Idaho Residential Building Still Down, Says First Security Report

The volume of residential building permits issued in May in Idaho continued the trend of the previous four months, remaining more than 40 percent below last year, said James Hoogland, Jr., manager, quoting the May Idaho Construction Report, a publication of First Security Bank of Idaho, N. A. The report, edited by Dr. Kelly K. Matthews, vice president and economist for First Security Corporation, will be distributed this week.

There is no evidence yet appearing to suggest that an upturn has begun in the construction industry. Long-term interest and mortgage rates remain firm at levels far above those which would find general acceptance in the marketplace.

Total construction value for authorized building permit construction in 54 major Idaho locations in May was \$22,753,176, or 18.5 percent below 1981. New residential construction for 189 dwelling units totaled \$7,307,226, a decrease of 42.0 percent in number and a decrease of 47.1 percent in value compared with a year ago.

Nonresidential construction valued at \$8,080,234 was up 0.6 percent above last year, while alterations and repairs totaling \$7,365,716 were up 21.4 percent.

The announcement was made by Bishop Melvin G. Talbert during the sessions of the 109th Pacific Northwest Annual Conference of The United Methodist Church.

Sessions of the Annual Conference have been held on the campus of Whitworth College, Spokane, Washington, June 16 through Sunday, June 20, with approximately 900 voting members present. Bishop Talbert serves as the Conference's presiding officer, as well as holding responsibility for appointing ministers to their places of service.

The Pacific Northwest Conference is composed of some 270 churches served by over 250 pastors in the states of Washington and North Idaho. Total membership reported at the end of 1981 was 84,169, a gain of 24 over the previous year. In addition, approximately 50 clergy are appointed to ministries beyond the local church, including hospital and military chaplaincies, seminary and university faculties, missionary service and certain recognized institutions.

Nutrition and Aging

Aristotle believed that a man reaches the perfect pinnacle of his life, his golden mean, at 49—a pretty ripe old age in those days. At 49, Aristotle reasoned, a man attains the apex of his spiritual and intellectual development.

Of course, he probably can't do nearly the number of push-ups he could have at 19.

Most of us become less physically active as we grow older. Consequently our energy needs drop. In fact, a man in his 70s may consume 40 percent fewer calories than he did in his 20s—and yet not lose any weight. That's because he's not burning off those calories the way he did 50 years ago.

Though caloric needs decrease as we grow older, our need for balanced nutrition doesn't. Like his teenage counterpart, the octogenarian must eat a variety of foods to get the protein, carbohydrates, fat, vitamins and minerals required for optimal health.

However, the elderly do have a few nutrition concerns of their own. One is getting enough fiber—or roughage—in their diet to counter constipation, a rather common problem among older persons. Good sources of fiber are fresh fruits, fresh vegetables, whole grain cereals and whole grain breads. Drinking enough fluids—at least four to eight glasses daily—and exercising regularly are also important factors in relieving constipation.

Another concern as we grow older is a disease called osteoporosis. Resulting in thin, brittle bones that break easily and heal slowly, osteoporosis has been linked with calcium deficiency. That's why it's important for older persons to include two daily servings from the milk group in their diet.

Protein deficiency is also fairly common among senior citizens. One reason is that complete protein sources often take the form of meat. And, for some of us, chewing meat can be quite a task. Such persons need to prepare meat in more palatable ways—in stews or soups, for instance. Also, keep in mind the "soft" sources of complete protein—eggs, milk and cheese—as occasional meat substitutes.

You don't have to be a dietitian to realize the lifelong importance of balanced nutrition. Likewise, you

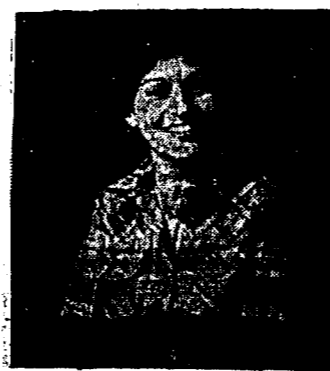

**Gleaning to be
Subject of Meetings**

The Idaho Hunger Action Council will sponsor two local meetings for people who are interested in gleaning this growing season. Mary Hunter, representative of the Boise based agency in this area said that the present economic conditions, gleaning should be both successful and beneficial this year.

Gleaning is the act of going into the field, orchard or garden after the grower has completed his harvest, and recovering the produce which is not going to be harvested. It is then shared by the gleaner with someone who is eligible for the program, but who is unable to glean for a variety of reasons.

Hunter's program is geared for low income people, which she states "includes a lot more people than just those who are getting welfare benefits." Even those who do not consider themselves low income are invited to attend the meetings however. Growers in the area are also invited to attend to learn the benefits of the program to them.

The first meeting will be held in Moscow on June 23 at 3 p.m. It will be in the meeting room at the county courthouse. The second meeting will be held on June 24 at Lewiston at 3:30 p.m. at the Health and Welfare Building, 1118 F Street in the third floor conference room. Last year in Idaho, over 75,000 tons of food were gleaned. The majority of the work was done in Southern Idaho, with Coeur d'Alene also having a program. This is the first year that such a program has been organized in this area said Hunter.

**Controlled Hunt Regulations
Corrected for 3 Elk Units**

Some inadvertent errors have cropped up in 1982 controlled hunt regulations and corrections involve three elk hunts and the fees listed for archery and muzzle loader stamps.

A Department of Fish and Game spokesman said elk controlled hunts 237-1 and 237-2 east and south of Challis should specify 'antlered-only' hunting, instead of 'antlerless' hunting October 6 through 24.

The remainder of the season in both hunts, for either sex, is October 25 through 31. The two hunts each have 15 permits.

Hunt 213 west of White Bird with a season from October 20 through 31 for either sex will have 80 permits, instead of the 35 listed in the printed regulations.

And the fees for archery and muzzle loader stamps are \$5.50 each, instead of \$4.50 as the regulations show.

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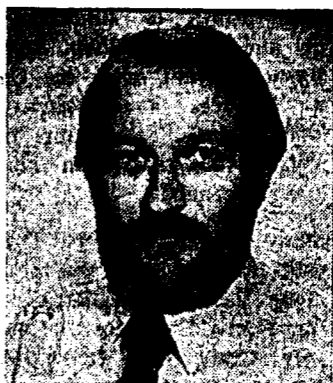

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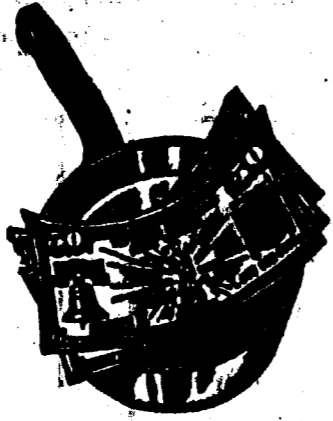
