Alex H. Weaver, a foreman for the Louisiana-Pacific Lumber Co. at Post Falls and a former north central Idaho resident, died Saturday of a heart attack at Kellogg. He was 52.

He was born Mar. 6, 1930 to Harvey and Annie Weaver at Southwick, Idaho and grew up in that area. Later he worked at Deer Lodge, Mont., and moved to Post Falls in 1977.

Weaver married Shirley Marsh at Deer Lodge in 1963. She survives at the family home in Post Falls.

He was a veteran of the Korean War and a member of the Deer Lodge Masonic Lodge.

Survivors in addition to his wife include four sons, M. T. New Math Teacher for Kendrick Hired by Board of Trustees at May 13 Meet

The regular scheduled meeting of the Kendrick Jr. School District 283 was held Thursday evening, May 13, 1982. The meeting started at 8:30 p. m. to enable board members and administration an opportunity to attend the first portion of the annual high school FFA banquet.

The board scheduled the 1982-83 district budget public hearing date for Tuesday, June 8. The board also hired a new math teacher for the 1982-83 school year, Greg Forsyth. Mr. Forsyth is a 1982 graduate of Washington State University at Pullman. Mr. Forsyth is a native

of Spokane and graduated from Shadle Park High School in 1978. In addition to being a member of National High School Honor Society, he was chosen to the 1978 Greater Spokane League All City Football team as a Defensive Back and the All City Baseball team as a center fielder. Mr. Forsyth will take the position of Mr. Jim Alford who is returning to WSU to work on a doctorate in mathematics.

In other board action, the board heard and approved final plans for the senior trip to Lolo Hot Springs upon the signed contract of rules by the parents. The board set the calendar for the 1982-83 school year. The board also set the salaries for the certified and non-certified staff members. Likewise, summer capital outlay improvement projects were awarded 3 firms based on the lowest estimates submitted: Gussenhoven Plumbing of Lewiston for installation of 5 sinks at Juliaetta Elementary School, Waterman Floor Covering for installation of carpets in 4 classrooms at Juliaetta Elementary School and Lloyd Farrington for drain installation and sidewalk replacement for the rear parking lot entrance to Kendrick High School. Finally, the guidance and counseling time was increased for Dr. Tom Fairchild from the University of Idaho to 1/2 day per week for the 1982-83 school year.

The June meeting of the board of trustees was set for Tuesday, June 8 to correspond with the public budget hearing session.

Heart Attack Claims Civic Leader Gerald Ingle

Gerald A. Ingle, 72, a power in Latah County government and Democratic politics for many years, died Saturday, May 15 at 7 p. m. in St. Joseph's Hospital in Lewiston. He and his wife, Grace, had been on a trip to the Holy Land when illness forced their early return home. He had spent 6 days at a Copenhagen, Denmark hospital after he became more ill on the return flight. He had been able to travel on to Seattle, then to Lewiston on Saturday and was at the home of a sister when his initial heart attack occurred. He was taken to St. Joseph's where he suffered the final seizure.

Gerald farmed the same land that his grandparents, David and Maria Ingle, homesteaded on Big Bear Ridge and later farmed by his parents, King D. and Florence Ingle. In addition he devoted much of his time to service to Latah County and to public and civic organizations.

He was a Latah County commissioner for 20 years, retiring in 1977 after serving 18 years as chairman. For 28 years, Ingle was a member of the Kendrick School Board, and for 30 years he was chairman of the Farm Institute, a cooperative program of the Latah and Nez Perce County Extension Services, the Kendrick Grange and the Kendrick-Juliaetta Lions Club.

One of Ingle's last bits of public service was in April shortly before his heart attack when he finished a book on the history of Big Bear Ridge. The book is ready for editing and publication.

Ingle was a member of the Law Enforcement Planning Commission during the time a new courthouse and law enforcement center were built at Moscow.

His activities in agriculturally oriented organizations included the past presidency of the Idaho Weed Association; membership on the Ag-

ricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee, membership on the Latah County Fair Board; several years as a 4-H leader; membership in the Deary and Kendrick Grange, of which he was a past master. He was also a past master of the Latah County Pomona Grange.



Other memberships included a lifetime membership in the Moscow Elks, the Kendrick-Juliaetta Lions Club; the Kendrick Masonic Lodge, of which he was past master, the Scottish Rite Masons and Calum Temple of the Shrine.

Ingle was born April 15, 1910, at Kendrick.

He married Grace Warren at Boise November 1, 1935. He graduated from Kendrick High School in 1928 and from the University of Idaho in 1933. He attended the Kendrick Methodist Church.

