Breakfast Begins the Day—

Genesee's 22nd annual Community Day celebration, scheduled for Saturday, June 12, will start with a breakfast held from 7 to 9:30 a. m. in the downstairs of the Firemen's Hall and will begin a day filled with fun and activity for all ages. The breakfast will consist of Genesee Sausage, eggs, hash brown potatoes, hot cakes, coffee and milk. Prices for the breakfast will be \$3.50 for adults and \$2.00 for children under 12. The Jaycees are in charge with Rick Zenger, chairman. Following the breakfast, the first annual Cow Creek Run will begin

at 9:00 a. m. on Main Street. Walkers are also encouraged to participate. (more details in separate article). There will be a kiddie and pet parade at 10:30 on Main Street which will precede the Main Community Day parade. Children planning on entering the parade are asked to meet at Tyler's Repair Shop promptly at 9:30. Entries will be judged in four categories: bicycles, tricycles, floats, pet and/or miscellaneous. There will be cash prizes.

Essers Will Lead the Parade—

This year's parade will be lead by Grand Marshalls, Lloyd and Flossie Esser. "Loise" is a retired contractor and builder. He is a former city councilman, was one of the most active members of the Genesee Community Firemen and is still an honorary member of the department. He is currently a member of the Planning and Zoning Commission. Loise is also a member of the Genesee Rim Riders and has been the trail boss of that organization for the past 14 years. One member of the club said this week "he's Grandpa to half the kids in town." Flossie is a homemaker and is also

noted for her beautiful handwork—embroidery, afghans and other articles and enjoys growing and tending her flowers.

Loise was (and still is) considered one of the finest builders and carpenters in the area. Fourteen of his homes are still standing in the city of Genesee. The couple have been married 53 years. Walter L. May, 76, Am. Ridge Native, Passes June 3

Walter L. May, a lifetime resident of north central Idaho and a hotel owner for many years died of the infirmities of age Thursday morning, June 3 at Clearwater Valley Hospital in Orofino. He was 76.

May was born March 24, 1906 at Kendrick. He farmed in that area for several years. From 1965 to 1974, he owned and operated a hotel and lounge at Kamiah.

May was a life member of the Lewiston Elks Lodge and enjoyed outdoor sports. He earned his pilot's license in 1927 and had been flying regularly for years. On Feb. 16, 1931, he married Norma L. Bruce of Asotin. She preceded him in death as did a brother and sister.

Survivors include a son, Bruce of Orofino; 2 daughters, Dee Dee Woodelman, Spokane and Sandra Farmworth of Orofino; two sisters (Ruby, Schoepel of Vashon, Wa., and Muriel Gant of Edmonds, Wa., 10 grandchildren and 3 great grandchildren. The funeral was held Tuesday at Short's Funeral Chapel at Moscow, and members of the Lewiston Elks Lodge officiated. The body was cremated and buried at Moscow cemetery.

The family suggest memorials be given to the Elks Rehabilitation Center or to the North Idaho Children's Home at Lewiston.

Bill F. Weyen, life-time Kendrick resident and farmer, died of a heart attack at 9:30 a. m. Thursday at his home.

Weyen farmed on Pottlatch Ridge and was an avid outdoorsman, with fishing and hunting his favorite pastimes. He was an active member of the Veterans of Foreign Wars, Baker-Lind Post 3913 at Kendrick. He was a charter and honorary member of the Kendrick Trail Riders Motorcycle Club.



Weyen was born Jan. 19, 1920 to Weyen and Anna Weyen at Kendrick. He graduated from high school here in 1939. On Oct. 7, 1939, he married Ava Craig, also of Kendrick. He worked for George F. Brocke & Sons for three years and then began farming with his father until he was inducted into the service in 1945. While in the Army, he received the Good Conduct Medal, Victory Medal and the Asiatic Pacific Service Medal. He belonged to the Cameron Emmanuel Lutheran church. Weyen continued farming following his discharge.

He is survived by his wife, Ava at Kendrick; three daughters, Carol Heitstuman, Moscow; Kaye Harris and Debbie Klatt, Kendrick; a brother, Ted, Kendrick and nine grandchildren.

