





**Upland Bird Hunting Could Be Spotty**

Last winter's heavy snowpack and the wet, cold spring weather that followed could make for spotty hunter success when most upland game bird seasons open September 18.

game bird manager, Dick Norell, Department of Fish and Game. "Hunters can expect some long days in the field because the birds probably will be scattered," he said. "They tend to bunch up around waterholes in drier years, but they disperse in smaller groups when there is a wide distribution of wa-

ter," Norell explained. "The wet spring also delayed and reduced brood production and hunters probably will see some smaller birds and fewer birds than last year," he added. Surrounding states are reporting similar conditions, according to Norell. "When final comparisons are made with 1981—an excellent year for

hunting nearly all of the species available—we can look for some reduction in harvest," he said. Here is Norell's general forecast, by species. Chukar—"We are not seeing many birds, either adults or broods, although there seemed to be an adequate breeding population this spring."

Sage Grouse "These birds are still coming back from two years of drought combined with two years of wet springs and the large range fires in the Magic Valley area last year also hurt."

There is no fall turkey season, but Norell said he has had some encouraging reports about brood production from the Rio Grandes that were introduced for the first time in Idaho last winter.

He warned hunters to watch for the Rio Grandes and avoid careless shots because some of the turkeys will be in pheasant areas. Pheasant seasons open October 9 in northern Idaho and October 23 in the southern part of the state.

Seasons for huns, chukar, quail, sage and sharp-tailed grouse and forest grouse open September 18, with a September 15 opener for forest grouse in big game management units that are open.

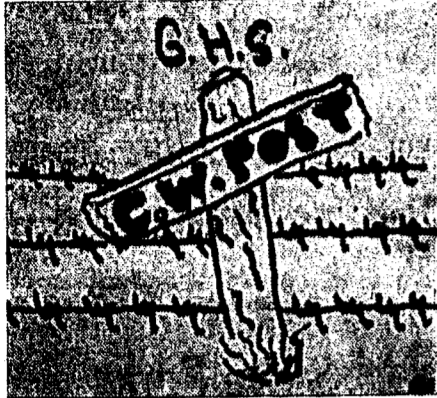

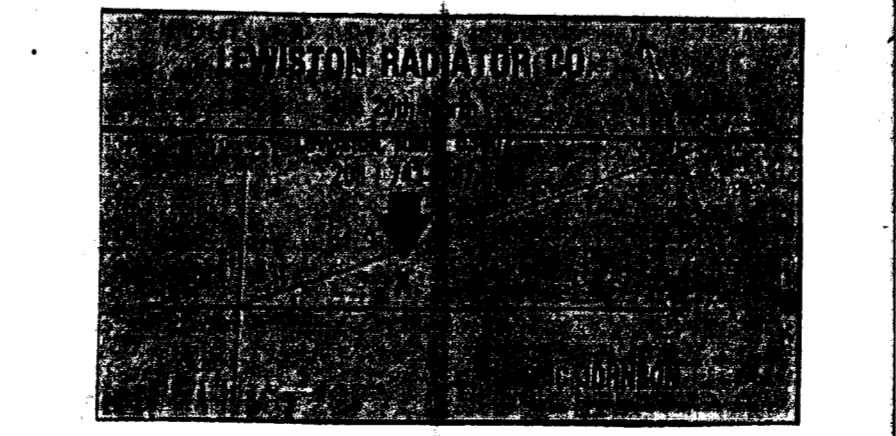

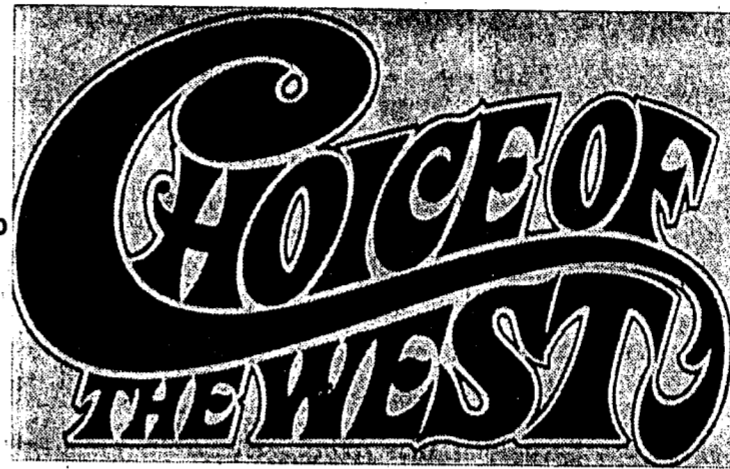
