Cole of Lewiston; her mother at Indianapolis; a sister, Juanita Honn of Indianapolis; five brothers, Bill Skaggs of Indianapolis, James Skaggs of California, Lee Skaggs in Indiana, Orville Skaggs of Juliaetta and Gall Skaggs of Florida; two stepdaughters, Linda Hudson and Debra Lockett, both of Juliaetta; three stepsons, Terry Hudson of Juliaetta, Bill Kelly of Lewiston and David Hudson of Clarkston; nine step-grandchildren, two step great-grandchildren and nine grandchildren.

Deary Man Killed
In Highway Accident
On Bear Ridge Grade

A Deary man was crushed to death on Big Bear Ridge Grade Monday afternoon as he attempted to put chains on his truck in order to be able to travel up the icy highway in the wake of the first real snow fall of the season in this area. Dead is Wm. Hodgson, 71, of rural Deary, who was apparently crushed when the 1-ton truck he was chaining up rolled backwards and on to his body. The accident occurred some time between three and three-thirty Monday afternoon 3½ miles from Kendrick on the Bear Ridge Grade near the Bud Holt home.

Numerous other more minor accidents have occurred in the area since last week as fog, rain and then snow fell over much of the region. The snow began shortly before noon Sunday and continued throughout the day, the night and into Monday. Highway travel was difficult Sunday night and became extremely hazardous Monday morning. The snow fell intermittently through the day Monday and then it eased, there was at least three inches of covering in the valley and from 6 inches up in the higher elevations.

There was a warming trend Tuesday with partial clearing as the temperature rose into the middle and upper thirties.

Last week and until the snow storm struck, heavy fog had plagued the region and was blamed for many highway accidents, including one near Genesee which involved a young Kendrick woman (see separate article).

Amelia Ware In Auto
Accident Friday Near Genesee

Amelia Ware, 23, daughter of Clara and Pete Ware, of Kendrick, suffered cuts, bruises and shattered knee-cap, resulting from a two-car accident on Highway 95 near Genesee at 9:00 a. m. Friday. Heavy fog had blanketed the highway, and roads were slick. Although Latah County Sheriff's office reports say Amelia was attempting to pass a slower-moving vehicle when the cars collided, she told a newspaper that wasn't the case.

"I did not attempt to complete a pass," Amelia said. "I pulled out in the incoming lane a little bit to see around the truck and I lost control in the snow. I couldn't get my car back into my lane and I just slid into the other lane."

The driver of a 1977 Datsun compact, Renee Arp of Boise and her passenger, Mary Daubert of Lewiston were headed toward Lewiston when a set of headlights and grill of another car appeared in front of them. The Datsun stalled snow tires left more than 120 ft. of gouges on the pavement before it and the 1970 Camero collided head on. Arp suffered a ruptured spleen and Daubert a broken leg. Both were in good condition at Moscow and Lewiston hospitals.

Amelia was taken by ambulance to a Spokane hospital where she underwent surgery on the shattered knee cap and inserted pins to help hold it together. The leg is in a plastic cast. Amelia is receiving therapy and responding quite well to treatment. She expects to be released soon.

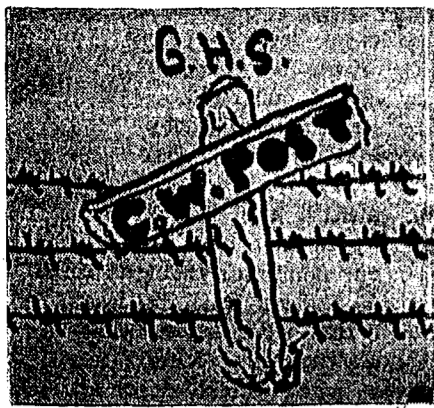

CHRISTMAS STORY
Did You Know That Some Things About Christmas Are Unsafe?

Moscow—There are some things about Christmas decorating and celebrating which can be unsafe, according to University of Idaho Extension specialists.
For example:
—Holly berries, while safe for birds

to eat, can make young children ill. The red berries are attractive to toddlers who don't know the difference between something safe and something poisonous.
—The snow spray used on decorations and Christmas trees can be toxic if children eat it.
—Mistletoe berries, also used frequently as decorations, can be toxic

if eaten. Keep mistletoe up high where children can't get to it.
—Combining angel hair with snow spray creates a mixture so flammable that only a touch of fire will cause it to burst into flames.
—Poinsettia leaves and flowers are a gastrointestinal irritant and may result in vomiting and nausea if eaten. Small children should not

have access to them.
—The flocking used on Christmas trees may cause respiratory problems in some people. Certain individuals may be allergic to it.
—Some people are allergic to certain varieties of conifers. If a family member exhibits allergy symptoms only during the holidays, the family Christmas tree may be the

culprit.
—Aerosol cans of Christmas tree coatings will be partially effective fire proofing if they are applied heavily enough. To do this requires six or more cans of the aerosol which is a very expensive treatment. It's cheaper and more effective to keep the tree fresh with water in the stand.
—Many children require medical treatment each year because they cut themselves with parts of fragile Christmas tree ornaments that are within their reach.
—Lack of proper instruction in use and care of new Christmas toys causes many accidents each year. Be sure your child uses new playthings safely, whether they are for indoor or outdoor use.
—If you drink at a holiday party, you can ensure a safer trip home by limiting yourself to no more than one mild drink an hour and stopping one hour before driving home.
—Feeling tired or pressured can lead to accidents in the home that normally could be avoided. Stop and relax a while when holiday preparations get to be too much.
—Also, the specialists said that singing Christmas carols uses 120 calories an hour. For fun and a pleasant way to use up the energy from that irresistible piece of fudge, plan a family sing-along.

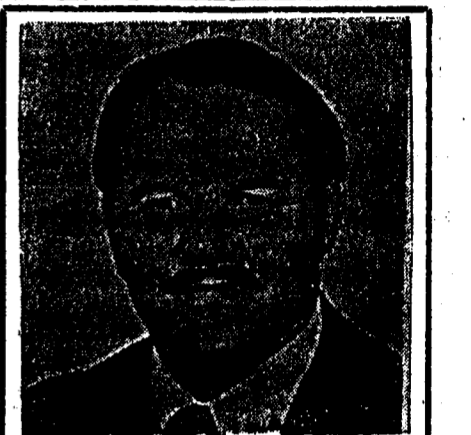
Butter, No Cheese Will Be Distributed in December

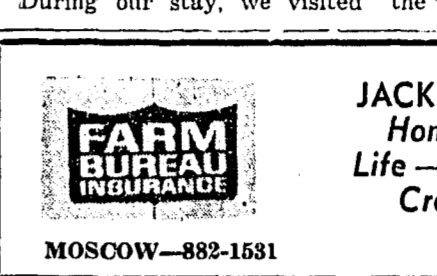
