Lewiston Woman Killed, Four Injured When Aircraft Crashed in Southwick Field

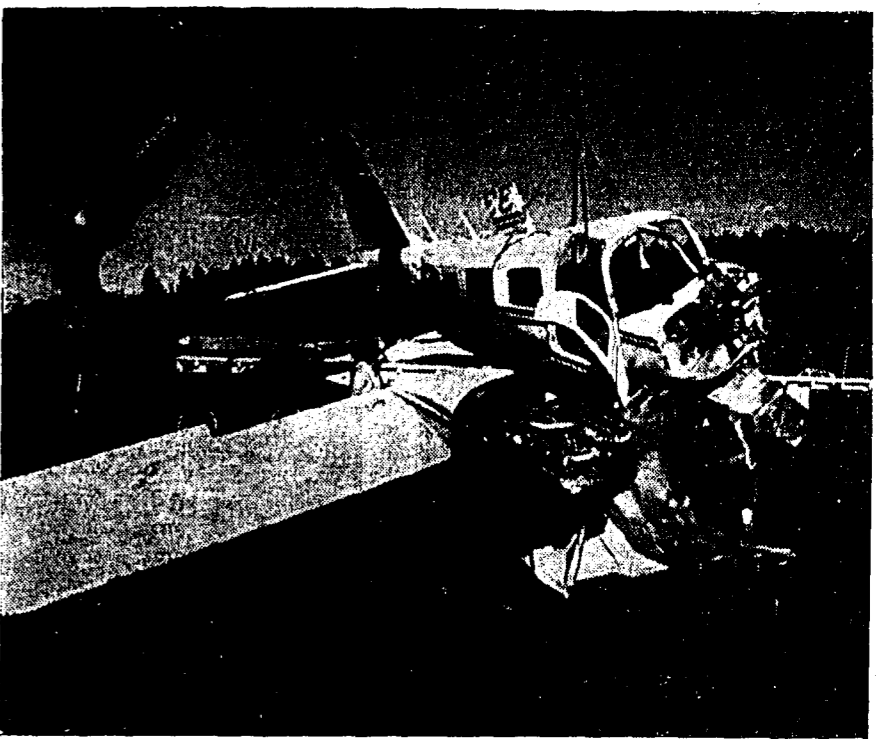

The morning of July 21 at approximately 10 a. m., a Piper Seneca II made a forced landing on the Bob Kimbly property near Southwick, on Three Bear Road. The plane was on route to Lewiston from Kalispell, Montana, when it ran out of fuel. The Lewiston based plane had five passengers aboard . . . four men and one woman. The woman died at the scene of the accident.

Jake Welsh was at the Kimbly ranch working in the hay. He watched as the plane flew in from the East and began losing altitude. The

plane landed right side up. Jake said the twin engine plane seemed to just drop straight down into the barley field. The plane was completely out of gas, so it did not burn or explode on impact, as it was thought possible. The persons on board were unconscious when Jake arrived only minutes later. The men began to regain consciousness and two of them gave him their names. All were in critical condition. Another plane in the area followed the distressed plane to the crash site.

Jake called to Bob who was at the house, to call an ambulance as soon as he saw the plane was about to crash.

There was a certain amount of confusion as to the exact location of the accident. The local ridges of Bear Ridge, Texas Ridge and even Park were all named in the confusion of locating the Three Bear Road.

An ambulance from Orofino and another from Kendrick reported to the scene of the crash. (It was determined that this area is in the Orofino District). Two helicopters also reported to the accident and took the injured men to Lewiston and Spokane.

Investigators and policemen arrived shortly after the news was out. The radios began reporting the news soon afterwards. One radio station reported only four persons total, when actually there were five in all. Two men were seated in the first two seats, the woman was seated on the left side of the second row, and the remaining two men in the last two seats.

