A Deary man was crushed to death on Big Bear Ridge Grade Monday afternoon as he attempted to put chains on his truck in order to be able to travel up the icy highway in the wake of the first real snow fall of the season in this area. Dead is Wm. Hodgson 71, of rural Deary, who was apparently crushed when the 1-ton truck he was chaining up rolled backwards and on to his body. 





Provide for Warmth, Energy And Shelter When Hunting

Warmth, energy and shelter those are the first words that should come to mind for anyone planning a hunting trip.

The Department of Fish and Game believes that a successful and safe hunt begins at home with careful preparation. Here are some suggestions:

Suitable clothing is a priority item. During fall and winter, temperatures can take a sudden turn in hunting country and bring cold rain and snow. Warmth, energy and shelter translate to clean wool clothing, suitable boots, a warm lightweight jacket and proper head covering.

A bare head can cause the loss of as much as 50 percent of body heat at 40 degrees Fahrenheit.

Take along some high energy food such as candy bars and jerky. Other items that are high on the checklist include waterproof matches or aid kit, and a jack knife.

One or two of the lightweight, compact space blankets won't add much weight and they can be seen from a considerable distance.

Don't change plans without notifying someone. Never go hunting


