

Meaning and Purpose The purpose of this proposed amendment to Section 8, Article IX, of the Constitution of the State of Idaho is to require the State Board of Land Commissioners to manage endowment lands and other lands acquired by the State of Idaho from the United States government for the maximum long term financial return, to prohibit the sale of state lands for less than the appraised price of those lands, and to authorize the exchange of state lands for other lands on an equal value basis with private and governmental entities. Effect of Adoption

If this amendment is adopted, the constitutional standard for managing andowment and other lands granted to or acquired by the State of Idaho from the federal government will change. At present, endowment lands are managed to "secure the maximum possible amount therefor." This amendment will change that standard and require management to secure the "maximum long term financial return.". Thisamendment will also add a constitutional standard for sales and exchanges of state lands. Statements FOR

the Proposed Amendment 1. This amendment will formally spell out in the State Constitution a Board of Land Commissioners uses in managing the State's endowment lands. The State Board of Land Commissioners manages the endowment lands to receive the maximum long-term financial return instead of the short-term benefit.

2. The maximum long-term financial return to the State of Idaho from the management of state-owned lands could be significantly different than the maximum possible amount received from the lands. 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

LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL'S STATEMENT OF MEANING AND PURPOSE S.J.R. No. 112

Meaning and Purpose The purpose of this proposed amendment to Section 7, Article I, of the Constitution of the State of Idaho is to permit waiver of jury trials in felony criminal cases when consented to by all parties in open court. Effect of Adoption

If this amendment is adopted, a defendant who pleads not guilty to a felony charge will be allowed to waive a jury trial and have his case tried before the court without a jury. Statements FOR

the Proposed Amendment 1. This amendment does not affect a citizen's right to a jury trial; the right to a jury trial is still guaranteed.

2. Defendants in misdemeanor actions presently have the right to waive a jury trial; this amendment will extend the same right to felony actions.

3. Occasionally, the only reason for proceeding with a jury trial is to preserve an appealable issue, such as a motion to suppress evidence. In such instances the jury trial is essentially a waste of time because the defendant's guilt is clear, but the trial must be held so that an appeal-can be taken to a higher

4. Allowing waiver of jury trials will result in significant savings in the operation of the courts. Statements AGAINST the Proposed Amendment

1. Particularly in felony cases, community standards should be weighed by laymen to determine innocence or guilt. Eliminating jury trials in felony cases will further reduce citizen participation in the justice

system.
2. The chance of a judge and a prosecuting attorney acting to "pressure" a defendant into waiving a jury trial will be a real danger if this amendment is adopted.

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

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

LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL'S **AND PURPOSE** S.J.R. No. 112

Meaning and Purpose The purpose of this proposed amendment to Section 7, Article I, of the Constitution of the State of Idaho is to permit waiver of jury trials in felony criminal cases when consented to by all parties in open court. Effect of Adoption

If this amendment is adopted, a defendant who pleads not guilty to a felony charge will be allowed to waive a jury trial and have his case tried before the court without a jury. Statements FOR

the Proposed Amendment 1. This amendment does not affect a citizen's right to a jury trial; the right to a

jury trial is still guaranteed.

2. Defendants in misdemeanor actions presently have the right to waive a jury trial; this amendment will extend

the same right to felony actions. 3. Occasionally, the only reason for proceeding with a jury trial is to preserve an appealable issue, such as a motion to suppress evidence. In such instances the jury trial is essentially a waste of time because the defendant's guilt is clear, but the trial must be held so that an appeal-can be taken to a higher

A. Allowing waiver of jury trials will result in significant savings in the operation of the courts, Statements AGAINST

the Proposed Amendment Particularly in felony cases, community standards should be weighed by laymen to determine innocence or guilt. Eliminating jury trials in felony cases will further reduce citizen participation in the justice

system. 2. The chance of a judge and a prosecuting attorney acting to "pressure" a defendant into walving a jury trial will be a real danger if this amendment is adopted.

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
