## Troy Topples Tigers 36-12

The Kendrick Tigers saw a 6-0 first quarter lead disappear under a barrage of second half touchdowns by the Troy Trojans as the TIS team defeated Kendrick 36-12 last Friday night on the Tiger field. Still winless in 5 starts this season, the Tigers go to Pocatello to play the Loggers this Friday night. The Loggers upset Genesee 32-28 last week.

In the Troy game, neither team could get untracked in the first quarter and both had to settle for a punting duel. It was such a defensive contest in the first quarter that it took 6½ minutes before either team was able to roll up ten yards for a first down. Troy finally went over ten yards with 5:31 left in the period.

The second quarter was a repeat of the first until quarterback Slade Zumhove hit on a pass to Jack Meyer who moved to the Troy 28 yard line before being hauled down with just 37 seconds left in the half. Zumhove ran the ball to the 20 and on the next play passed to John Bryan, who crossed over for the touchdown. The extra point try failed by Kendrick led in a ball game 6-0 for the first time this season.

Trojan coach Lee Brocke took his team and gave the word at halftime, and the Troy squad came out and ran up 3 touchdowns and 22 points in the third quarter and 2 touchdowns and 14 points in the final quarter to sink the Tigers.

In the final quarter, Steve Lohman punched across another touchdown for Kendrick from 12 yards out to give the Tigers their 12 points.

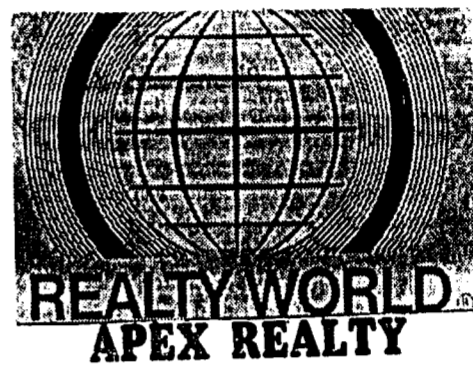
