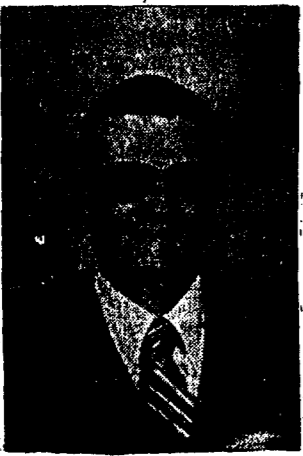


Sudden Attack Claims Life Of Jerry Johnson

Jerry C. Johnson, a lifetime resident of Genesee and a local farmer, died of an apparent heart attack Wednesday, June 9. He was 44.



Jerry was born October 17, 1937, the son of Jess and Pearl Johnson. He lived his entire life in the Genesee area. He attended the Genesee schools and graduated from Genesee High School in 1955. He attended the U. of Idaho for one year. He served in the Army from 1960-1962.

He married Charlotte Hofmann, a former resident of Rosalia, Washington. They met while she was teaching school in Clarkston, Washington. They were married June 29, 1968 in Rosalia.

He farmed with his father on the family farm located just north of Genesee. He is survived by his wife at the family home. Three daughters, Julie, 12, Cindy, 10 and Christa, 4, also survive him at the home. His parents, Jess and Pearl Johnson of Genesee along with his sister, Mrs. Jane Luke, Pasadena, California. Other survivors include two aunts, numerous cousins and his many, many friends.

He was a member of the Genesee Community Church serving as a Deacon and on various committees. He had served as a director on the Genesee Union Board for 6 years. Being a director and working with Bill and Mike and the rest of the Board was special to Jerry as they were all trying to make our Co-op better.

He had served as a Rural Fire Commissioner for 7 years. He thought we had one of the best volunteer fire departments around and was anxiously awaiting the arrival of the new fire truck. He was a past director of the Latah County Wheat Growers Association. He was a 4-H leader. He and his family enjoyed sports and were a member of the Genesee Booster Club. He had been a member of Lewiston Elks for 18 years.

Over 325 relatives and friends attended the memorial service at the Genesee Community Church on Sunday, June 13, 1982 at 2:00 p. m. "Reflections on a Life," and the Memorial Message were given by Pastor Roger Herndon. Mrs. Martin Stout was the organist and she also sang a solo, "What a Friend We Have in Jesus." Congregational Hymns included "How Great Thou Art" and "Blest Be the Tie That Binds." Some of the Deacons of the church served as ushers.

A private family burial was held on Friday, June 11 at 4:30 p. m. at the Genesee City Cemetery. Short's Funeral Home was in charge.

The family suggests that memorials be sent to the Genesee Community Church or the Genesee Ambulance Fund.

Jerry wanted those new storage facilities now going up at the East End warehouse of Genesee Union. He had voted for them, talked for them, worked for them, and was watching for the first signs of construction from his home across the Genesee Valley. There will soon be a new, quick-response fire truck available for the Genesee Rural Fire Protection District. That it will be here and helping to protect the farm families in the area is another tribute

Kendrick Pool Workers Hope For July 6 Opening

Plagued by several delays, officials of the J-K Recreation District cautiously voiced a hope that the Kendrick War Memorial Swimming Pool would be able to open for the summer session, Tuesday, July 6. An almost complete renovation of the pool will have occurred when this facility does open for use.

Included in the improvement program is an all-new water treatment unit, new bathhouse, new decks, and a new fence. Some of the costs estimates for the remodeling are \$82,000 for pool renovation (water treatment units, filters, plumbing, etc.), and \$52,000 for the bath houses and office building. In addition there is the cost of the fence, pool painting, etc. The district has a federal grant covering a 50-50 cost sharing, but the grant was made before some of the construction and material cost skyrocketed. The use of generous volunteer labor has greatly helped to keep some of the costs down. District officials said this week.

