A variety of subjects were covered at the monthly meeting of the Board of Trustees of Kendrick Joint School District No. 283, held Thursday evening, Sept. 9 at the high school

Present at the session were Chairman Luther Parks, Doug Harris, Buddy Henson, Nolan Noren and Marilyn Eichner. Also present were Supt. Eldon Taylor, Principal Gale Vallem, Treasurer A. O. Kanikke-Inez McMain, Winchester, was berg and guests Wally Butler, Mrs. Marlene Snyder and Lawrence Wilson. Also present were teachers, Barbara Croshaw, Loa Russell, and Susan Westland

Before the meeting convened, the board, guests and teachers were given a short ride and inspection of the new school bus which was recently driven from the factory to Kendrick by Marion Souders.

The first item on the agenda was the reading of the minutes of the previous meeting. Bills against the school district were read and approved for payment. The bills totaled \$20.458.26. The unusually high expense this month was because of paying for the new bus.

Wally Butler was present to report to the board what he had found in discussing with the community about the possibility of forming an organization to encourage schoolpublic communication and cooperation. "What I perceive is a broadbased school booster type club," Butler told the meeting. Such an organization, Butler said, could possibly meet once a month, invite board members, teachers, coaches, etc. to be present and discuss matters of interest "to open lines of communication . . . mostly for information," he added.

The board expressed interest and support for an organization of this type. "It couldn't do anything but help," said Mrs. Eichner Chairman Parks thanked Butler for his efforts

in this matter. Miss Barbara Croshaw, an English instructor at KHS, was present to discuss the English program at the high school, what weaknesses exist, and what is being done to imwas a weakness in the English program, Miss Croshaw told the board. She said she has already put more stress on learning to spell correctly this term and added that all teachers at the school will be emphasizing correct spelling this year. She gave the board a complete review of the program she hopes to implement this

Mrs. Snyder was present to request the board give approval for her daughter, Wendy, to leave school early two days a week so that she might accept a position with Dr. Jeffrey Sowle. Since Miss Snyder would be receiving valuable office experience and training, and would also be continuing her regular office practice classes at the school, the request was approved.

The board approved the offer of the Hill and Valley Garden Club to plan and plant the bank of the playground at the Elementary School. The board will also contribute \$100 toward the expense of this project.

In other action, the Board considered the policy on requirements in the field of science and mathematics; reviewed the 1982 test results; heard the use of the school lunch program was not hurt by the price increase; approved two requests for permission to attend state conferences by teachers; approved a safety check on all school electrical heaters, and approved the request to purchase twelve new tires for school

Fish and Game Violations Cost Offenders \$143.000

Fines and forfeitures totaling almost \$143,000 were levied for Idaho fish and game law violations in fiscal year 1982—a seven percent drop from the previous year.

The Department of Fish and Game report also showed that offenders paid \$50,423 in mandatory civil penalties. In fiscal 1981, the total was \$54,386.

Enforcement chief Dale Baird said conservation officers checked 107,-000 persons for licenses and bag limits and issued 4,165 citations in fis-

Idaho law specifies that the state treasurer is to distribute 48 percent of the fines and forfeitures among general school funds in counties with department owned lands. Another 22.5 percent goes to school funds where violations occurred and Johnson who are living quite near 22.5 percent is allocated to the district court fund.

Five percent goes to the search and rescue fund and the state general fund gets the remaining five percent. Money from civil penalties reverts to the fish and game fund. By law, a magistrate must order reimbursement of \$1,000 for the illegal killing, possession or waste of a moose, big horn sheep, mountain goat or cari-