Onlookers, reporters, investigators, neighbors and passerbys all stopped to view the crash site. As the information leaked out, it was hoped that the injured would recover, even though in a serious condition. There was talk of the sympathy felt for the families of the injured and deceased. There was the natural curiosity to find out who they all were and where they were all from. It was determined that the crash victim was Marjorie Wood. Her husband, Burton and two sons on board along with their mechanic, Steve Johnson. All were from Lewiston. Another son, Craig operates the family business in Kalispell, Montana. The Wood family and passenger had left there earlier the same day.

The radios broadcasted that Mrs. Wood was the pilot. This simply not true, according to the partner-owner of the plane Mr. Bruce Sweeney of Lewiston. He reported to this correspondent at the crash site that he had warned Mr. Wood of the fuel shortage, and reminded him to be sure and refuel before take off. Apparently he did not. Mr. Sweeney also stated that in the position of seating that Mr. Wood was not the pilot, but rather their son, Steve. For some reason the most critically injured and the least critical men (at this writing) were in the two rear seats: Mark Wood and Steve Johnson. Mr. Sweeney said he believed that Mrs. Wood died from a broken neck.

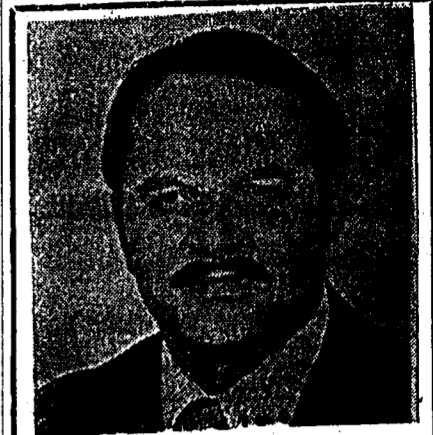

PROHIBITED FROM DISCHARGE INTO THE WASTEWATER TREATMENT SYSTEM EXCEPT BY SPECIAL AGREEMENT, THAT PRIOR APPROVAL MUST BE OBTAINED PRIOR TO THE DISCHARGE OF INDUSTRIAL WASTEWATER, THAT SANITARY FACILITIES BE REQUIRED, THAT PREMISES MUST BE CONNECTED TO PUBLIC SEWER WITH SPECIFIC EXCEPTIONS, THAT A PERMIT MUST BE OBTAINED PRIOR TO THE REPAIR OF PRIVATE SEWER, THAT A PERMIT IS REQUIRED PRIOR TO CONNECTING TO A PUBLIC SEWER AND THE PROCEDURE FOR ACQUIRING SUCH PERMITS, THAT A PERMIT MAY BE REVOKED, THAT NOTICE FOR INSPECTION AND INSTALLATION BY THE APPROVING AUTHORITY MUST BE GIVEN, THAT SEWER CONSTRUCTION BE DONE IN ACCORDANCE WITH CITY SPECIFICATIONS AND SUBJECT TO INSPECTION, THAT CERTAIN CITY SPECIFICATIONS BE FOLLOWED THAT THE APPROVING AUTHORITY IS AUTHORIZED TO CONDUCT INSPECTIONS, THAT INJURY TO THE SEWERAGE SYSTEM IS UNLAWFUL, THAT PRETREATMENT OF CERTAIN WASTES MAY BE NECESSARY THAT ALL PERTINENT INFORMATION RELATING TO PROPOSED PRETREATMENT BE MADE TO THE APPROVING AUTHORITY, THAT THE APPROVING AUTHORITY MAY PROHIBIT THE DISCHARGE OF NONCOMPLYING SEWAGE, THAT PERSONS DESIRING TO DISCHARGE INDUSTRIAL WASTE FILE A REPORT WITH THE APPROVING AUTHORITY INCLUDING DATA RELATING TO THE WASTE TO BE DISCHARGED, THAT PERSONS DISCHARGING INDUSTRIAL WASTE MAY BE REQUIRED TO CONSTRUCT AND MAINTAIN A FLOW MEASUREMENT AND SAMPLING STATION THAT INDUSTRIAL WASTE SAMPLES SHALL BE COLLECTED FOR TESTING, THAT SEWER FEES ARE ESTABLISHED, THAT PARTIAL INVALIDITY SHALL NOT AFFECT THE VALIDITY OF THE ENTIRE CHAPTER, THAT ANY PERSON WHO VIOLATES ANY PROVISION OF THIS CHAPTER SHALL BE GUILTY OF A MISDEMEANOR AND UPON CONVICTION THEREOF SHALL BE PUNISHABLE BY A FINE OF NOT TO EXCEED THREE HUNDRED DOLLARS (\$300.00) OR BY IMPRISONMENT IN THE COUNTY JAIL FOR NOT TO EXCEED SIX (6) MONTHS OR BY BOTH SUCH FINE AND IMPRISONMENT, THAT PERSONS VIOLATING THIS CHAPTER SHALL BE ISSUED A COMPLAINT AND SUMMONS TO APPEAR IN COURT, THAT FAILURE TO APPEAR SHALL BE UNLAWFUL, THAT CITY EMPLOYEES SHALL ASCERTAIN THE AUTHORITY OF PERSONS ENGAGED IN ACTIVITY INVOLVING ANY SEWER, AND PROVIDING FOR AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

