Roger Broemeling, Sr., former Genesee resident observed his 89th birthday anniversary Saturday, January 29, 1983.

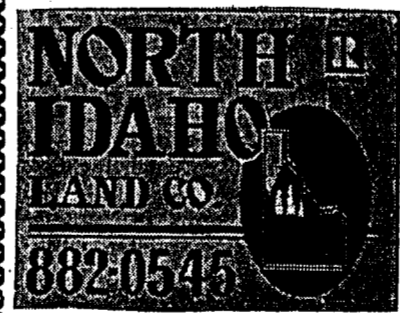
About 27 members of the Washington Old Time Fiddlers Association surprised him with a birthday party at Tri-State Convalescent Center, Clarkston, Wa.

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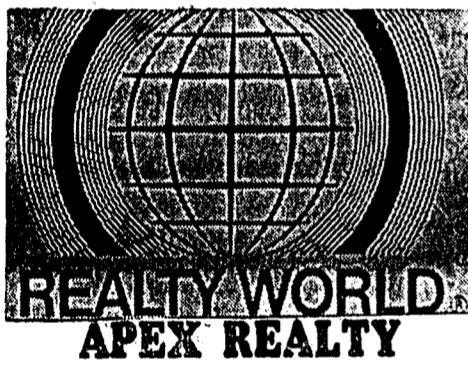
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Photo Exhibit Depicts History of Bighorns

The "Return of the Ram," a photographic essay on Rocky Mountain bighorn sheep in the Big Lost River range, will be on display in the Idaho Statehouse January 17-27. Free lance photographer John Marshall has produced the exhibit

for his master's degree in wildlife at the University of Idaho. He has a B. S. in fisheries science from Oregon State University. "The photographs follow the history of the bighorns through a cycle that shows their abundance before the whiteman came; their eventual disappearance from the range and finally their return to a healthy population," Marshall said. Twenty-four bighorns from Alberta, Canada, were moved to the Big Lost River range in 1970. "Ten years later, 182 sheep were counted in the area," he added. Marshall said he had put in more than two years on the project, including 12 weeks spent photographing the bighorns in their wild environment.

"With the cooperation of the Department of Fish and Game, we plan to make it a traveling exhibit after its showing in the Capitol," he said. Funding for his work was provided by the Wildlife Management and American Petroleum Institutes.

S. & R. Unit Needs Help:

Latah County is very fortunate to have a well-trained Search and Rescue organization. Like many other emergency-type units, this unit is always ready to respond to any situation that aids citizens of the area.

What many people do not realize about Search and Rescue is that the organization does much more than respond to emergency crisis. The S. & R. unit is involved in a continuous self improvement program. The organization has some of the best first aid and C. P. R. instructors in the area. These people are ready and willing to provide their services, free of charge to any organization. During the past four years, members of the S. & R. unit have trained many citizens in the techniques of prevention and response to emergencies that exist. The unit members have provided training to schools, boy scouts and girl scout troops, church groups and other groups in the area.

It is important that citizens of the area realize that all time, energies and expenses are donated by members of the organization. Sometimes this includes, loss of wages, auto expense, food, etc. depending on the nature and extent of the search. One of the big problems facing the S. & R. unit is purchase and maintenance of training equipment, especially the Resnsci-Anne, or training manikins. These units cost from \$350.00 to \$2,000.00 each. For the past four years three units have been available for training. A fourth unit was just purchased along with repairs on existing units at a cost of \$850.00.

Like any other nonprofit organization S. & R. needs funds to continue it's operation. The organization issues a plea for help from any individual, business or service group that could help keep the S. & R. services available.

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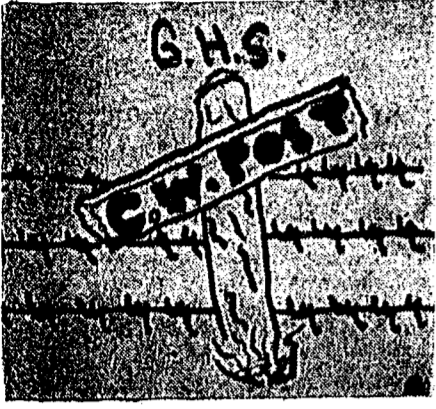

COMMISSION APPROVES FISHERIES, BIG GAME MANAGEMENT PLANS
 The Fish and Game Commission spent a busy two days in Boise, January 20-21, with an agenda that included approval of five-year plans for statewide management of Idaho's fisheries and six big game species.
 Commissioners also elected Sandpoint publisher E. G. 'Pete' Thompson as commission chairman for 1983. Thompson is serving his second term on the commission and this is also

the second time that he has been chairman.

General management direction, major management programs and statewide problems are covered in the fisheries plan. Another section proposes specific management guidelines for each drainage, its habitat and most important fisheries.
 Idaho becomes a leader among western states in long-range programs for big game with commission approval of plan for antelope, moose,

bighorn sheep, mountain goat, black bear and mountain lion. The plans for deer and elk were approved last year.

Similar plans for upland game and waterfowl were cleared by the commission for a series of public review meetings throughout the state within the next few months.

UI PUBLICATION TELLS HOW ALFALFA VARIETIES PERFORM

Clifton Anderson Associate Agricultural Editor

Moscow, Idaho—Resistance to disease and insects is one of the important considerations a farmer should keep in mind when he is deciding which alfalfa varieties to grow, said an Ensign University of Idaho agronomist.

"Variety selection also should be based on potential forage yield, winter hardiness, persistence of stand from year to year, and ability to make rapid regrowth after each cutting," Ensign said.

To help farmers evaluate alfalfa varieties, the UI College of Agriculture has issued a publication, "Alfalfa Variety Performance and Use," Current Information Series No. 635. Priced at 25¢ per copy, it is available at county offices of the UI Cooperative Extension Service.

Ensign is a co-author of the publication, together with D. E. Brown, senior agronomist at Land O'Lakes, Inc., Caldwell, and C. G. Howard, plant materials manager for the U. S. Soil Conservation Service, Aberdeen.

The publication reports on variety trials, conducted at Aberdeen, Caldwell, Kimberly, Moscow and Sandpoint.

In the three-state Pacific Northwest region, Idaho ranks first in alfalfa hay production. Nationally, Idaho ranks seventh. More than one million acres of Gem State alfalfa yielded a total of 3.6 million tons of hay in 1979. The 1982 crop was larger—an estimated 3.1 million tons.

"Alfalfa hay, pasture and silage provide the major harvested forage for dairy and beef cattle in Idaho. There seems to be a good demand for high-quality alfalfa hay in the

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Pacific Northwest," Ensign said. Idaho produced 16 million pounds of alfalfa seed on 42,000 acres in 1979. The state is second only to California in alfalfa seed production. Idaho seed growers who produce certified seed grew 85 alfalfa varieties and selections in 1980. Idaho-grown seed is distributed and sold to major foreign-producing areas in the U. S. and Canada.
