## Residential Construction Still In Doldrums, Says Bank Newsletter

The negative spread in current residential construction activity in Idaho relatives to a year ago narrowed in June, said James J. Hoogland, Jr. and Roselle Robinson, managers, quoting the June Idaho Construction Report, a publication of First Security Bank of Idaho N. A.

The number of permits for new dwelling units rose moderately above the May 1982 totals but construction activity measured by dollar volumes remained essentially unchanged from the previous month. In addition, there are very few indications in the nation's financial markets which would suggest lower mortgage rates anytime soon.

Total construction value for authorized building permit construction in 54 major Idaho locations in June was \$19,829,085 or 46.2 percent below 1981. New residential construction for 217 dwelling units totaled \$7,895,761 a decrease of 18.1 percent in number and a decrease of 40.9 percent in value compared with a year ago.

## High Wheat Production Is Forecast

Winter wheat production is forecast at a record high of 2.12 billion bushels, up 1 percent from the 1981 crop but fractionally below a month earlier.

Barley production is forecast at a record high 479 million bushels, fractionally above the previous record high set last year.

Oats production is forecast at 580 million bushels, 14 percent above last year and up 27 percent from 1980.

Apple production is forecast at 8.56 billion pounds, 1 percent above last year's crop but 3 percent below 1980.

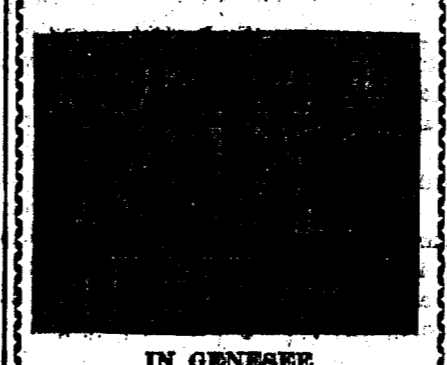

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**Idaho Farmers Growing Record Barley Crop**

Idaho farmers are expected to harvest a record 64.4 million bushels of barley this year. July 1 conditions indicate the crop will be 2% greater than last year and 9 percent above 1980. A record 1,110,000 acres is expected to be harvested

while yields are forecast at 58 bushels, down 1 bushel from last year and 9 bushels below the record 67 bushel yield of 1980.

Winter wheat production for 1982 is forecast at 46.9 million bushels, down 16 percent from last year and 10 percent below 1980. Acres expected to be harvested are down 40,000 from last year while the yield

at 51 bushels would be 7 bushels below last year.

Oat production is estimated at 3.0 million bushels, up 7 percent from last year.

Apple production is expected to total 125 million pounds, compared with 135 million pounds last year. Cherry production is forecast at 2,400 tons compared with 3,10 tons in 1981.

butions from applicants for controlled hunt permits, are looking for ways to short up their reward fund, according to president Dennis Gratton.

"We will be calling upon businesses, organizations and individuals to help strengthen our anti-poaching efforts," Gratton said.

"Our principal source of revenue has come from controlled hunt applicants who checked off all or part of any refund due to prepayment of permit or tag fees. But the state of the economy leads me to believe that CAP will be getting fewer contributions from the checkoff this year," he added.

In 1981, its first year of operation CAP offered \$25,550 in rewards to persons who reported illegal fish and game activity that resulted in arrests. Slightly more than one arrest per call and a 97 percent conviction rate were recorded by the Department of Fish and Game.

"We must help keep the reward fund solvent," Gratton said.

A \$10 membership entitles an individual to a wallet-size membership card, a CAP window decal and bumper sticker and a vote at CAP meetings. Tax-reductive contributions can be addressed to Citizens Against Poaching P. O. Box 7533, P. O. Box 7533, Boise, Idaho 83707. Gratton said.

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### Back to School Time Dot Not Have to be Disease Time

Very soon school bells will ring and children will be going back to classes. Unfortunately, the vaccine preventable childhood diseases which include measles, rubella (German measles), mumps, polio, diphtheria, pertussis (whooping cough) and tetanus (lockjaw), could be attending school with them. With the exception of tetanus, these diseases when introduced into the school environment may spread very rapidly. Most children who catch them will miss several days of school, and some may suffer serious consequences such as blindness, deafness, mental retardation and in rare cases, some may even die.

