Slippery Roads Blamed for Death Of 3 Near Genesee

The first light snow storm of the season was blamed for the death of two Lewiston people last Friday night five miles south of Genesee on Highway 95. Another person involved in the same accident died the following day in a Lewiston Hospital from injuries sustained in the crash. The storm was also responsible for a number of other more minor traffic accidents in the area.

Dead were Grace J. Wilson, 51, and her son, Isaac A. Wilson, 29, both of Lewiston. They died at the scene of the accident. A passenger in their car, Robert Lawyer, 29, of Grangeville, died in Lewiston several hours later. The accident occurred when the Wilson car ,driven by Mrs. Wilson, apparently skidded on slushy pavement and smashed broadside into an oncoming car driven by a Moscow man. The Moscow man, his wife and young child received only minor injuries.

The snow storm moved into the area shortly after six o'clock Friday evening and the snow fell intermittently throughout the night. The snow was not a heavy amount but it did make the roads very slippery as it turned to slush and then froze. Many motorists were caught unprepared for this first snow of the season and had not put snow tires on their vehicles.

Temperatures also took a dive Saturday morning and also on Sunday. The higher elevations reported low in the teens and even Kendrick and Juliaetta saw the mercury skid down to near the 20-above mark as the skies cleared Saturday night and Sunday.

Cloudy skies moved in again Tuesday and the temperatures rose to nearly 40 Tuesday night as the area received moisture again in the form of rain.



and that it was old-13 to 15 million years old.

The discovery of ancient trees is no rarity in north Idaho. Many fossil fragments of even older trees have been found in the Clarkia area, 50 miles northeast of Moscow. But Cay's tree was no fossil; it was wood

Proprietor Cay Tenwick called the University of Idaho. Among those responding were forest resources professor Arthur Partridge and geology professor Charles Smil-

They found the remains of a large tree, perhaps once 80 to 100 feet tall, imbedded in the cliff and lying on its side, the trunk slightly inclined. From the geologic evidence, they deduced that the tree had fallen or been washed into a stream or lake, then covered by sediment. Before the fossilizing process could begin, a lava flow covered the sediment, preserving the wood. "It's almost as if it had been pressure cooked," Partridge said.

Subsequent lava flows created the cliff within which the tree has been hidden for these millions of years.

According to Smiley, the tree's age can be fairly accurately pinned down by geology. "We can date it by correlating basalt flows at the site with previously dated flows elsewhere," he said. "This tree is a bit younger than similar fossilized species found elsewhere around Clarkia.''

Both scientists agree that the tree was a rare find. Unfossilized ancient wood is occasionally found, but usually in smal fragments. "They're not big, like this one," Smiley said.

Pieces of branches and some leaves were found well preserved in the sediment in the tree's vicinity. The leaves represent a species of beech, similar to the American beech of the eastern U.S., Smiley said.

One of the most impressive souvenirs of the tree is a chunk of sediment about five inches long bearing the fragment of a branch and a nearly complete leaf. The leaf is unfossilized; its "skin" is extremely smooth.

Steelhead Season Limit Increased to 10 Fish

The bounty of the strongest upstream steelhead run since 1972 has prompted the Fish and Game commission to up the fall season limit to 10 of the ocean-going fish.

But there were "howevers" in the amended regulations approved by the Fish and Game Commission. Some combinations of limits are involved for the angler who tries all the river systems where seasons are open-the Clearwater, the Snake and the Salmon.

Not more than six steelhead from the Salmon River or three from the Snake downstream from the Dug Bar boat ramp can be included in the season limit of 10.

The regulations also carry a reminder that daily bag and possession

CINDY TAYLOR 276-7961 or 746-5991 limits for the Snake, Salmon and Clearwater shall not be taken to mean cumulative limits allowing an angler to take more than two steelhead a day or have more than four in possession.

As of November 4, the Department of Fish and Game listed a season count of 64,353 steelhead moving up stream past Lower Granite Dam, the last barrier before the fish return to Idaho,

Lower Granite was not in place in 1972, but Little Goose Dam, the next one downstream at the time, recorded a total of about 56,800 steelhead.

Herb Pollard, anadromous fishery coordinator, has attributed the large return to a successful hatchery program combined with improved survival of wild fish, effective downstream transportation and excellent upstream passage conditions this

Pollard urged anglers to continue to release wild steelhead-usually those with dorsal fins that are higher than 2 1/4 inches. "Compliance may be the only practical means of preserving the nonhatchery fish," he






