

Dogs in Genesee must be inoculated against rabies before they can be licensed

The City of Genesee advises it is time to renew licenses for your dogs. Dogs are to be licensed first at six months and then each January thereafter. Each applicant for license shall present evidence satisfactory that the dog has been inoculated against rabies according to standard veterinary practice. Each applicant for the license of a spayed female shall present evidence satisfactory that said female has been spayed prior to issuing any license. Fees remain the same as past years. For each male and spayed female the fee is \$3.00. Unspayed females the fee is \$5.00. Licenses may be obtained from City Clerk, City Treasurer, and/or

city police officers. Complaints are received almost constantly about dogs running at large. City Code states: No owner or keeper of any dog shall permit such dog to run at large within the corporate limits of the City at any time and any person may take up such dog and deliver the same to the City Hall or City Shop or our Police officers. In any prosecution under this law, it shall not be necessary to allege or prove any intent on the part of the owner or keeper of a dog to allow or permit such dog to run at large. City Hall Closed Dec. 31. City Hall will be closed December 31, 1982.

SPRING STEELHEAD SEASON SET TO OPEN JANUARY 1

Spring steelhead fishing in Idaho begins next January 1, with strong runs expected on the Salmon, Clearwater and Snake rivers.
 The Fish and Game commission approved spring seasons for portions of the three river systems during its meeting in Moscow (Dec. 7). Catch-and-keep fishing will be allowed except for a stretch on the Salmon where wild steelhead must be returned.
 Department of Fish and Game personnel told commissioners that an excellent run is "virtually assured" at the Pahsimeroi Hatchery, a facility financed by Idaho Power Co. and operated by the Department.
 Hatchery-origin steelhead are also expected to return to Stanley Basin,

allowing for an added 30 miles of fishing on the Salmon up to Basin Creek. And the commission approved continuation of fall season limits on the Clearwater to harvest surplus fish returning to Dworshak Hatchery.
 Steelhead regulations will show a change in reporting requirements for anglers. Tags come with the 1983 steelhead permits and a tag must be validated and attached to each fish in possession.
 Here is a summary of 1983 spring seasons and limits:
 Salmon River—From its mouth up stream to Long Tom Creek about a quarter-mile above the mouth of the Middle Fork Salmon, January 1 through April 3. Daily limit, 2; possession, 4; and season limit 8. In the same stretch of water; steelhead

with dorsal fins higher than 2 1/4 inches (wild steelhead) must be returned to the water and barbless hooks are mandatory.

Long Tom Creek to 400 yards below the mouth of the Pahsimeroi River—January 1 through April 3, with limits of 2, 4 and 8. From 100 yards above the mouth of the Pahsimeroi up to Basin Creek—January 1 through April 17, with limits of 2, 4 and 8.

Snake River—January 1 through March 31. Limits are 2, 4 and 10 from the Dug Bar boat ramp up to Hells Canyon Dam and 1, 2 and 3 from the Dug Bar ramp downstream to the Washington state line. Shore anglers are allowed to fish up to the dam, but boat anglers are restricted to 150 yards below. The river is closed to steelhead fishing from the Anaton Gauge Station up to the Lime Point and from Mountain Sheep Creek to the Dug Bar ramp.

Clearwater River—January 1 thru April 30 from the posted boundary at the confluence with the Snake River up the Clearwater river bridge at Orofino. Limits are 2, 4 and 10.

North Fork Clearwater—January 1 through April 30 from its mouth to 100 yards below Dworshak Dam. Limits are 2, 4 and 10. Boat fishing is prohibited between the mouth and Ahsahka Highway bridge and all fishing from the shoreline around Dworshak Hatchery is prohibited.

STEELHEAD TAGS REQUIRED FOR '83 SPRING SEASON

A new method for reporting a steelhead catch will be in effect when the spring steelhead season starts in Idaho January 1.

It requires the use of a tag for each steelhead the angler catches and keeps on those waters open along the Salmon, Clearwater and Snake rivers.

"We have increased season limits on some stretches to give anglers more fishing opportunity, but it could be confusing because the limits vary. The tags should help anglers keep a good record of limits and reduce the possibility of violations," said Monte Richards, Department of Fish and Game fisheries bureau chief.

Regulations allow an angler to take 10 steelhead during the spring season, but not more than three of the 10 can be taken from the Snake River downstream from Dug Bar and no more than eight from the Salmon River.

A 1983 license is required, along with a steelhead permit which comets with the perforated strips of tags—the first 10 only for the spring season and another 10 for a fall season, should one be approved by the Fish and Game Commission.

When a steelhead is landed, the angler must start with the lowest numbered tag, validate it by cutting out the notches indicating month and day of the catch and attach it to the fish.