Children can be protected against these diseases through immunizations. Modern vaccines have been proved to be safe and effective in preventing these diseases. The Id-

aho Legislature felt strongly that children should be protected against these diseases. They passed a law in 1978 requiring children attending Idaho schools, kindergarten through fifth grades, to be immunized unless there were medical, religious or personal reasons that the parents had for not immunizing their children. Parents should check to see if they have a record of their children's immunizations and that the immunizations are up to date. If a parent cannot locate immunization records for their children, they should check with their physician or health clinic where they obtained their children's immunizations.

If the children's immunizations are not up to date, or a parent has questions about immunizations, they should check with their physician or local district health department. Let's make this a disease free year for our school children.

## Pests and Weeds And You

Poisons that control pests and weeds can be important tools to help maintain comfortable living, protect property and to reduce time and labor for a beautiful lawn and effective garden. Pests like disease carrying or plant-carrying insects, noxious or poisonous weeds, plant diseases, rats and mice are age old competitors for our food, fiber and shelter. But, if you use pesticides plan carefully to keep exposure of other living things to a minimum and to protect your environment.

Herbicides and insecticides are the most commonly used pesticides, they have different degrees of human hazards and different potentials for harm to the environment.

Each year, several hundred accidents involving pesticides and herbicides are reported to health officials in Idaho.

Pesticide poisoning may occur through the mouth, skin, or lungs and can best be prevented by reducing exposure to the mouth or skin. Pesticides are often swallowed when one tries to syphon from one container to another. Accidental spills may result in exposure to the skin or breathing-in chemical dust or fumes. If pesticides accidentally enter one's mouth, it should be rinsed at once with large amounts of water. Remove contaminated clothing and wash exposed areas with soap and water as soon as possible to reduce poison to the skin.

Pesticide poisoning may produce a variety of symptoms, depending on the type of pesticides, route and duration of exposure. Some pesticides such as the organophosphorus insecticide (e. g., malathion, parathion, phorate), are much more toxic than others.

Although they may vary, the most common early symptoms of pesticide poisoning include sweating, headache, nausea, vomiting, and blurred vision. Depending on the duration of exposure, symptoms usually appear within 1 to 3 hours.

The chemicals used as active ingredients in insecticides, usually act by disrupting the insect nervous system or by blocking oxygen use. Because these processes are vital to all animals and humans, insecticides are generally more hazardous than herbicides. As a result, excessive exposure to insecticides can effect more than unwanted insects and pests.

The best information regarding pesticide use is found on the label. Label information includes direction for the proper use and storage of the chemical as well as emergency first aid measures. Pesticides should always be mixed and applied as described on the label and stored in their original containers out of the reach of children. No pesticides

should be used without first reading the label.

Additional information is available from retailers, pest control operators, local district health departments and University of Idaho Extension personnel.

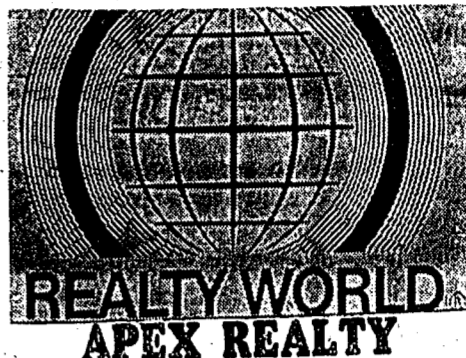


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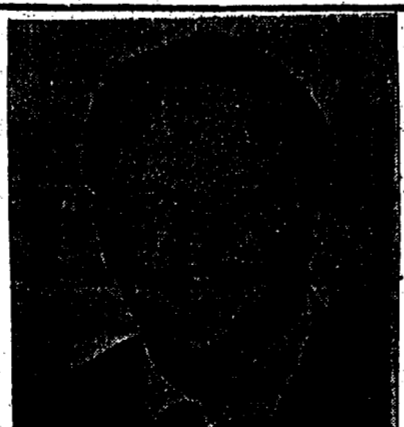

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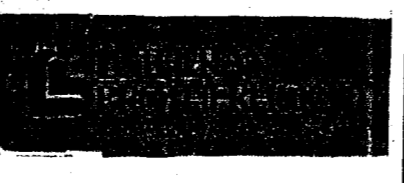

### Frequency of Animal Bites Increases During Summer

Animal bites are most often encountered during the summer months. Animals associated with bites include domestic animals (cats and dogs), wild animals (skunks, bats, foxes, coyotes, raccoons and snakes) and other animals (livestock, rodents and rabbits).

