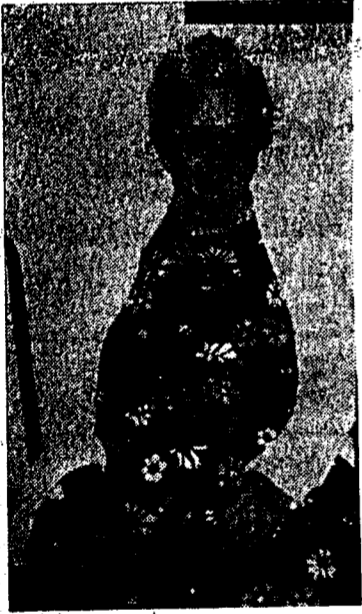

## Delphine Flerchinger Passes May 22

Delphine Flerchinger, 84, a long-time Genesee area farm woman, died Saturday, May 22 at the Latah Care Center in Moscow, where she had lived since 1977. She was born April 23, 1898, to Jacob and Agnes Brenner in Ontario, Canada. The family moved to a farm in the Genesee area when she was about six years old.



She was married to Henry Flerchinger, Nov. 16, 1920, in Uniontown. They farmed in the Uniontown-Genesee area for many years and most recently lived in the Genesee Valley. Mr. Flerchinger died in 1976.

She was a member of St. Mary's Catholic Church in Genesee and had been active in its Altar Society in earlier years.

Survivors include four sons, Francis of Olympia, Wa., Joyce of Genesee, Norman of Hooper, Wa., and Ed Flerchinger of Kodiak, Alaska; three daughters, Clementine Washburn of San Diego, Ca., Kathleen Sandmeyer of Bozeman, Mt., and Pat Shirley of Genesee; two foster sons, the Rev. Jack Harrington of Havre, Mt., and Florry Harrington of Post Falls; two brothers, Edgar Brenner, Moscow and George Brenner of Pomeroy, Wa.; three sisters, Sisters Mary Alvera, Mildred Marie and Miriam Brenner, all Catholic nuns in Walla Walla; 43 grandchildren and 15 great grandchildren.

A son, a daughter, three sisters and one brother died previously.

Rosary was recited Wednesday at 7:30 p. m. at St. Mary's Church in Genesee. Funeral Mass was celebrated Thursday at 10:00 a. m. at the church by the Revs. Jack Harrington and Edward Cope. Burial followed in St. Mary's cemetery with Short's Chapel of Moscow in charge.

H. B. (Bill) Manwaring, a retired sales manager for Lewiston Refrigeration, Inc., and salesman for Security Furniture Co. at Lewiston, died Wednesday, May 19 at St. Joseph's Hospital, Lewiston, of cancer. He was 73.

He was born Nov. 2, 1908 to Lincoln and Julia Manwaring at Cottonwood. He grew up at Clarkston, where he attended school, and moved to Seattle in 1940. He returned to Lewiston in 1946 and moved to Kendrick in 1976 after his retirement. He and his wife, Roberta, lived on Texas Ridge.

He married Vi Cooper at Lewiston in 1935. They were later divorced. He married Roberta Weeks at Lewiston on Nov. 6, 1959. She survives at the family home.

Manwaring was a member of the Lewiston Elks Lodge, the Lewiston Eagles Club and the Loyal Order of Moose at Clarkston. He was also a member of NezPerce Lodge No. 10, A. F. & A. M., the Grand Commander Knights Templar of Idaho, The Calam Temple and the Kendrick Grange.

Survivors include his wife; two sons, Glenn Ray Manwaring and Gary Abbott, both of Lewiston; a brother R. Casper Manwaring of Lewiston; four sisters, Arcena Deniger, Elma South, and Henrietta Barber of Lewiston, and Velda Phillips of Milwaukie, Oregon; eight grandchildren and six great-grandchildren. Two brothers and two sisters preceded him in death.

Services were held Saturday at 10:30 a. m. at the Mountain View Funeral Home at Lewiston with members of the Masonic Lodge officiating. The body was cremated.

A long, cold, wet spring delayed the leafing and budding of what few trees remain that are going to be capable of producing blossoms, but even if the blossoms are missing, the months of planning and preparation have brought everything else to full bloom and Kendrick is ready for its yearly celebration.

## Runs Begin the Celebration

Two runs, the fifth annual 5-mile

run, and a shorter 2-mile "Fun Run" will start the day's festivities. The 5.3 mile run will begin at the site of R&R Mobile Homes west of Juliaetta on Highway 3. The Fun Run will begin at Doc Little's Shop West of Kendrick. Registration will be taken from 7:00 a. m. on at the starting point of both races. 

**GOOD FISHING IS OUT THERE FOR GENERAL SEASON OPENER**

There will be plenty of good fishing out there when the general season opens May 29, although many rivers and streams may be running too high and muddy to be worth a try.

That's the prediction of Jim Keating, Department of Fish & Game.

The fisheries bureau chief said about 695,000 catchable-size rainbow trout will have been stocked for the opener, "wherever we can get our tanker trucks to water that is fishable". Wild fish, however, will provide most of the trout fishing, he added.

Most water stocked will be on reservoirs and ponds, but other waters will get hatchery fish as soon as high runoff from last winter's heavy snowpack eases off.