SECTION 3.3.25: SEWER FEES: The Approving Authority shall establish sewer fees which shall be imposed, levied and fixed to be effective from and after approval by resolution duly adopted at a regular or special meeting of the City Council. Said sewer fees shall include but are not limited to the following:
A. Sewer Tap Fee

B. Road Repair Fee
It shall be noted that the "Sewer Tap Fee" shall include installation of the sewer wye or tee, and pipe tap only. The "Road Repair Fee" is a non-refundable deposit against future repairs on streets disturbed by the owner during installation of the private sewer line. See also Section 8-10-15.
In the event the industrial users fail to have flow or sampling devices in proper operating condition for more than one week, the Approving Authority may discontinue City water service or remove or close sewer connections, and enter upon the property for accomplishing such purposes.
The expense of such discontinuance, removal, or closing as well as the expense of restoring service, is a debt due the City and may be recovered by legal action against the sewer user.
The specific provision providing a penalty for violation of the ordinance is as follows:
§3.3.27: PENALTIES: Any person who violates any provision of this chapter shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof, shall be punishable by a fine of not to exceed three hundred dollars (\$300.00) or by imprisonment in the County Jail for not to exceed six (6) months or both such fine and imprisonment. Each day that such violation continues shall be deemed to be a separate offense.

SECTION 3. This Ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage, approval and publication as required by the State of Idaho.

Hunting, Fishing License Sales Show Increase

Americans who hunted and fished last year spent a record \$455 million for licenses, tags, permits and stamps, according to a U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service report.

Total income was \$37 million above 1980 totals. It included \$242 million for fishing licenses—a \$17 million increase from the previous year, the record showed.

Number of hunting license holders in the United States totaled 16,638,584 and the report also listed 29,277,241 fishing license holders.

The Fish and Wildlife Service uses the number of license holders to determine amounts allocated to the states under the Federal Aid in Fish and Wildlife Restoration programs. Each state is reimbursed for up to 75 percent of the costs of approved projects that benefit fish and wildlife resources. For the current

EARLY CHUKAR SEASON TO OPEN AUGUST 1

Idaho's early chukar partridge season—designed to add a game bird or so to the menu for those who float the Middle Fork and the Main Salmon rivers—opens August 1 and runs through September 7.

"It's not a hunting area for vehicles and dogs," said a Department of Fish and Game spokesman. "The birds are scattered in a roadless area, but the season does allow a limited harvest of chukars."

Department regulations set the area along the Main Salmon within one-half mile of the river from the mouth of Sheep Creek upstream to the mouth of Horse Creek. On the

federal fiscal year which ends September 30, \$147 million has been apportioned to the states.

Middle Fork chukar hunting is legal within one-half mile of the stream from its mouth upstream to the mouth of Indian Creek.

Hunters are allowed to use a "shotgun, rifle or pistol, including an air rifle or air pistol." The daily bag limit is eight chukars—possession limit is 16.
