New Book "Harvest" Has Genesee-Uniontown Setting

Ask a wheat farmer, and he'll tell you that getting a crop is darned hard work. Ask Bill Woolston which was harder, working as a harvest hand or producing a photographic record of wheat growing in the Palouse, and he'll shrug and look slightly puzzled.

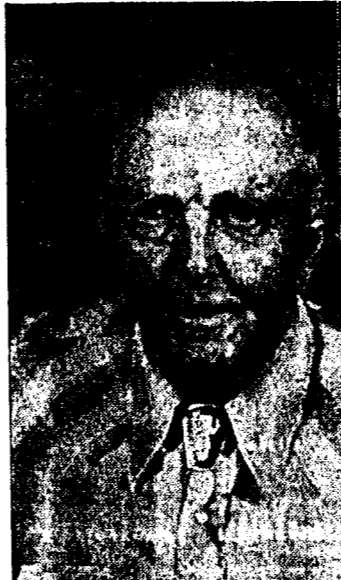
"I don't know which was tougher," he says, "keeping up with the combines during harvest, or shooting, developing, and assembling the images that became part of the book."

With the publication of "Harvest", Woolston's study of wheat ranching in the Palouse, anyone trying to explain the life, look, and work of this region, will have an easier time of it. Harvest, published in time for the Christmas season by Thorn Creek Press, beautifully captures the spirit and workaday activity of this agricultural life.
