A modernized system will not only ncrease productivity, but reduce the number of erroneous payments and other actions as well.

In the past, efforts to improve the agency's data processing system have emphasized the purchase of more computers and the employmen! of more people. The result in parts has been a patch-work affair that

is now being strained to the limit. Once computer modernzation becomes a reality, SSA will be able to keep individual earnings records more current. These records are the basis for determining entitlement to Social Security benefits and the amount of the benefits.

Similarly, new claims will be processed faster and with greater accuracy. Deficiences in the current system often prevent prompt and accurate processing of applications for benefits. This, in turn, means that applecants frequently have to make repeat visits to local offices.

One specific example should illlustrate the potential benefits of the modernization plan. Implementing the cost-of-living adjustment now requires 20,000 hours of processing over a 4-month period; once the upgraded system is in place, the job



Pears Should Be Picked When Green

Parma, Idaho--Pick pears when they are green, hard and mature size, says Michael Colt, horticulturist with the UI Cooperative Extension Service at arma.

Colt says that, unlike apples, pears will develop a coarse, mealy Sharon Hatch, sons, Milo and texture if left on the tree to ripen. They will never reach peak flavor

Pick pears just after their color changes from dark-green to light green and the lenticels-small spots on the fruit's surface—have corked over. At this point, the flesh of the pear softens and fruit separates readily from the limb.

Be careful not to pull or twist when harvesting the pears. Lift the fruit until the stem separates easily from the tree. If the stem does not break readily, give the pear a few more days to mature.

According to Colt, summer pears like Bartlett and Bosc will ripen in a week if placed in a tightly closed plastic bag and stored in the basement at about 60 to 65 degrees. They do not keep much more than a wek under these conditions.

D'Anjou and other winter pears will ripen very slowly if kept in basement storage in plastic bags. To accelerate ripening of one of these late varieties, add one or two ripe apples to the bag. These will produce additional ethylene gas to speed the ripening process.

PERTUSSIS OUTBREAK REPORTED IN IDAHO

Idaho is currently experiencing an outbreak of a childhood disease known as pertussis, according to State Immunization Coordinato: Bob Medlin. But information released earlier has located the epidemic on the wrong side of the state. Seven cases of the disease, also

known as whooping cough actually occurred in the Rexburg and Rigby areas with one case reported from Pocatello and two from Jerome. The children range in ages from five weeks to seven years with nine of the cases reported occurring in children under three years. Other cases are under investigation, Medlin said.

"There has been some controversy recently concerning pertussis immunizations," Medlin said, "and some parents have refused to have their children receive the shots." While adolescents and adults may contact pertussis, they usually have minimal effects, according to Med-But they may serve as car-

riers and infect children, for whom the disease represents a real dan-"As many as 10 percent in fifteen percent of children under age three who have the disease die of it," Medlin said.

These debts, or overpayments, generally are caused by the person's failure to report an event that has an effect on the amount of the benefit that is due. These overpayments can amount to many thousands of dollars.

Social Scurity must take action to recover all overpayments. A person is first asked to repay the entire amount of the overpayment. If this is not possible, arrangements can be made to make the repayment over a period of time, either by with holding a portion of the benefit check or by making monthly installments.

Social Security is also contacting people who failed to repay past over payments as well as these currently incurred. Many offices have set u special units whose purpose is to contact people about the money they owe Social Security.

People can avoid overpayments if they promptly report any happening that could effect the amount of mo-
