**Genesee Council Met**

The November meeting of the Genesee City Council was held Nov. 8 at City Hall at 7:30 p. m. Presiding was Mayor Wilson and the entire council were present.  
October bills in the amount of \$15,489.73 were reviewed and approved for payment.

Sterling Codifiers of Welsler is in the process of completing the recodification of the city codes. The last time this was done was in 1963. Council and staff have been working on updating and changing our code to reflect the change in state and federal laws.

The Council is also considering some changes in the Personnel Policy. Several work meetings have been held and more will be scheduled.

The Planning and Zoning Commission presented findings of fact on two proposed ordinances, both having to do with zoning, and an addition to the Genesee Comprehensive Plan. The proposed ordinance having to do with mobile homes on individual lots, although recommended by the Planning & Zoning, was rejected as written, although recommended by the Planning and Zoning, was rejected as written, but will be rewritten and submitted at a later date. The second proposed ordinance and the addition to the Comprehensive will be tabled until the first ordinance is ready to be considered.

A decision was reached to send early records of the City to the Latah Historical Society. The Society can use methods to preserve these old records, methods it would be difficult to ask the city to undertake. Too, once they are in the hands of the Historical Society there is an assurance they will be preserved and not destroyed.

Mayor Wilson recessed the meeting at 10:30 p. m. to reconvene at 8:00 p. m. Tuesday, November 9th to consider the applications of Chief of Police.

**Steelhead Season Limit Increased to 10 Fish**

The bounty of the strongest upstream steelhead run since 1972 has prompted the Fish and Game Commission to up the fall season limit to 10 of the ocean-going fish.

But there were "however's" in the amended regulations approved by the Fish and Game Commission. Some combinations of limits are involved for the angler who tries all the river systems where seasons are open—the Clearwater, the Snake and the Salmon.

Not more than six steelhead from the Salmon River or three from the Snake downstream from the Dug Bar boat ramp can be included in the season limit of 10.

The regulations also carry a reminder that daily bag and possession

limits for the Snake, Salmon and Clearwater shall not be taken to mean cumulative limits allowing an angler to take more than two steelhead a day or have more than four in possession.

As of November 4, the Department of Fish and Game listed a season count of 64,353 steelhead moving up stream past Lower Granite Dam, the last barrier before the fish return to Idaho.

Lower Granite was not in place in 1972, but Little Goose Dam, the next one downstream at the time, recorded a total of about 56,800 steelhead.

Herb Pollard, anadromous fishery coordinator, has attributed the large return to a successful hatchery program combined with improved survival of wild fish, effective downstream transportation and excellent upstream passage conditions this year.

Pollard urged anglers to continue to release wild steelhead—usually those with dorsal fins that are higher than 2 1/4 inches. "Compliance may be the only practical means of preserving the nonhatchery fish," he said.