Richards suggested that the angler run a piece of fishing line through the tag and then through the gills—or tie the line securely around the tail. "Most anglers replace a section of line because it becomes frayed while playing the steelhead," he said.

The validated tag must remain attached to the fish during transit and storage and it is unlawful to remove the head or tail in the field or in transit.

Regulations also specify that month and day of the catch, the name of the stream and the stream section must be recovered on the permit. The tag number must correspond to the permit space where the catch is entered.

Here is a summary of 1983 spring seasons and limit:

Salmon River—From its mouth upstream to Long Tom Creek about a quarter-mile above the mouth of the Middle Fork Salmon, January 1 through April 3. Daily limit, 2; possession, 4; and season limit, 8. In the same stretch of water, steelhead with dorsal fins higher than 2 1/4 inches (wild steelhead) must be returned to the water and barbless hooks are mandatory. A wild steelhead can be kept if it is at least 37 inches long.

Long Tom Creek to 400 yards below the mouth of the Pahsimeroi River—January 1 through April 3, with limits of 2, 4 and 8. From 100

MAMMOTH TEETH, BONES DISCOVERED ALONG POTLATCH RIVER, DWORSHAK RESERVOIR
 Bones and teeth discovered in Idaho last spring along a tributary of the Potlatch River and along the shore of Dworshak Reservoir have been identified as belonging to mammoths, large woolly elephants that roamed the region more than 10,000 years ago.

According to Roy Breckenridge, geologist with the Idaho Bureau of Mines and Geology on the University of Idaho campus, the mammoth remains found in northern Idaho could be an important link to understanding the geology of the region.

Mammoths, directly related to today's modern elephants in Africa, once inhabited most of north America. Remains dating back more than a million years have been found from Alaska to Florida and Mexico. One specimen, discovered at Brunau, Idaho, in the early 1960s, has been dated at 1.36 million years old.

Frank Leonhardy, an associate professor of anthropology at UI who has spent considerable time studying mammoth sites in other regions of the country, explained that the mammoths in North America became extinct approximately 11,000 years ago.

"We have a cluster of dates around 12,000 years ago," he said, "and not much after that. They seem to have become extinct very rapidly."

The reasons for that extinction are not well understood. Some scientists believe that over-hunting by Ice Age tribes of man contributed to their demise. Others believe that changing climatic conditions caused their extinction.

"There is a whole cluster of species that became extinct between 10,000, and 12,000 years ago, but they were only the large animals," Leonhardy pointed out. "It seems to have been a selective extinction."

"The best argument is probably that there was a dramatic climatic change of some sort at about that time. It was so rapid that the large grazing animals couldn't adapt."

While the remains found near Potlatch River and Dworshak Reservoir are not unique to the Northwest, they are important to geologists and anthropologists studying in the area, Breckenridge pointed out.

"The Bureau, in the last five years, has brought some people on to its staff who are involved in mapping the Quaternary period, which is the last million years of geologic history," he explained.

"This is a very important geologic time because it bears the closest relationship to man as he is living on the earth now. It's the period when the soils were formed and the landscape we now see was modified. These mammoth remains, the first we've had since we started this research, will help us date these soil and geologic units."

Breckenridge said that in both instances the mammoth bones and teeth discovered last spring were located by non-geologists. The finds at Potlatch River were reported by a young boy and the Dworshak discovery was turned in by a sportsman who was attending a camp meet.

The Bureau intends to send a geologist back out to both sites where

the teeth and bones were found next spring, Breckenridge reported, in the hopes that heavy spring runoff will uncover additional remains. In both cases, however the remains were found in redeposited stream bed material and so the actual death sites may never be known.

some kind of bone. When he told her that the 10-inch, three-pound object was actually an elephant tooth she nearly fainted, he said.

For anthropologists, any mammoth remains uncovered along with signs of man will be an important discovery, Leonhardy said. Fewer than 20 sites have been found where the tools and implements of man were mixed in with the bones of mammoths, and these are important clues to the life of early man in North America.

Breckenridge said that he is eager to hear of other possible mammoth sites in northern Idaho. Such remains of bones and teeth are inevitably found by accident and could be uncovered almost anywhere. They can be identified by their larger than average size and unusual shape. Leonhardy said that a woman brought a mammoth tooth in to him earlier this year, thinking it was

