits started:

1. If you attended college (or other post-secondary school)—Payments can continue until you finish school, reach age 22, marry, or through April 1985, whichever comes first, provided you meet both of these conditions: You were entitled to a Social Security check for August 1981 when the law was changed; and you were attending (not just enrolled in) a post-secondary school full time before May, 1982. However, be aware of these changes:

- * You will receive no checks for May, June, July, and August even if in school full time.
 - * You aren't eligible for cost-of-living increases that are given most Social Security beneficiaries each summer.
 - * You benefit will be reduced 25% each year, starting with the September 1982 check due October 3).
- If you attend post-secondary school and first became entitled to a Social Security check for a month after August 1981, benefits can be paid only for months of full-time attendance through July 1982 (including May, June and July if you are in school or intend to return to school). You are not eligible after that.

2. If you attend high school—Starting Aug. 1982, payments gen-

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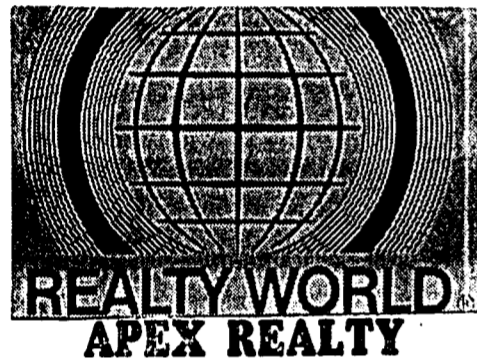
