Rain Stalls Harvest Again

Harvesting of the 1982 small grain crop in this area was again delayed this week when a moderate to heavy rain fell for almost two hours early Tuesday evening. Strong winds accompanied the thunderstorm in some sections.

A similar rain storm last Tuesday evening had caused a delay in the harvest but most farmers had been able to get back into the fields within two days and had the peas pretty well past the peak and were just getting a good start on wheat then this Tuesday rain fell.

Bill Wood, manager of Genesee Union Warehouse, estimated Tuesday afternoon (before the rain) that peas expected by the Genesee Co-op were about 85 percent in. Wood said the wheat was just getting started. No barley had come in as of Tuesday afternoon. The manager said company records showed about 190,000 bushels of wheat had been taken by noon Tuesday, which he estimated was about 5 percent of what was expected.

Harvest operations were "good" reported Dean Brocke at Brocke and Sons in Kendrick Tuesday afternoon (also before the rain). Dean said the firm was taking in peas and rape seed and that most of the early variety of peas were "pretty well done." Harvesting of the rape seed was also coming along well by those farmers delivering to Brocke and Sons. Dean said both the quality and quantity of this year's pea crop looks good, adding that "maybe it's slightly below last year's yield."

MaryBelle Larson, one of the managers at Kendrick Rochdale said mostly wheat is coming into that Kendrick Co-op and this year's crop looks good. She said one sampling of barley was brought in Tuesday but tested too green.

"Rolling right along" was the way Howard Hoffman, manager of the Lewiston Grain Growers Kendrick warehouse described the harvest before the Tuesday rain. Both wheat and barley were being taken in at LGG Tuesday with the barley coming in mostly from the lower Potlatch Ridge. Peas are pretty well done, Hoffman said.

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Tuition and/or Fees Up 20 Percent Nationally and Up 4 Percent in Idaho

Moscow—Tuition and fees nationally this fall will be 20 percent higher than last year at public universities and colleges, to an average cost of \$979 a year, according to figures from the August 4 "Chronicle of Higher Education."

In Idaho, fees went up 4 percent to an average of \$646 a year for the state's three public universities, four-year college, and two junior colleges, according to figures in the "Chronicle" which listed 1982-83 tuition and fees for 3,300 postsecondary institutions in the nation.

Idaho is said to have a constitutional prohibition against charging tuition to pay for direct instructional costs to Idaho residents. Student fees are used for various support activities connected with running an institution and providing classes. Tuition is charged to non-resident students, however.

Nationally private college tuition and fees are up 13 percent according to the "Chronicle" article which derived its figures from a survey by the College Scholarship Service. It includes all increases announced before June 1.

Fees at the state's six public higher education institutions for 1982-83 are, at the University of Idaho, \$716, up from \$690; at Idaho State University, \$705, up from \$680; at Boise State University, \$701, up from \$689; Lewis-Clark State College, \$640, up from \$600; College of Southern Idaho, \$586 from \$541 and North Idaho College \$530, unchanged from last year.

Tuition at the state's private schools for 1982-83 is, at Rick's College, \$1,140, up from \$1,020 last year; at Northwest Nazarene, \$3,480, up from \$3,165; and at the College of Idaho, \$4,600, up from \$3,980. Tuition at private schools frequently includes room and board costs.

UI Students Register August 24

Moscow—The date for fall registration at the University of Idaho, August 24 is approaching fast.

New students can obtain their registration materials Sunday, Aug. 22, from 8:30 a. m. to noon and from 1 to 4:30 p. m. in the Reserve Book Room at the UI Library. Returning students will be given their materials, Monday, August 23, at the dean's office of their major college. Information about locations of registration materials and other registration details is contained in a first-semester brochure available at the registrar's office.

All students will meet with their academic advisors for pre-registration advising on Monday, Aug. 23.

One-day registration will be conducted Tuesday, Aug. 24, in the Kibbie Dome from 8 a. m. to 5 p. m., with students admitted to register on a schedule prepared by last names. A list of initials and times is contained in the first semester brochure and is being published by area media. Registration procedures are essentially unchanged from other years.