Even a few of the favorite reservoirs have taken on an unusual appearance or this time of year. "Some are full to the brim, while others have been drawn down to make room for the runoff," Keating said.

He advised anglers to check water conditions, boat ramps and roads in advance to avoid a disappointing Memorial Day weekend.

Keating also had some words of caution for would-be boaters and rafters. "The possibility of serious trouble in high, fast water is not

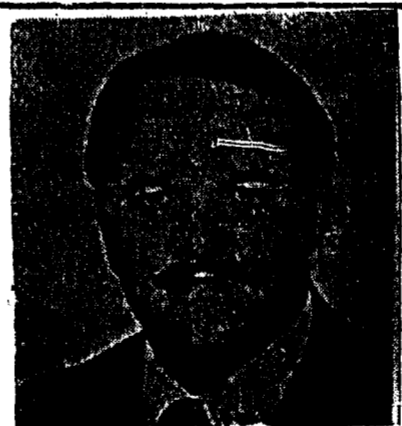

Some streams may be high and clear and they will produce fish in the eddies, "but watch the children and keep them back from the water," Keating warned.

General season dates are May 29 through November 30 in most areas. Anglers should check fishing regulations carefully for bag limits and for other rules that apply in many places.

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**OUTDOOR BURNING SEASON**

With the outdoor burning season upon us, many people have questions on what types of burning are allowed and when it is permissible. Idaho air pollution laws prohibit all but a few categories of open burning and these are only allowed under certain conditions. No open burning at all is allowed when an Air Stagnation Advisory is in effect.

Recreational fires, fire fighting personnel training fires, industrial flares and Christmas tree disposal site fires may be allowed. Weed burning is allowed when no alternative exists, as is burning to eliminate a fire hazard. Orchard heating is also allowed but only certain types of equipment may be used. Rubbish burning of household waste is permissible but only on the property where it is generated and then only of low population.

Agriculture burning is permitted on the premises where the plant life to be burned was grown and if no economic and reasonable alternative form of disposal is available.

In all cases care should be taken to make sure that it is safe to burn. Many areas have additional restrictions on open burning. Counties, cities, fire districts, National Forest districts, or other entities

**"Here's To Your Health"**

**BACK COUNTRY DYSENTERY**

Currently the most common cause of parasitic disease in Idaho and the United States is Giardia lamblia, a tiny one-celled organism which may take up residence in the small intestine.

A typical Idaho case goes like this: A young man returns home from a backpacking trip. About 12 days later he develops diarrhea, a full feeling in his stomach, gas, and belching. Occasionally he feels nauseous and generally run-down. After a few days of this, he visits his physician. The doctor has him collect 3 stool specimens on alternate days. The specimens are sent to a laboratory where a lab technician finds the characteristic oval cysts. Armed with this information the physician may treat the patient with Quinacrine which is usually effective. The disease may go away without treatment or it may develop into a chronic unrecognized infection.

How did our hiker get the disease? He probably swallowed Giardia in his drinking water. He used chlorine tablets in his drinking water, but unfortunately, that doesn't guarantee safety from parasitic diseases—it only does destroy bacteria and viruses. He should have used an iodine-based disinfectant or boiled his drinking water to avoid Giardiasis.

Giardia in the water came from the stools of another hiker or one of several animals that share this disease with us. Some animals known to be carriers of Giardiasis are beavers, coyotes, cats, sheep, cattle, humans, dogs, rats, gerbils, raccoons and antelopes.

You can avoid Giardiasis by remembering a few simple things: First, no surface water—no matter how clear, cold or high in the mountains is safe to drink without boiling or iodine treatment. Second: if your domestic water comes from a river or creek, you should provide a filtering step prior to using chlorine. Avoiding the disease is particularly important to women since medicines that are used to treat Giardiasis generally are not safe to use during pregnancy.

**Natural Resources Camp To Take Place in June**

Moscow —Teenagers in northern Idaho and eastern Washington with an interest in the natural resources will participate this summer in the annual Inland Empire Natural Resources Youth Camp.

Boys and Girls 13 to 16 years of age will attend the camp June 20-26 at Camp N-Sid-Sen, on the eastern shore of Lake Coeur d'Alene, about nine miles north of Harrison. Applications are now being accepted.

"It's purpose is to develop young leaders and to provide information and understanding on which they may make wise decisions about the use and management of our resources," said Charles M. Thomas, assistant state 4-H leader for the UI Cooperative Extension Service and a camp program director.

The campers will look at wildlife, soils, water, outdoor recreation, conservation, planning, forestry and range resources during the week. The campers need not be planning a career in resources management to attend, but demonstrated leadership in school or community activities is encouraged.

Applications for the camp is due May 28. The application can be obtained from soil conservation district officers, UI Cooperative Extension Service agents, high school counselors and vocational agriculture instructors. The applications should be completed and returned to the soil conservation district office in your area.

The cost for the six-day camp is \$85. However, scholarships for all or part of the fee is available. Check with the soil conservation district office or the UI Cooperative Extension Service office in your area for details.

The camp is sponsored by the Cooperative Extension Services of the UI and WSU, the Society of American Foresters, the Society of Range Management and the Soil Conservation Society of America.

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
