





How to File Earnings Report For Social Security Recipients

People receiing Social Security

benefits who worked and earned ov-Administration by April 15. For a number of reasons, it is important that the report is accurate and reflects realistic planning.

The report is essentially a statement of your last year's earnings It also includes information on how much you expect to earn this year. Social Security uses the information Social Security uses the information to determine if your past checks were in the right amount and whe-ther benefits are due this year ther benefits are due this year. In general, people 65 and over who earned under \$6,000 last year do not need to report: this is also 'true for people under 65 who earned under \$4,440 and people who were 72 and over during all of 1982. Earnings over the earnings limit will cause benefits to be reduced \$1 for every \$2 in excess earnings. In 1983 the earnings limits are 6,000 for people 65 and over, and \$4,920 for beneficiaries under age 65. The age at which the earnings test no longer applies is now 70.

People who do not take the time to file realistic estimates of current year earnings risk receiving benefit overpayments-money to which they are not entitled. The law requires that over payments be repaid to Social Security. Generally, this is done by witholding portions of future checks until the full amount is re-


