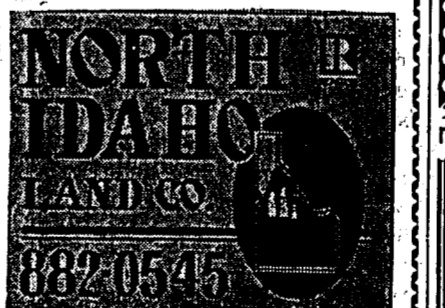

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**From Our Legislators**

**from Rep. Claud Judd**  
House Bill 180  
Well, House Bill 180, packaged to meet the 1983 deficit, passed the House 38 yeas and 32 no. I voted no because the bill did nothing for local government, cities and counties.

It cut State funding in several areas and passed those costs on to the local level. The one-cent increase in sales tax was to go directly to the State general account and none of it went to the sales tax formula which would have given counties and cities some help. Seems like it is the old game here—Fed passes buck to State and State passes buck onto the local level. Being a past chairman of the school board and a county commissioner, I think we should have given more consideration to helping local government. House Bill 180 passed the Senate today with a vote of 19 to 16. The 50/50 initiative still lies in the Revenue and Tax Committee. It will also make some changes on taxes

at the city and county level. Momentum is picking up on more and more bills. I have had contacts from many people in District 7 and haven't returned letters or calls on all of them yet, because I have been waiting for some developments. I appreciate hearing from you.

**Rep. Carl Braun Seeks Constituents' Opinions**

You will recall on my campaign trail I said we needed to recheck our whole spectrum of state government, cut whatever we could, then make our priorities as we saw them. If the cost of those programs wasn't within our budget (not enough money) then we had no alternative but to "raise" taxes. After three weeks here in Boise, one thing is very apparent, no one wants to cut programs—Education, Health and Welfare, Transportation, etc. So the legislature has one of two choices; finance or not to finance.

Lets transgress a bit. Hindsight tells us a lot if we want to take a look. Personally I felt we should have taken that look at our short-fall right after the Primary Election when we realized we did indeed have a shortage. From then on our economy grew progressively worse. By all means there should have been one immediately after the Organizational Session when all legislators were in town and could have taken the steps necessary at little cost to the State.

What was apparent then, is apparent now. Had we imposed a 2c sales tax and a surtax fee on income tax, we would not have the \$89 million burden now. Each cent of sales tax raises approximately \$45 million to the general fund. That was six months ago, and counting the Christmas trade that could have generated about 45 to \$50 million from sales taxes not counting the surtax on income tax.

If you are still with me thus far, I can imagine what you are thinking or what is going through your minds (We sent a little demon to Boise). Let's think of it this way, we have an unemployment rate of 10.5% That means one out of ten (round numbers is not working and it is understandable that most are not buying anymore than they have to; consequently they are paying just what they can in taxes. Those more fortunate will be paying more. It's as simple (and hard) as that, but the problem is now. Not in 1984 or 1985—but in 1983. It is broadbased—those who have it pay it. This is my thinking, let me have yours.

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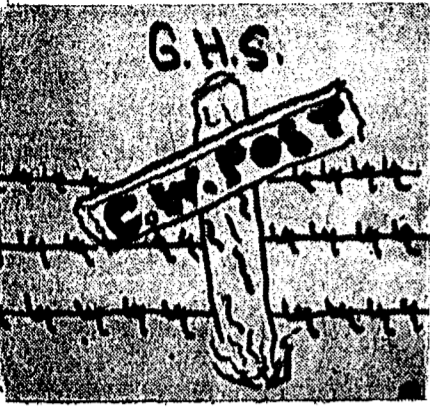

### Rep. Craig Seeks Summer Interns

Washington—U. S. Representative Larry Craig (R-Idaho) is seeking applications for the 1983 Lyndon Baines Johnson Bi-partisan Intern Program.

The program provides participants from across the United States the opportunity to spend a month working in a congressional office.

"This program, designed to give students an 'insiders' look' at Capitol Hill, has been tremendously successful," Craig said. "The program is intended to provide an educational experience for the participants," he added.

