Ray Snyder, owner and manager of Snyder's Carpet Service in Kendrick, recently purchased the old Kendrick Theatre building and is now in the process of remodeling the said he plans to move his carpet service into the store and also add a line of hardware items. At present, Mr. Snyder operates his firm from the old post office building.

The purchase and remodeling of the theatre closes an almost fiftyyear chapter in the history of Kendrick and this area. The theatre was opened in the late 1920's when a group of Kendrick businessmen purchased the building that had once housed the Kendrick Garage. Later, brothers Herman and Otto Schupfer acquired the ownership of the movie house, leasing it for a short while to Allen Zell. Later, the Schupfer brothers, who also owned the Potlatch Telephone Company, took over the operation of the business themselves, operating the business on a regular basis until the early 1970's.

The coming of television was the beginning of the end for small town movie houses and the Kendrick Theatre was no exception. Films were run on a weekend basis near the end of the theatre's life and then finally on an occasional basis. Bud and Marilyn Eichner and Jerry Brown reopened the show in the winter of '78 and '79 but finally closed that spring.

The building set idle except for an occasional use at Festival time . until Snyder purchased the structure recently from Mrs. Eichner and her sister, Beverly Morris, now of Bonn, Germany. They are daughters of the late Herman Schupfer.

Snyder said he plans to remodel the front of the building, put a new roof on the building, raise the floor and add dock space in the back. The interior of the structure will provide about 30x70 feet of room.
