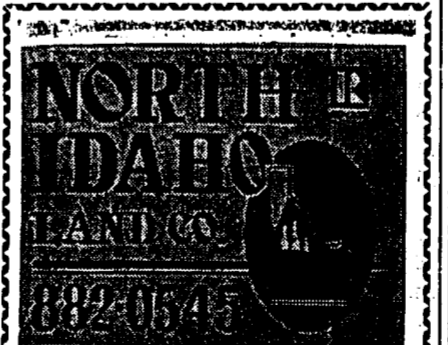

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Campsite Reservations Being At Ponderosa Near McCall

Reservations for campsites at Ponderosa State Park near McCall are being accepted now, but only by mail. Send reservations requests to Ponderosa State Park, Box A, McCall, ID 83638, with a five dollar reservation fee. The five dollar fee is an increase from last year, up from two dollars. It is non-refundable and does not apply to camping fees.

Phone reservations will be accepted after June 1, when the Park visitor/information center opens.

Park Manager Rick Cummins noted that only one-half of the 170 campsites at Ponderosa are reservable; the others are on a first-come, first-served basis.

Cummins advises campers wishing to camp at Ponderosa this summer to make their reservations early. Reservations must be received ten days prior to the reservation date.

Department officials noted that reservations for campsites are avail-

able at two other very popular Idaho State Parks—Farragut State Park and Priest Lake State Park in north Idaho. Those reservations can be made by contacting the North Region Office of the Idaho Department of Parks and Recreation at 1938 N. Lincoln Way, Coeur d'Alene, Idaho, or call 667-1511.

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21 ROCKY MOUNTAIN BIGHORNS MOVE FROM WYOMING TO IDAHO

Twenty-one Rocky Mountain bighorn sheep with an appetite for apple pulp are checking out new surroundings in Idaho's Little Lost River drainage.

The relocation carried out by the Department of Fish and Game started

in Wyoming's Whiskey Basin area where the apple pulp used for bait lured three rams, 13 ewes, and five lambs to drop nets.

They have been relocated on historic bighorn range in Idaho in line with department policy to reintroduce bighorns "into presently suitable ranges by trapping and transplanting stocks from out-of-state."

Last December, 12 California bighorns in Owyhee County were moved from the Deep Creek area to start a new herd in the Bruneau River drainage.

A senior wildlife research biologist headed up the Whiskey Basin operation. The sheep were transported in two trucks to Idaho Falls the first day and released on their

new range the following morning.

Personnel from the Bureau of Land Management and U. S. Forest Service helped out at the release site. Relocations are always carried out in cooperation with other land management agencies that may be involved, a department spokesman said.

Conley Elms - Bill Pogue memorial award established by Wildlife Federation

The Idaho Wildlife Federation has established the Conley Elms-Bill Pogue Memorial Award for "sacrifice, dedication and contribution to the cause of conservation," president Karl E. Holte announced Dec. 10. "We are honoring these department of Fish and Game officers who during their lifetime devoted so much of their efforts toward a better understanding of the land and its resources," Holte said in presenting the award to department officials.

Elms and Pogue were killed in the line of duty two years ago while investigating reports of illegal activity in southwestern Owyhee Co.

The award will be on permanent display at the department headquarters building in Boise. Names of future recipients will be added to the plaque—not necessarily on an annual basis—upon recommendation by a selection committee, Holte explained. According to the federation guidelines, a recipient shall:

—Be or have been an Idaho resident and demonstrated a forthright, dedicated interest in the land and its resources.

—Have worked through citizen participation and/or professional career to achieve or advance enlightened management in the cause of conservation.

—Have gone the extra mile in personal commitment to uphold and perpetuate conservation of land, wildlife and other related natural resources.

MOSCOW PUBLIC LIBRARY

CLOSED MONDAY, JANUARY 24

The Moscow Public Library will be closed Monday, January 24 in order to finish moving the adult department into the new addition. The Library should be open for business at 9:00 Tuesday morning, Jan. 25.