The internship program is open to permanent Congressional District residents between the ages of 18 and 22 who are enrolled and have completed one year of study in an institution of higher learning. Applicants must reach their 18th birthday by May 1, 1983.

The internships cover a one month period from May through August. The salary for the month is \$890.

Interns are given the opportunity to participate in the work of a congressional staff. Work centers on a major research project to be completed during the internship, and includes typing, filing and attending committee meetings. There will also be opportunities to attend legislative briefings, floor sessions and legislative seminars.

Applications for the program can be obtained through the Congressman's Washington, D. C. or Boise offices. In addition applicants must submit transcripts of college and/or high school grades, an essay of up to 250 words explaining why the applicant would like to be a Congressional intern and certification of enrollment in college, university or other institution of higher education during the academic year previous to internship.

Interns are responsible for securing housing in the Washington area. Dormitory facilities are usually available at universities and colleges in the area.

All applications for the internship program must be received at the office of Congressman Larry Craig, 1318 Longworth House Office Building, Washington, D. C. 20515, postmarked no later than March 19, 1983. Notification of selection will be announced by April 1, 1983.

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### How to File Earnings Report For Social Security Recipients

People receiving Social Security benefits who worked and earned over the earnings limit during 1982 are required to file reports of their earnings with the Social Security Administration by April 15. For a number of reasons, it is important that the report is accurate and reflects realistic planning.

The report is essentially a statement of your last year's earnings. It also includes information on how much you expect to earn this year. Social Security uses the information to determine if your past checks were in the right amount and whether benefits are due this year.

In general, people 65 and over who earned under \$6,000 last year do not need to report; this is also true for people under 65 who earned under \$4,440 and people who were 72 and over during all of 1982. Earnings over the earnings limit will cause benefits to be reduced \$1 for every \$2 in excess earnings. In 1983 the earnings limits are 6,000 for people 65 and over, and \$4,920 for beneficiaries under age 65. The age at which the earnings test no longer applies is now 70.

People who do not take the time to file realistic estimates of current year earnings risk receiving benefit overpayments—money to which they are not entitled. The law requires that over payments be repaid to Social Security. Generally, this is done by withholding portions of future checks until the full amount is repaid.

However, if it is shown that the failure to report was intentional, a person may be prosecuted for fraud. During the past year, the Social Security Administration stepped up its efforts to collect debts owed the Government and to detect and prevent fraud. The agency collected \$1 billion in overpayments in Fiscal Year 1982 and obtained 284 criminal convictions for fraud during calendar year 1981.

The best way to avoid overpayments is to report any change in your earnings that is significantly different from what you've already estimated. It's true that Social Security has records of all of your earnings reported by your employers but if you wait until Social Security notifies you that you've been over paid, the overpayment is usually substantially more than it would have been if you had reported the change in earnings when you learned of it.

Changes can be reported to the Social Security Office by calling toll free 1-800-562-6350 in Washington and 1-800-632-5121 in Idaho. You may also report by contacting the Pullman Office at S. E. 1205 Johnson Avenue, Pullman, WA 99163. Ask for an "Annual Report of Earnings form."

### Hunters, Anglers Spend \$150 Million in Idaho

Hunters and anglers spent almost \$150 million going after Idaho fish and game in 1980 according to a survey just released by two federal agencies.

Expenditures for fishing were close to \$79 million and hunting activities produced about \$70 million for the economy., the Department of Interior and Commerce reported in their "1980 National Survey of

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Fishing, Hunting and Wildlife-Associated Recreation."

The survey produced a national report and individual reports for each state. In Idaho 2,130 households were screened for participants in wildlife-associated activities and 720 persons were later interviewed in person to arrive at the statistical results.

Funding for the survey came from excise taxes on fishing and hunting gear under the Federal Aid for Fish

and Wildlife Restoration Acts. Expenditures in Idaho were separated in major categories that included food and lodging, transportation and equipment.

Money spent for food and lodging while fishing and hunting amounted to more than \$31 million. Transportation expenses totaled almost \$30 million and the purchase of hunting and fishing equipment cost about \$28 million, the report showed.
