Farm Elements of PIK Program Noted

(Editor's note: This is the last part of a story concerning the provisions of the payment-in-kind program, recently announced by the USDA...)

Loan and CCC-Owned Grain Stocks To Be Used as Payment

Producers entering into the PIK program will be automatically agreeing to liquidate those existing outstanding regular nine-month and farmer-owned reserve loans equal to the amount of grain they expect to receive as payment in kind. For it is the commodities pledged as security under these loans that producers will be required to make available to CCC so that it can be returned to the farmer as payment in kind. The quantity made available will be required to be at least equal to the total quantity the farmer would receive as payment in kind. USDA estimates that 75 percent of participants in the PIK program will have adequate stocks under loan to serve as compensation.

As long as producers are signed up to participate in the PIK program, they will not be permitted to forfeit or redeem their outstanding loans for those commodities they would receive as payment in kind. Producers with no commodity loans to pledge as security for payment in kind will be required to accept title to CCC-owned grain within five months of the date of entitlement, USDA says that commodities for these producers will be made available at the local warehouse of the producer's choice if possible. However CCC says that if sufficient quantities of grain are not available in the producer's county, it will seek to honor the payment in kind at a warehouse in an adjoining county, or the nearest warehouse that is "in-line" to the sub-erminal facility. In either case, once the producer takes title to the PIK grain, he is liable for all ensuing storage charges and other costs.