Services were held last Saturday at 10 a. m. at Malcom's Brower-Wann at Lewiston. Officiating was Rev. John Blom, Cameron Emmanuel Lutheran church. He was buried at Lewis-Clark Memorial Gardens.

ures, commercial fertilizers, or a combination of organic and inorganic fertilizers, Colt said.

"Enough phosphorus and potassium can be supplied for the entire season by one application of manure or a complete commercial fertilizer. Mix the fertilizer into the soil before planting.

"Early in the season, when your plants are about 3 or 4 inches tall, apply 1 or 2 pounds of nitrogen for every 100 feet of row. This should be scattered in a shallow furrow dug

along the side of the row about 5 inches away from the plants. Then cover the fertilizer with soil and water thoroughly. A second and a third application of nitrogen, spaced about six inches apart, will increase yields of vegetables that have a long growing period," the extension horticulturist said.

To obtain advice regarding the solution of vegetable production problems, gardeners should contact county offices of the University of Idaho Cooperative Extension Service.

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
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Perform Gardening Chores Carefully

Moscow—Weeding, watering and other gardening chores should be performed with care and precision, according to University of Idaho horticulturists.

They say a hasty application of water can do more harm than good and deep over-enthusiastic hoeing may kill desirable plants along with weeds.

"When you water, don't just wet the soil surface. Let the water soak down until the plants' entire root zone is wet," said Dr. Michael Colt, University of Idaho, extension horticulturist.

"Seedlings have shallow roots and need frequent watering. As vegetables grow and root deeper, water less often but apply more water each time," he added.

Colt said shallow-rooted crops like lettuce and radishes will need more frequent irrigation than deep-rooted plants such as tomatoes.

When combatting weeds with a hoe, gardeners should avoid making deep slices into the soil, the extension horticulturist said.

"Shallow cultivation is best because it kills weeds without harming the crop roots," Colt explained.

Application of a mulch helps control weeds and conserve soil moisture. Good results are obtained when compost, wood chips, straw or other mulches are applied 1 to 2 inches thick around vegetable plants. Colt said gardeners should give careful attention to the thinning of seedlings.

"If seedlings are not thinned, the plants will become crowded and unproductive. As soon as the seedlings develop their third or fourth set of leaves, remove the small and weak ones. Leave enough space so they can reach their full size at maturity, he said.

Immunizations for School Entry

Immunizations needed for school entry are available through the N. Central District Health Department or the private physician. Idaho does have immunization law which does require proof of immunization for protection against diphtheria, whooping cough, tetanus, polio, measles, mumps and rubella (German Measles). The required vaccines are 4 or more doses of DPT and polio, and 1 for measles, mumps and rubella, which is given after the child is 12 months of age. Immunization clinics are held in Moscow at the Health Department, Room 206 in the Latah County court house on the 1st and 3rd Wednesdays of each month from 1:30 to 4:30. In Lewiston, the immunizations are given every Wednesday afternoon. Physical examinations are strongly encouraged for students entering kindergarten. This examination is suggested in an effort to identify any child who may have a health

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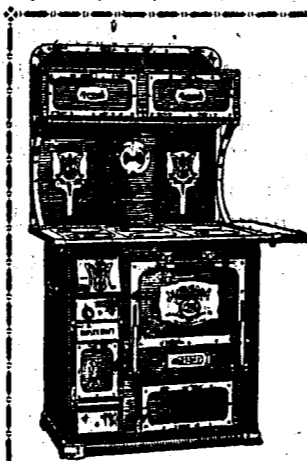

PHEASANT SEASONS TO OPEN ON TRADITIONAL DATES Pheasant hunters can count on traditional opening dates again this year—the second Saturday in October for northern Idaho and the 4th Saturday in the southern part of the state.

Fish and Game commissioners have set October 9 and October 23 as the respective opening dates.

The Department of Fish and Game had recommended that the seasons begin a week later to avoid conflicts with big game hunting, but the commissioners agreed that the earlier opening would have the desirable effect of dispersing hunters.

September 1 is the opening date for doves and cottontails. Forest grouse openers are September 15—in those areas with big game seasons starting in mid-September—and September 18 elsewhere.

Seasons for Hungarian partridge, chukar, quail, sage and sharp-tailed grouse also open September 18 and the opening dates for August 1 for the early chukar hunt along portions of the Middle Fork and Main Salmon Rivers.