"There will be some inconvenience for library users for a couple of months," said head librarian Gloria Ghrman. The adult department may be entered through the new front door, but there will be no publicly accessible interior link with the children's department downstairs. The Second Street entrance must still be used to gain access to the children's department. All of the furniture has not yet arrived either,

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so all the potential seating capacity of the addition will not be immediately available.

These conditions will exist for about two to three months while workmen finish the renovation of the old Carnegie building and the children's department moves upstairs to the same level as the adult department. Gehman urges those inconvenienced to stave off their crankiness by thinking how proud they will be of the completed library and its eventually—improved accessibility.

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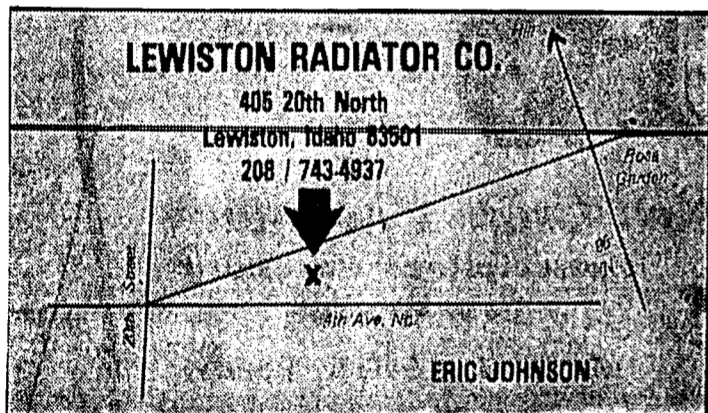
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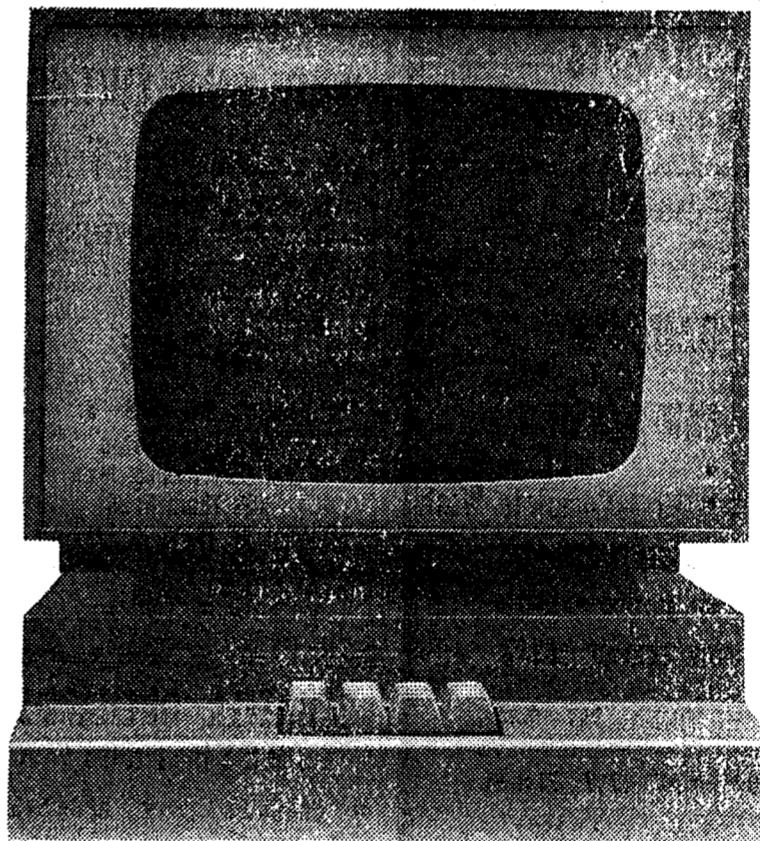
