

Perform Gardening **Chores Carefully**

Clifton Anderson Associate Agricultural Editor

Moscow-Weeding, watering and other gardening chores should be performed with care and precision, according to University of Idaho

horticulturists. They say a hasty application of water can do more harm than good and deep over-enthusiastic hoeing may kill desirable plants along with

"When you water, don't just wet the soil surface.Let the water soak down until the plants' entire root zone is wet," said Dr. Michael Colt, University of Idaho, extension horticulturist.

"Seedlings have shallow roots and need frequent watering. As vegetables grow and root deeper, water less often but apply more water each time," he added.

Colt said shallow-rooted crops like lettuce and radishes will need more frequent irrigation than deeprooted plants such as tomatoes.

When combatting weeds with a hoe, gardeners should avoid making deep slices into the soil, the extension horticulturist said.

"Shallow cultivation is best because it kills weeds without harming the crop roots," Colt explained.

Application of a mulch helps control weeds and conserve soil moisture. Good results are obtained when compost, wood chips, straw or other mulches are applied 1 to 2 inches thick around vegetable plants.

Colt said gardeners should give careful attention to the thinning of

"If seedlings are not thinned, the plants will become crowded and unproductive. As soon as the seedlings develop their third or fourth set of leaves, remove the small and weak ones. Leave enough space so they can reach their full size at maturity, he said.

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

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


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
