



### these amino acids, 14 (13 for infants) are produced by your body. The other eight (or nine) must come directly from food.





### **Keep Kids Curious**

Learning is a complex process and children, like the rest of us, are complex creatures. One way kids learn -though certainly not the only way is by imitating behavior. Thus when kids imitate their parents, they sometimes learn a behavior a

That includes eating habits. Often a child will pass up a nutritious vegetable like spinach simply because "Dad never eats it." Or reject a protein-packed meat like liver amino acids found in meat and other because "Mom doesn't like it." Later, the child may actually come to believe he doesn't like the taste of these foods-even though he has never tried them. This is how food prejudices begin.

To grow strong and healthy, kids need a variety of nutrients. To get these nutrients, they need to eat a variety of foods. And, left to their own nature, they usually will-because are wonderfuly curious and ever eager for new experiences. Unfortunately, we adults, who have had years to develop our narrowmindedness, often dampen that curiosity and 'eagerness.

How can parents help their children stay naturally inquisitive to

First, encourage tasting by example. You don't necessarily have to shovel everything from the table onto your pate, but why not at least sample each food? This shows your child that learning involves firsthand experimenting. It also shows your child that you, as a parent, are still willing to learn.

If one parent simply cannot stand the taste of a particular food, introduce your child to the food when that parent is not at the meal. This lets the chid taste and freely decide for himself.

Second, don't give up on a food because your child at first rejects it. Instead make a mental note to serve it again someday, prepared in a different manner. By the same token don't offer to fix your kid another meal if he turns up his nose at the one you've prepared. Let him experience the logical consequences of his decision. This, too, is part of the complex learning process.

Last, serve a variety of foods, but choose them from the four food groups-milk, meat, fruits, and vegetables, grains. This shows your child that there is both theme and diversity in a balanced diet.

## **Nutritious Pots**

### And Pans?

For many years, there was a popular old wives' tale that said one way to get iron in your diet was by cooking foods in-you guessed it iron pots and pans.

Ironic. Ironic, that is, that research later bore out a certain amount of merit to this common belief. There actually is a slight increase in the iron content of foods when cooked in iron utensils—sort of an incidental mineral enrichment.

If course, the best way to get this vital nutrient is-and always has been-from food. Good sources are liver, eggs, red meat, prune juice and dried beans and peas.

And what role does this mineral play in your health?

We need iron to produce hemoglobin, an important component of red blood cells. Iron gives these cells the ability to pick up oxygen from your lungs and carry it to other body cells, which need the oxygen to release energy.

Persons with iron deficiencies, consequently, have trouble getting enough oxygen to their cells. That's why they're always tired, easily fatigued, short of breath and usually pale as sheets..

Your body contains about 3 to 5 grams of iron. Most of that amount is present in your blood. The rest is stored in your liver, spleen and bone marrow.

Since iron is not broken down or used up by your body, it's remarkably reusable. Still, you lose some of this mineral every day and, thus, need to replace it.

An adult male needs about one mg. of iron per day. Menstruating and lactating women, however, have a higher iron requirement. So do pregnant women. This increased requirement may not always be met in even a well-balanced diet. In such cases, a physician may recommend an iron supplement

Otherwise, your best bet for getting the iron—and all the other nutrients-you need is eating a variety of foods from the four food groups.

### Danger to Babies: The Smoking Parent

Pregnant mothers who smoke can injure the unborn children. How and why a mother's smoking can harm the fetus or threaten the baby's respiratory system after the child is born is explained in the booklet "Smoking and the Two of You" published by the American Lung Association.

When a pregnant mother smokes harmful gases from the smoke enter the blood and pass through the placenta directly into her baby's circulatory system. These gases narrow the baby's blood vessels and those in the placenta, and they force oxygen out of the red blood cells of mother and baby-cutting down the amounts of badly-needed oxygen and food that are delivered to the developing child.

Women who smoke while pregnant have a higher percentage of stillborn babies, spontaneous abortions and premature deliveries than do women who don't smoke and their babies are more likely to be born undersized or to die soon after birth,

After birth, breathing smoke-fill-

ed air can cause a baby's tiny airways and lungs to constrict, blocking or impairing the child's breathing. And because babies and young children breathe much faster than adults, they inhale more pollution in proportion to their total body