The University of Idaho Board of Regents has approved a temporary fee increase of \$50 to offset a 9 percent reduction in budget ordered by Gov. John Evans for the coming year. Fall semester fee at UI for full-time students will be \$408. Non-resident students will pay an addi-

Southern Idaho Hen Pheasant Season Proposed for 1982

Pheasant hunters for the first time since 1974 will have a reason for hens the last five days of the season in southwestern Idaho this year if the Fish and Game Commission approves during its meeting in Boise August 16-17.

The Department of Fish & Game proposed calls for a daily bag limit of four birds with no more than one hen and a possession limit of six with no more than one hen December 1 through December 5.

South of the Salmon River, the pheasant season opens at noon October 23 and runs through December 5, pending commission approval. In northern Idaho, the proposed dates are October 9 through November 26 and the noon opening would not apply.

Commissioners will be establishing seasons and regulations for Upland game, migratory birds and trapping August 17. They have scheduled a public meeting August 16 in the department's Boise headquarters building, 600 South Walnut Street, starting at 7:30 p. m.

The recommendation for a pheasant hen season was prompted by populations that have been increasing in the region over the past three years, according to state game bird manager Dick Norell, and the surplus makes a limited number of hens available.

Southern Idaho hen seasons were allowed in the 1960's and the early 1970's, but they were discontinued after 1974 when numbers started to decline, Norell said.

Last year, the department's questionnaire data showed a harvest of 502,500 pheasants, the highest since 1971 and 34 percent above the previous five-year average.

The recommended season opener for both ducks and geese is October 9, except for the usual delayed opening for goose hunting in six Magic Valley counties where the season would open October 23.

An added 14 days are proposed for the goose season in the northeast corner of Fremont County. Norell said geese have shown good production in the area and a longer season should not affect the population.

Three days would be added to the goose season in southern Idaho extending the closing date to January 2. And the David Thompson Game Preserve in Boundary County would be opened for migratory waterfowl hunting this year, Norell added.

He said the forecast for fall flights indicates that there will be fewer ducks coming down from the north this year. Production from nesting areas in southern Canada could be off as much as 30 percent, although areas this side of the border were higher than last year's levels.

Goose production in Alberta, Canada, is down from 1981, but up in most other nesting areas. Water conditions in Idaho have been favorable for waterfowl nesting this year, except where high water flooded Canada goose nests on some waterways, Norell said.

Changes in 1982-83 trapping regulations include a proposal to start off seasons an hour earlier on opening day. The Idaho Trapper's Association had asked for seasons starting two hours earlier, but the department said this would be too early for daylight on some openings.

The pursuit-only season for bobcat and lynx, February 10 through February 28, would be continued following its initiation last year.

Winter Feeding Costs

Emergency big game feeding and deprecation costs during Idaho's severe 1981-82 winter totaled \$166,600 a Department of Fish and Game spokesman reported.

"And this does not include some of the costs of donated feed labor and material," said senior accountant Joe Putman.

Cash donations listed by Putman amounted to \$18,800. Concerned citizens also contributed at least 60 tons of good hay and \$3,000 worth of pellets for feeding deer.

Other volunteers provided labor, vehicles, and feed troughs to help department employees. The 1982 legislature appropriated \$100,000 for winter feeding.

At the height of the emergency, some 7,200 deer, 2,000 elk and 200 antelopes were being fed. Most of the trouble spots were in southern Idaho, the South Fork Payette River area and part of the Salmon River.

Depredation costs came principally from building and placing panels around haystacks to fend off hungry game animals.

Scientists Study Weed Diet of Game Birds

Grangeville—Weed scientists at University of Idaho College of Agriculture are trying to determine whether birds are helping to spread common crupina, a noxious weed that infests large acreages of Idaho rangeland.

Don Kambitsch, UI scientific aide said researchers will be collecting upland game birds in the Grangeville area during August. Studies will be conducted to determine if the birds have fed on common crupina seed and if the weed seed remains viable after passing through the bird's digestive tract.

The Idaho Fish and Game Commission is cooperating in the research project.

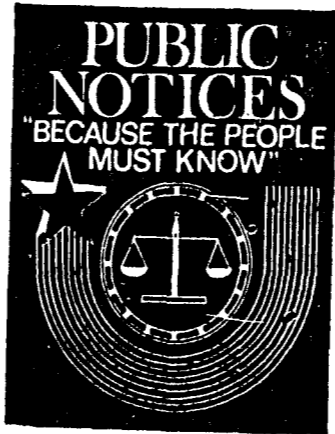
