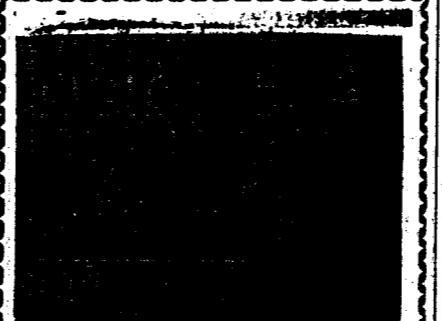

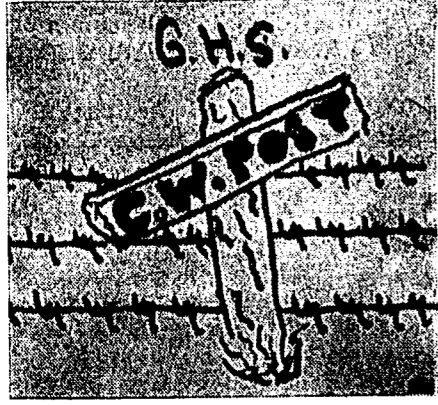

Idahoans Contribute \$98,000 for Nongame Management

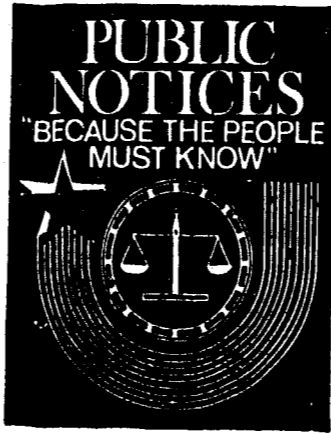
Idahoans have contributed about 98,000 through the state income tax checkoff for nongame wildlife management, more than double the amount anticipated when the program was initiated.

A State Tax Commission report shows that slightly fewer than 24,000 taxpayers donated an average of about \$4 each, with virtually all of the 1981 returns processed.

The Department of Fish and Game projected a return of about \$48,000, based on an average contribution of \$2 each from 24,000 participants.

"I am delighted with the generosity to our citizens, especially in these difficult economic times," said the department's nongame wildlife manager, Martel Morache. "They have also demonstrated their concern for animals and fish that are not harvested for sport, food or profit," he added.

Morache has visited the department's six regions to gather recommendations for nongame projects. He said he has also worked for proposals from land management agencies and educational institutions. A tentative list of alternatives will

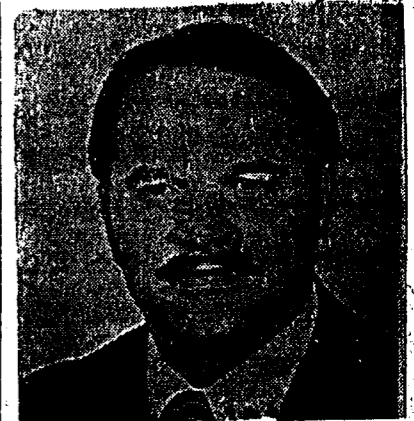

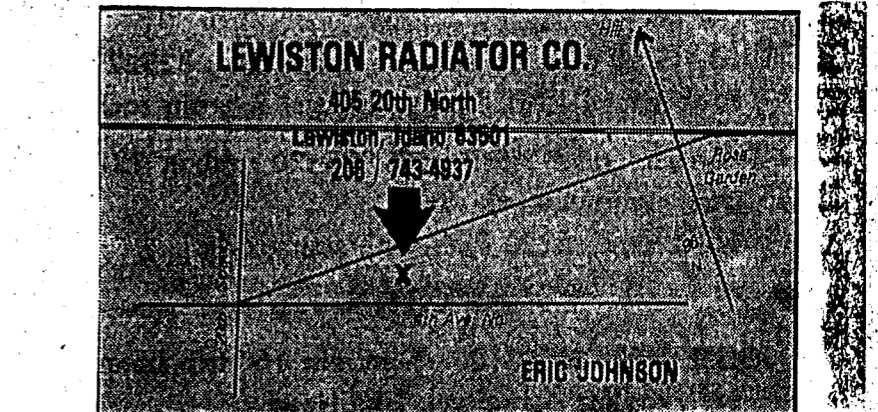
