Ray C. King and Gladys Candler were married in the middle of the depression and knew some lean times in their early marriage. They will celebrate their 50th wedding anniversary at an open house reception Sunday, June 13, between the hours of 2 and 4 p. m. at the Cavendish United Methodist Church.

They borrowed his father's Model T Ford car, drove to Clarkston and were married at the Presbyterian Church June 14, 1932. They had \$20 when they started out, but had only \$5 left after buying the license, paying the preacher and buying the treats.

Now retired, they live on their ranch at Cavendish and enjoy fishing, boating and camping. Ray is in demand by his friends and relatives for fine cabinet making, and Gladys' cooking is a joy to eat. Both are active in the Cavendish United Methodist Church where he is a trustee.

In 1935 Ray started work in the sawmills of the area and later became known for his ability as a millwright. He worked for Darby,

Walt Brandt at Dicks Creek, and L. Cardiff at Pierce. Gladys cooked for mill crews.

She remembers that she cooked for 18 men and was paid \$1.50 per day plus their board. Though wages were low, the money went a lot farther than it does today, they said.

During World War II, Ray farmed for Tom King while the latter was in the service.

In 1951 they purchased the sawmill that Gladys' father, Jeter Candler, had built and operated it until it burned in 1959. Ray then built a portable sawmill and for several years took the mill to the trees. In 1967 he began work for the county as a grader operator and continued keeping the roads smooth in summer and plowed in winter until his retirement in 1974.

In the early days of their marriage, "It was a real treat to go to a show," they said. These picture shows were held in the gym at the Southwick school or overhead at Tarry's Store, now Cavendish Store. They often went on picnics with other families of the area and "hurried home to milk the cow."

They started out married life in a log cabin, but in 1956 moved into a new, modern three-bedroom house that they built themselves. It took two years to complete the structure.

During their early log cabin days, there was no electricity in the area and they kept milk and other foods cool in a pit Ray dug in the floor of their cellar. They bought a kerosene fueled refrigerator when they lived in Pierce and later traded it for an electric model when electricity came to the Cavendish area.

The dirt roads of their early married years have become black-topped and the horses and Model T cars have been replaced by the modern Oldsmobile they drive today. "They have also noticed a big increase in traffic toward Dvornashak Reservoir and feel their relative solitude will soon be replaced by many passing vehicles.

The thickly-timbered hills have been mostly cleared for the farmland and the small acreages have come under larger ownership in the last fifty years, they said.

In the early days Ray kept hounds as did many of the other men of the area, and they used these to chase coyotes, cougar and lynx. Listening to the hounds bay on the scent during a hunt are pleasant memories for the Kings.

Fall hunting expeditions were important events of the year as the meat was needed for winter food and the group hunts were pleasant relaxation. Gladys remained at home to care for their son, Carl, and animals, but she canned the elk and deer provided.

They remembered that as children their parents preserved pork by smoke and salt cure and "put it down in ashes to keep the bugs out." The sausage was fried in patties, placed in jars and had poured over. Jars were stored on their tops and "it kept for a long time that way."

"We didn't eat beef," they recalled. These were raised for sale and were quite valuable animals compared to the chicken and pork that we raised to eat ourselves." Kings have lost two post offices during their time in the Cavendish area. Though they haven't moved, their address has changed from Cavendish to Southwick and now to Kendrick, their present address.

They have been active in Democratic politics and King was precinct committeeman for many years. He is also a member of Kendrick Lodge No. 26, A. F. & A. M. Gladys was active in Cavendish Ladies Club and helped stitch many a quilt until the club was discontinued a number of years ago.

Hosts for this Golden Wedding celebration are their son and daughter-in-law, Carl and Joan King of Orofino, Gladys' sister Eleanor and Cliff Hollenbeck of Lewiston. Kings two grandchildren will also assist. All the friends and relatives of Ray and Gladys are invited to attend and the request is: no gifts, please.




