





**WHERE DID THOSE EXTRA POUNDS COME FROM?**

Moscow—Your Thanksgiving dinner may be with you for quite a while and we're not talking about turkey leftovers. University of Idaho home economists estimate that a moderately active man at 180-200 pounds will consume 3,500 calories in an average

Thanksgiving dinner, some 800 more than he'll use in an entire day. During the same dinner, a woman of 125 pounds will eat more conservatively consuming only about 100 calories more than the 1,875 calories she can use in one day. However, add breakfast and lunch to that turkey feast for another 1,600 calories for the day, and that

same woman can look forward to seven hours of walking or a brisk two-hour run to burn off those calories, said Sharon Stoll, assistant professor of physical education. One hundred calories can be walked off in an hour, but to burn off the 800 excess calories a man will get from his Thanksgiving plate will require two hours of walking or one

and a half hours of bicycling, or an hour of swimming—unlikely activities Thanksgiving Day when there are relatives to visit with and football games to watch and evermore food to eat.

**CLOSING DATES MODIFIED FOR UPLAND GAME BIRDS**

Some hunting seasons for huns, chukars and quail will close earlier than scheduled this year, following action by the Fish and Game Commission at its recent meeting in Boise (December 5).

Commissioners also cancelled the hen pheasant hunt in southwestern Idaho, originally set for Dec. 1-5.

State game bird manager, Dick Norell, Department of Fish and Game, told the commission that extreme wintering conditions in some areas and the cold, wet spring weather that followed had a severe impact on brood production.

"The majority of the hunters we heard from prior to the commission meeting agreed with our recommendation to close the hen pheasant season and to give some protection to huns, chukars, and quail," he said. "We may also recommend other early closures if snow and cold weather cause the birds to bunch up and become more vulnerable," Norell said.

Here are the revised closing dates according to hunting areas described in the printed copies of 1982 upland game regulations:

Area 2—Closes December 31 instead of January 16. The area takes in part of Adams, Idaho, Lewis, Nez Perce, Valley and Washington Counties.

Area 3—The upper section will close December 5 instead of December 31. It includes Clearwater, Latah, and most of Idaho, Lewis and Nez Perce counties.

In the southern part of Area 3, the closing date is December 5 (instead of December 31) in Blaine, Camas, Elmore, Gooding, Jerome, Lincoln and Minidoka counties. The closing date remains December 31 for the balance of Area 3.

November 25 was the final day of hunting for huns, chukars, and quail in Area 1. Closing dates for Areas 4 and 5 stay at December 31 and 5, respectively, and bag and possession limits remain the same in all areas.
