

Free Lunch, Reduced Price Milk Program Explained for Genesee School District

Genesee Joint School District No. 282 today announced its policy for free and reduced-price meals for children unable to pay the full price of meals served under the National School Lunch Program.

Children from families whose income is at or below the levels shown are eligible for free or reduced price meals.

Application forms are being sent to all homes in a letter to parents. Additional copies are available at the principal's office in each school. The information provided on the application is confidential and will be used only for the purpose of determining eligibility. Applications may be submitted at any time during the year. A simple statement of income and family size is required, plus a signed certification by the parent or guardian that the information is correct.

In certain cases foster children are also eligible for these benefits. If a family has foster children living with them and wishes to apply for such meals for them, they should contact the school.

Under the provisions of the policy, George Crawford, Supt. will review applications and determine eligibility. If a parent is dissatisfied with

the ruling of the official, he may wish to discuss the decision with the determining official on an informal basis. If he wishes to make a formal appeal, he may make a request either orally or in writing to Jack Spangler, (Title), Route 1, Box 112, Genesee, ID 83832. Tel: 285-1555 for a hearing to appeal the decision. The policy contains an outline of the hearing procedure.

If a family member becomes unemployed or if family size changes, the family should contact the school to file a new application. Such changes may make the children or the family eligible for reduced-price meals, or for additional benefits such as free meals if the family income falls at or below the levels shown on the eligibility scale.

In the operation of child feeding programs, no child will be discriminated against because of race, color, national origin, sex, age, or handicap.

Each school and the office of the Superintendent has a copy of the complete policy which may be reviewed by any interested party.

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Most Controlled Hunt Permits Go to Idaho Applicants

Idaho residents drew 96 percent of the controlled hunt permits in this year's computerized drawing (August 2), according to a Department of Fish and Game report.

There were 89,043 applicants eligible for 15,947 permits—all but 352 of them for elk, deer, and antelope. Last year, 71,134 applicants were eligible to try for 16,835 permits.

Successful applicants from states other than Idaho totaled 593. They will be coming from as far as Pennsylvania, Alaska, Texas, Illinois, Kansas and Iowa, along with others from neighboring states.

Bighorn sheep permits were drawn by 15 nonresidents and the remaining 112 permits went to Idahoans. In controlled mountain goat hunts, 47 residents and five nonresidents drew the 52 permits.

All of the 173 moose permits—available only to residents—were drawn. Department regulations limit nonresidents to no more than 10 percent of the total permits for deer, elk, antelope, bighorn sheep and mountain goat.

The Archive Project is an effort to record the rich legacy made to Idaho by our artists.

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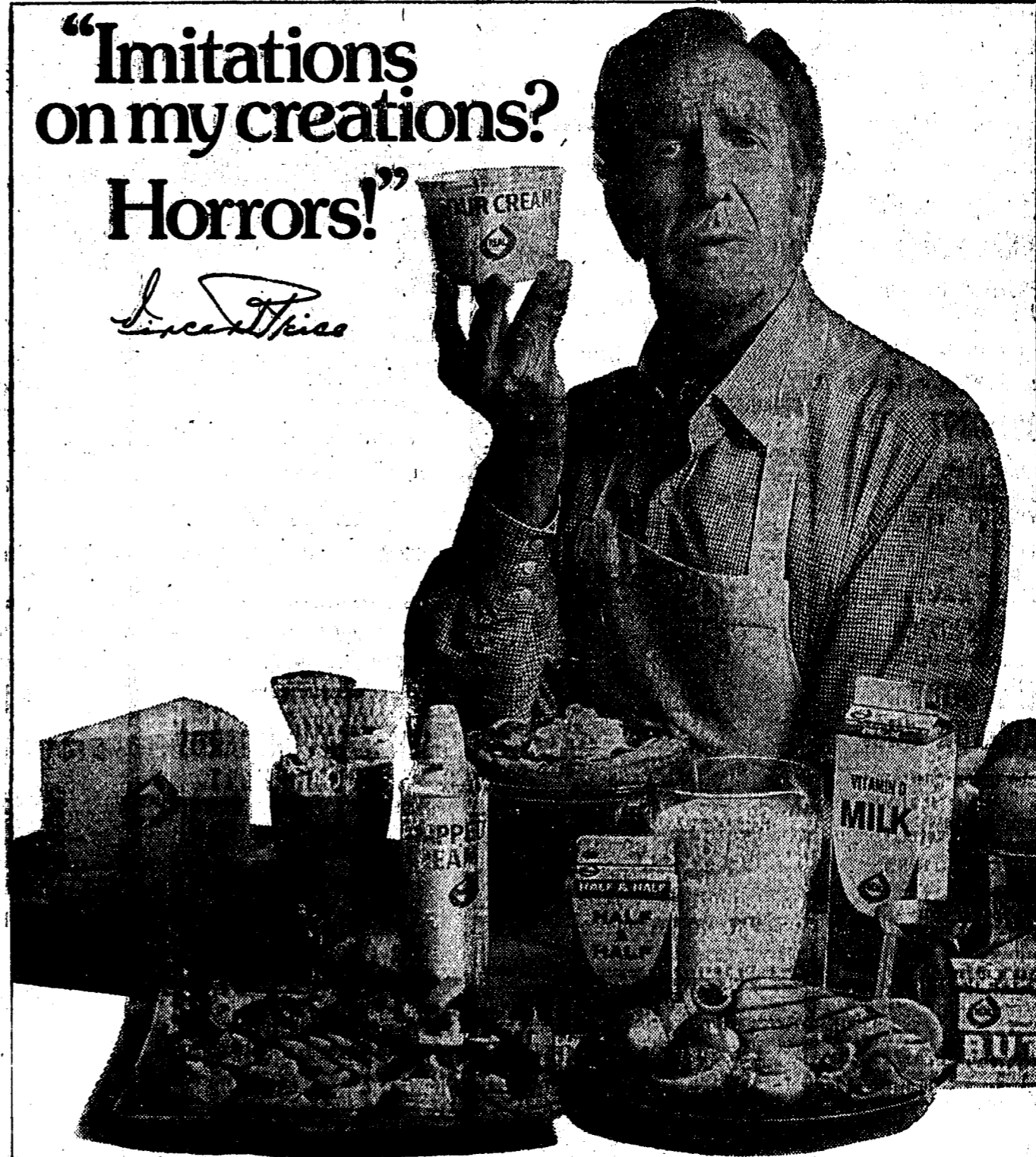

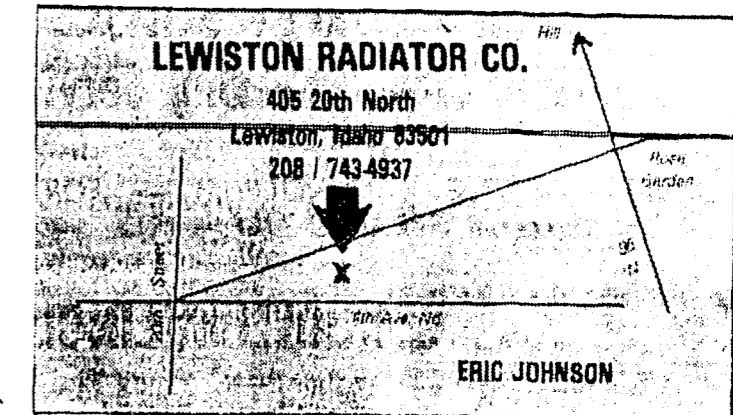