The three life guards who will be employed this summer: Teresa Howerton, Cynthia Millard and Lori Fray have already begun work getting the pool ready for painting. Once the pool is painted, the paint will need a week's curing time before water is put in. Once the pool is filled, the pool plumbing will need several days testing, and then, it is hoped, the pool will be ready for use.

This scaly thickening of the skin can develop in a small area on the face neck or elsewhere on the body. Only a doctor can determine whether an abnormal growth is benign pre-cancerous or malignant.
The next time you are out with your friends enjoying Idaho's weather and countryside—whether skiing, boating or fishing—look around you; someone in your group risks skin cancer.
The best time to get a tan is before 10 a. m. and after 3 p. m. when the ultra-violet rays are the weak-

est. The best sun screens are those that contain generous amounts of PABA (Para-aminobenzoic acid). These preparations absorb many of the ultra-violet rays and allows gradual tanning.
There are many ultra-violet rays present even on overcast days. The harmful rays are also reflected from sand, snow, sidewalks, and bright surfaces such as water. Hats will provide some protection, but a PABA skin protector is still recommended for prolonged exposures.

Fireworks Safety A Serious Matter

It has been recognized for some years that fireworks, for all their patriotic associations, present a very serious safety hazard, particularly for children. Deaths, blindings, amputations and severe burns have all too often, been the result of fireworks misuse.

A 40-year-old man lost a foot after a friend threw a silver salute at him and yelled. The victim stepped back onto the firecracker. A two-year-old's hand was partially amputated after he lit the fuse of an M-100, tried to extinguish it with his fingers and then could not get rid of the firecracker before it exploded.

The Consumer Product Safety Commission estimates that last year 9,242 persons were treated in hospital emergency rooms for fireworks injuries.

Fireworks should be used only with extreme caution. Used carelessly, they can cause painful, possibly severe injuries.

A 2-year-old boy received burns to an eye when he ran into an ignited hand fountain being held by his sister. A 5-year-old boy spent ten days in the hospital with burns after another small child ignited the sleeve of his shirt with a sparkler after an argument. The victim ran home, further spreading fire on his clothes.

Before using fireworks, make sure they are permitted in your area. Many states and local governments prohibit or limit Class C fireworks, which are the common fireworks and firecrackers sold for consumer use. In Idaho Class C fireworks are legal. Class C fireworks include the following:

Fountains, California candles, spike and handle cylindrical fountains, Roman candles, rockets with sticks, wheels, snakes, illuminating torches, sparklers, mines and shells, whistles without reports toy smoke devices and flitter devices, helicopter-type rockets, and firecrackers with no more than 50 mg. powder.

To help use fireworks more safely, the Idaho Bureau of Preventive Medicine offers the following recommendations:

—Do not allow younger children to play with fireworks under any circumstances. Remember that fireworks are not toys for children. The sparkler, considered by many the ideal "safe" firework for the young, burns at very high temperatures and can easily ignite clothing. Children cannot appreciate the danger involved and cannot act correctly in case of an emergency.

—If you permit older children to use fireworks, be sure they use them only under close adult supervision. Do not allow any running or horse play while they are being used.

—Before using any fireworks, read and follow all warning instructions printed on the label.

—Light fireworks outdoors in a clear area away from houses and flammable materials (gasoline cans, etc.).

—Keep a bucket of water nearby for emergencies and for dousing fireworks that don't go off.

—Do not try to relight or handle malfunction fireworks. Soak them with water and throw away.

—Be sure other people are out of range before lighting fireworks.

—Never ignite fireworks in a container especially a glass or metal container.

—Store fireworks in a dry cool place. Check instructions for special storage directions.

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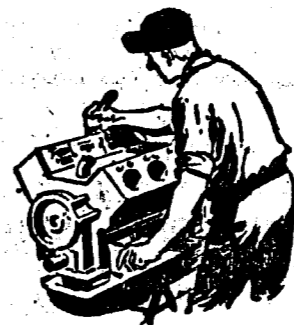