In addition to his wife, Ingle is survived by a son, Dr. Donald L. Ingle, of Trenton, N. J., a daughter, Marjorie McBride of Idaho Falls; his mother, Florence of Moscow; a brother, William Ingle of Hubbard, Oregon; two sisters, Aicie Nethkin of Lewiston, and Betty Olson of Albuquerque, N. M.; five grandchildren and one great grandchild.

The funeral will be Thursday at 10:30 a. m. at the Brower-Wain Chapel, Lewiston. The Rev. Jim Watson, pastor of the Kendrick United Methodist Church will officiate. Burial will be at Wild Rose Cemetery, Big Bear Ridge.

The family has suggested memorials to the Kendrick United Methodist Church, the Latah Convalescent Center or another charity of the donor's choice.

A Friend of the Community

The community and Latah County is still stunned by the passing of our friend Gerald Ingle. It is difficult to believe that this man who was so active and so vital a force in the county will no longer be offering his knowledge and energy in the dozens of ways required to make an area of land and group of people into a community.

The tributes, spoken in shock and sorrow following the news of his passing, came from State, County, and local people who had come to know, respect and depend on this hard-working Bear Ridge farmer who had devoted his life to being a friend and neighbor.

Gerald's life was one of caring and true concern about anything he believed to be for the best interests of the community and its people. No projects were too small for his efforts if he believed them to be good and worthwhile. He put the same drive and energy into the Locust Blossom Festival barbecue stand as he did his work as chairman of the Latah County Commissioners. He had just completed a history of Big Bear Ridge and when this work is published it will be the definitive history of that area.

I have been in the newspaper business in Latah County for 28 years and have known and observed Gerald Ingle's work for almost the same length of time. I had seen him happy, sad, concerned, worried, angry, even outraged at some event or condition which existed. I never, at any time, ever saw him petty, malicious or mean. His personal integrity was as great as his belief that people should be of service to others.

No man, of course, is indispensable, and life will go on much as it always has and always will. But, oh my friends, our work won't be nearly so easy or enjoyable now that we don't have a good man like Gerald Ingle to depend on.—Bill

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What Is Your Life?

Carl Sandburg has described the fog in a unique way: "The fog comes on little cat feet. It sits looking over the harbor and city on silent haunches — and then moves on."

James wrote that our lives are much the same — a vapor that appears for a little time, and then moves on (James 4:14). Oh, how quickly it goes! Do you remember those days of childhood dreaming? Perhaps you were going to be a policeman or fireman or teacher. Suddenly, the dreaming days had passed and you were accountable. Adulthood hit so fast. And then those strong years of physical maturity vanished and your hair grew white. How quickly! It had all gone so quickly. What is your life?

Let me suggest three basic areas where God's will for your life is clearly stated.

1. It is the will of God that all be saved. "For this is good and acceptable in the sight of God our Savior; who will have all men to be saved, and to come unto the knowledge of the truth (1 Tim. 2:3-4)." It is the will of God that all be covered by the blood of Jesus Christ, sins forgiven, rejoicing in the Lord. Two thousand years ago, Jesus demonstrated His qualifications to be your sinless savior and died for you on Calvary. The third day He arose to become your greatest friend. He calls you today to salvation. Have you responded? What is your life?

2. God also calls you to sanctifica-

tion. "This is the will of God, even your sanctification (1 Thess 4:3). Sanctification means to be set apart of God's purpose. It means pure living, setting sinful pleasures aside. "Blessed are the pure in heart: for they shall see God (Mat 5:8)" I love the prayer of Robert Murray M'Cheyne of Scotland, who prayed every day, "O God, above everything, make me a holy man." Sanctification means the Bible is the guide for your life, and the Ten Commandments direct your activities. There is more said about holiness in the Bible than love. What is your life?

3. The will of God also involves service. "I beseech you therefore, brethren, by the mercies of God, that ye present your bodies a living sacrifice, holy acceptable unto God, which is your reasonable service (Rom 12:1)." Salvation is not a free trip to glory. It means involvement in God's work — involvement to the hilt. It requires total commitment to a person — Jesus Christ. The place of your service — the circumstances — the emotions and feelings may vary. But the commitment to Christ must remain steadfast, unmovable, unshakable! Think of the honor — to be of service to Almighty God! What a privilege. Whom do you serve? What is your life?

My friend, your life is short — so terribly short. It will be over quickly and time will continue. But your life is important, significant, vital to so many people. Are you living it to the glory of God? Are you saved? Is your life sanctified to God? Is your goal to be of service to God? Look over your years carefully and answer the question, "What is your life?"

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
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
