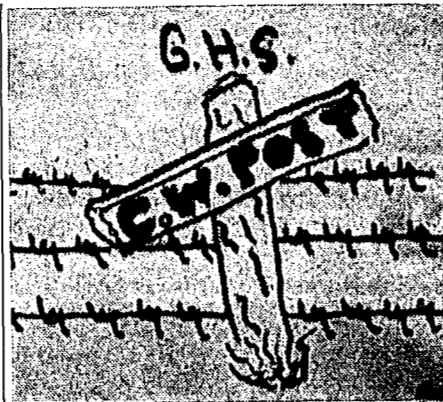

EIGHT PANHANDLE GAME UNITS HAVE MANDATORY ELK CHECK-IN

Successful elk hunters will be required to report to a check station or check point if they harvest an animal in any of eight Panhandle game management units this fall.

The regulation approved by the Fish and Game Commission specifies that any elk taken in units 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7 and 9 must be verified seven days from the date of harvest.

Elk seasons in all of those units open October 2.

According to the Department of Fish and Game's wildlife bureau, the mandatory check-in is designed to provide harvest data by compiling reports from as many hunters as possible.

Regional conservation educator Jack McNeel said check points identified by large posters have been established in most communities within the region and game management check stations will be operated six or seven days a week and 12-14 hours a day.

A department information sheet for deer and elk hunters points out another change in big game regulations which states that in some units the head or lower jaw of a deer or elk—also antlers in an antlered-only hunt—must accompany the carcass while in transit.

The printed regulations list those units where the requirement applies. Purpose of the regulation is to provide information on a herd's age, growth rate and harvest rate.

Hunters also should take note of another new regulation and a correction in elk season dates for unit

69 in eastern Idaho.

The regulation prohibits the use of electronic calling devices while hunting elk. The correct elk hunting dates for unit 69 are October 13 through October 17 for antlered elk only, instead of October 6 through October 10, as the printed regulations show.

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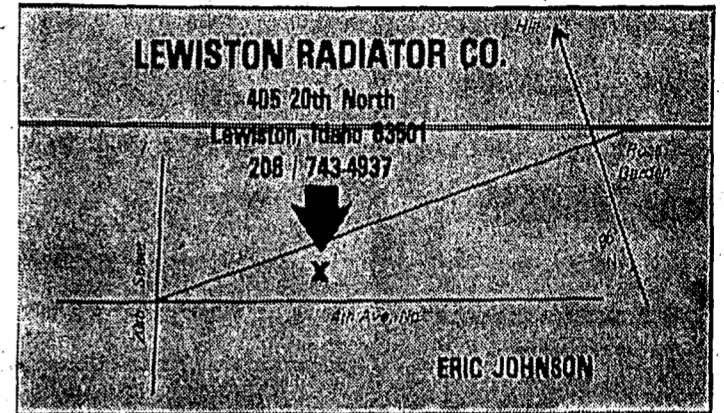
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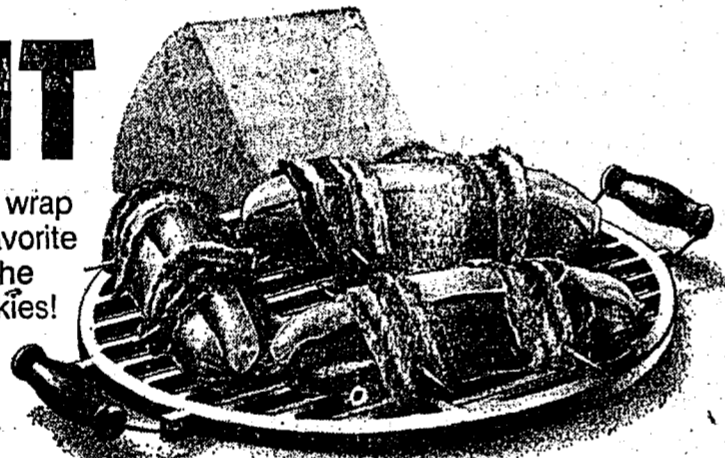

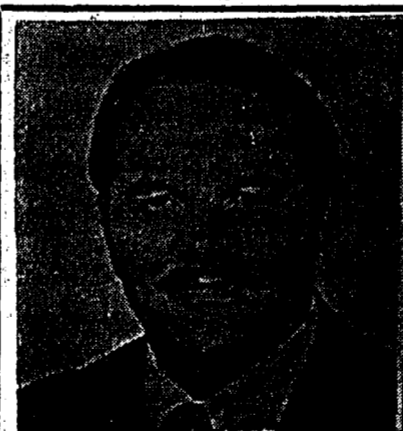
We just got done playing the Deary Mustangs Thursday night the 7th of October. Both the J. V. and Varsity won their game.

 ORDINANCE NO. 213

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF JULIAETTA, IDAHO, APPROPRIATING SUMS OF MONEY AUTHORIZED BY LAW AND DEEMED NECESSARY TO DEFRAY ALL EXPENSES OF THE CITY OF JULIAETTA, IDAHO, FOR THE FISCAL YEAR COMMENCING WITH THE FIRST DAY OF OCTOBER, 1982, FOR ALL GENERAL AND SPECIAL PURPOSES, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE MAYOR AND COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF JULIAETTA, IDAHO, AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION 1. That this ordinance will be known as the Annual Appropriation ordinance.

Section 2. That the following sum's of money, or as much thereof as may be authorized by law as may be needed or deemed necessary to defray all expenses and liabilities of the City of Juliaetta, Idaho, be, and the same hereby are appropriated for the general and special municipal and corporate purposes and objects of said City, hereinafter specified for the fiscal year commencing on the first day of October, 1982 and ending on the last day of September, 1983.

The sum of \$125,592.84 has been appropriated as follows:

STREET FUND	\$22,986.28
WATER FUND	\$35,260.28
SEWER FUND	\$30,663.28