A biting animal can inflict injury in one of several ways. The local trauma associated with an animal bite involves damage to the tissues and may result in a bacterial infection. The possibility of contracting rabies following an animal bite must be considered when the biting animal might be infected with rabies. Children are more likely to be bitten by animals than adults. Children are often victims of animal bites because of their uninhibited playing near animals and their tendency to tease the animal. Jugglers, letter carriers, meter readers, police officers, and cyclists often

have encounters with animals that may result in a bite.

During the past 18 years, the only animals in Idaho known to be infected with rabies have been bats. Last year seven rabid bats were identified in Idaho. These bats were obtained from all areas of the state. No documented case of human rabies has occurred as a result of an animal bite in Idaho. Although rabies may infect domestic animals and wildlife, no significant spread of the disease in animals other than bats have been documented in Idaho.

Persons bitten by a bat should seek immediate and thorough local treatment of all bite wounds and scratches. The wound should be thoroughly cleaned and flushed with soap and water as soon as possible. This is probably the most effective preventive measure that can be taken. Tetanus prophylaxis and antibiotics to prevent bacterial infection may be indicated. Every exposure to a possibly rabid animal must be evaluated individually. Primary consideration must be given to the fact that treatment is rarely if ever, of value once the clinical signs of rabies becomes apparent. If the physician recommends treatment, treatment should begin immediately.

If the animal involved in the bite is a domestic cat or dog, the animal should be captured and observed for ten days for signs of rabies. If signs of rabies develop, the animal's brain may be tested to determine if the animal is affected by rabies. If a non-domesticated animal involved in the bite can be captured, it is recommended that the animal be submitted to the laboratory for testing. If the animal is not infected with rabies, no treatment with rabies vaccine would be indicated. If the animal is infected with rabies, treatment with rabies vaccine and rabies immune globulin is recommended.

Treatment of persons exposed to a rabid animal has changed dramatically during the past five years. Only five doses of rabies vaccine and one dose of rabies immune globulin are currently recommended. Both products are injected into the upper arm. The rabies immune globulin provides immediate protection until the body can produce specific antibodies to the rabies vaccine. Rabies vaccine is given on days 0, 3, 7, 14 and 21.

Rabies vaccine has fewer adverse reactions than earlier vaccines for rabies.

### Drinking and Driving: A Major Cause of Death In Idaho

Accidents are the leading cause of death in Idaho among persons ages one to forty-four. In 1980, there were 605 accidental deaths in Idaho; 351 of these were associated with motor vehicle accidents. In the 15-24 age group, there were 202 death from all causes, and exactly half of these 101 deaths were related to motor vehicle accidents. In some years in the young adult age group, there are more deaths from motor vehicle accidents than all other causes combined.

State law requires the Department of Health and Welfare to test blood samples from drivers killed in motor vehicle accidents. The law also requires that these blood samples are to be tested for alcohol, narcotics, and other dangerous drugs. The years indicates that approximately data collected during the past few 60% of Idaho drivers killed in motor vehicle accidents had alcohol in their blood at the time of the accident. There were nearly 10,000 arrests of drunken drivers in Idaho

during 1982. A roadside survey recently conducted on Highway 21 between Boise and Idaho City indicated that approximately one-third of all the drivers using this highway on a Saturday evening had been drinking.

Each year many innocent people are killed and injured in automobile accidents involving a driver who has been drinking.

This problem is being addressed by many groups and organizations in Idaho. The 1983 Idaho Legislature will be asked to pass laws specifying stiffer penalties for people who insist on driving after they have been drinking. Stricter laws may help; however, it is apparent that the law enforcement people and other responsible officials can only move as far and as fast as the public will allow. The problem will not be solved until drinking and driving becomes socially unacceptable behavior.
