

There was the natural curiosity to find out who they all were and where they were all from. It was detennined that the crash victim was Marjorie Wood. Her husband, Burton and two sons on board along with their mechanic, Steve Johnson. All were from Lewiston. Another son, Craig operates the family business in Kalispell, Montana. The Wood family and passenger had left there earlier the same day. The radios broadcasted that Mrs. Wood was the pilot. 'This simply not true, according to the partnerowner of the plane Mr. Druce Sweeney of Lewiston. He reported to this correspondent at the crash site that he had warned Mr. Wood of the fuel shortage, and reminded him to be sure and refuel before take off. Apparently he did not. Mr. Sweeney also stated that in the position of seating that Mr. Wood was not the pilot, but rather their son, Steve. For some reason the most critically injured and the least critical men (at this writing) were in the two rear seats: Mark Wood and Steve Johnson. Mr. Sweeney said he believed that Mrs. Wood died from a broken neck.








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