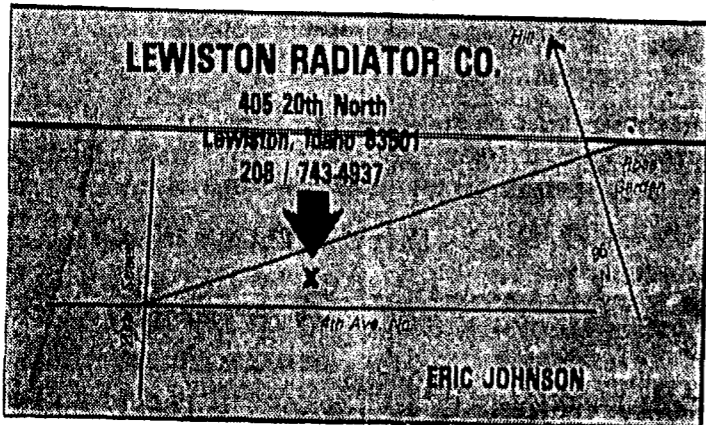

DIRECT DEPOSIT OF SOCIAL SECURITY CHECKS HAS ADVANTAGES

People in the Palouse Empire area who receive Social Security or supplemental security income checks can reap several advantages if they choose to have them deposited directly into an account in a financial institution. Ila Andrews, Social Security field representative in Pullman, said recently.

Checks can be deposited directly into an account in a bank, savings and loan association or similar institution, or Federal or State chartered credit union.

Direct deposit means that people do not have to stand in line to cash or deposit the check; that money

is always available even if the person is away from home; there are no check cashing problems; and there is no worry about the check being lost or stolen.

To arrange for direct deposit, the person should contact the financial organization of his or her choice and ask for a direct deposit from SF-1199. Completion of the form only

authorizes deposits into a person's account.

A person should check and find out how the financial organization will handle the account and whether there is any charge for the service.

To stop direct deposit so that the check will be delivered to a person's home or elsewhere, the person should contact his or her Social Security

PRETTY FLAMES FROM TREATED LOGS MAY BE RISKY

Most everyone enjoys a beautiful log fire in an open fireplace, especially at this time of year.

Many people think adding a bit of extra color to the dancing flames makes it just that much nicer, but treated logs can be dangerous even before they are burned if small children or pets should happen to put pieces if them in their mouths, says a University of Idaho Extension farm safety specialist. "Some of the chemicals in the logs contain heavy metals and could cause gastrointestinal pain and vomiting," said Tom Karsky.

Shirley Nilsson, extension home furnishing specialist, said not only are some of the chemicals dangerous if consumed but a fireplace with a poor draft could allow fumes laden with the heavy metals to escape into the air in the house.

She said that copper, barium, strontium and borate salts are all poisonous and should be avoided when buying or preparing logs for colored flames. Sodium, calcium and potassium are all safe, she said.

The safe chemicals produce red yellow, purple-red and reddish orange flames, she said. "Most flames from wood naturally have these colors. It likely is safest to stay away from the chemicals and enjoy nat-

ure's colors in the flames." She also warned that the inks used in printing colored sections in newspapers may contain some of the hazardous materials. "When making newspaper logs, colored magazine sections and comic sections should be discarded for safety's sake," she noted.

Karsky also warned that no foods should be cooked or heated over a fire made with treated logs, artificial logs (pressed sawdust type) or newspaper logs that might have colored inks. "The toxic chemicals in these materials will be present in the gases above the fire and will contaminate the food."

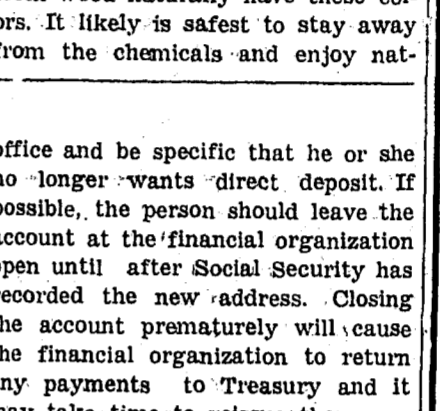

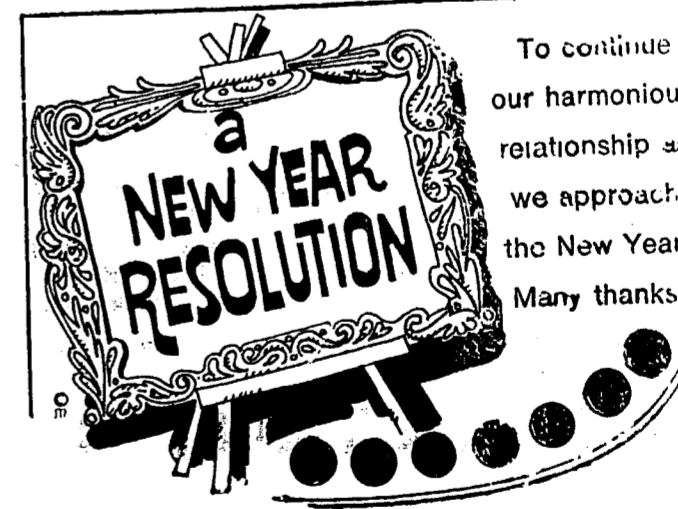
