Pearle E. Long, 89, Passes March 9

Pearle Elizabeth Long, a Kendrick area resident since 1898, died of causes incident to aging on her 89th birthday Wednesday, March 9 at Latah Convalescent Center in Moscow where she had been a resident for the past two years. Mrs. Long was born March 9, 1894 at Tina, Missouri, the daughter of Burrell and Laura Emmett. In 1898 she came west with her parents by train where the family settled on Little Bear Ridge as ranchers. The family stayed there until Pearle was about 14 years old. Then they moved to Kendrick where the parents operated a hotel. Pearle worked as a waitress in the hotel dining room. She later worked for one of the two local private telephone companies in Kendrick.

Pearle and Edgar Long were united in marriage October 22, 1914 in Kendrick. He passed away in 1958. For about 30 years, Pearle was a clerk in the N. B. Long Store in Kendrick which was operated by her brother-in-law, the late Marvin Long. She thoroughly enjoyed this work, since it brought her in contact with many people. Pearle was an energetic and very thoughtful person, with much concern for her children. She was a most hospitable and caring lady and was always doing something for others, often entertaining.

During World War 11, she corresponded with 30 to 40 service men and women, an act that endeared her to those she wrote to. For almost 30 years she taught Sunday School and was active in the Presbyterian Church, which later became the Community Church.

Pearle's hobbies included many handicrafts and flower and vegetable gardening and cooking. She also had a collection of different translations of the 23rd Psalm, including one in an Indian dialect. She had been a member of the Rebekah Lodge since 1913. Survivors include a son, Roy Long of Spokane; a daughter, Barbara Maxwell of Lawrence, Kansas; two sisters Edna Rierson of Troy, Idaho and Olive Dammarell of Kendrick; 8 grandchildren and 14 great-grandchildren and a number of nieces and nephews.

A graveside service was held in the Spokane Memorial Gardens on Saturday, March 12. She was buried beside her husband, Edgar.

A memorial service for Pearle will be held in the Kendrick Community Church Friday, March 18, at 10 a.m.

School Board to Install New Traffic Signs In High School Area

The regular meeting of the Kendrick, Jt. School Dist. Board of Trustees was held Thursday evening at the Kendrick High School board room at 7:30 p. m. Old business included an up-date on the high school traffic safety concern of the road between the main high school campus and the vocational agricultural building and physical education playing field. The State of Idaho Department of Transportation will construct a sign just off the state highway on their right-of-way warning of school zone and a 15-mile per hour speed limit. A similar sign will be posted by the city on the football light post for traffic com-

ing from Little Bear Ridge. Likewise, action was taken by the board to award Valuations of Idaho the job of doing a district-wide inventory of buildings and contents to establish a baseline for insurance purposes. The staff report was given by Mr. Rick Dirksen, vocational agriculture teacher at Kendrick High School. His report consisted of a tour through the vocational agriculture building to see the many changes that have occurred during the past 20 months. These changes included a large metal student bench with lockers beneath constructed by the Vo. Ag. teacher for working on small engines. Likewise, new sturdy student benches for general shop use were constructed on the periphery of the shop. A wire mesh storage closet for storing welding metal was constructed as well as new maintenance barrels on rollers. General reorganization of the shop facilities have occurred dividing the shop into areas of welding, grinder work, work shop work and small engines. At the conclusion of the tour, the board was shown an area of cement work between the Vo. Ag. building and the dike where students have received some practical experience in cement work that corresponds to their course of study. New business consisted of declaring an A. B. Dick off-set printing press surplus property to be sold at the highest bid. Review of the preliminary budget for the 1983-81 school year was done but could not be finalized until the state legislature completes their budget process since 80% of Kendrick Jt. School District's revenue comes from the State of Idaho. Likewise, a field trip for high school business students to the OEA convention at Pocatello April 6-9 was authorized as well as a band trip to Spokane in April or May. The regular April board meeting was changed from Thursday, April 14 to Tuesday, April 12.

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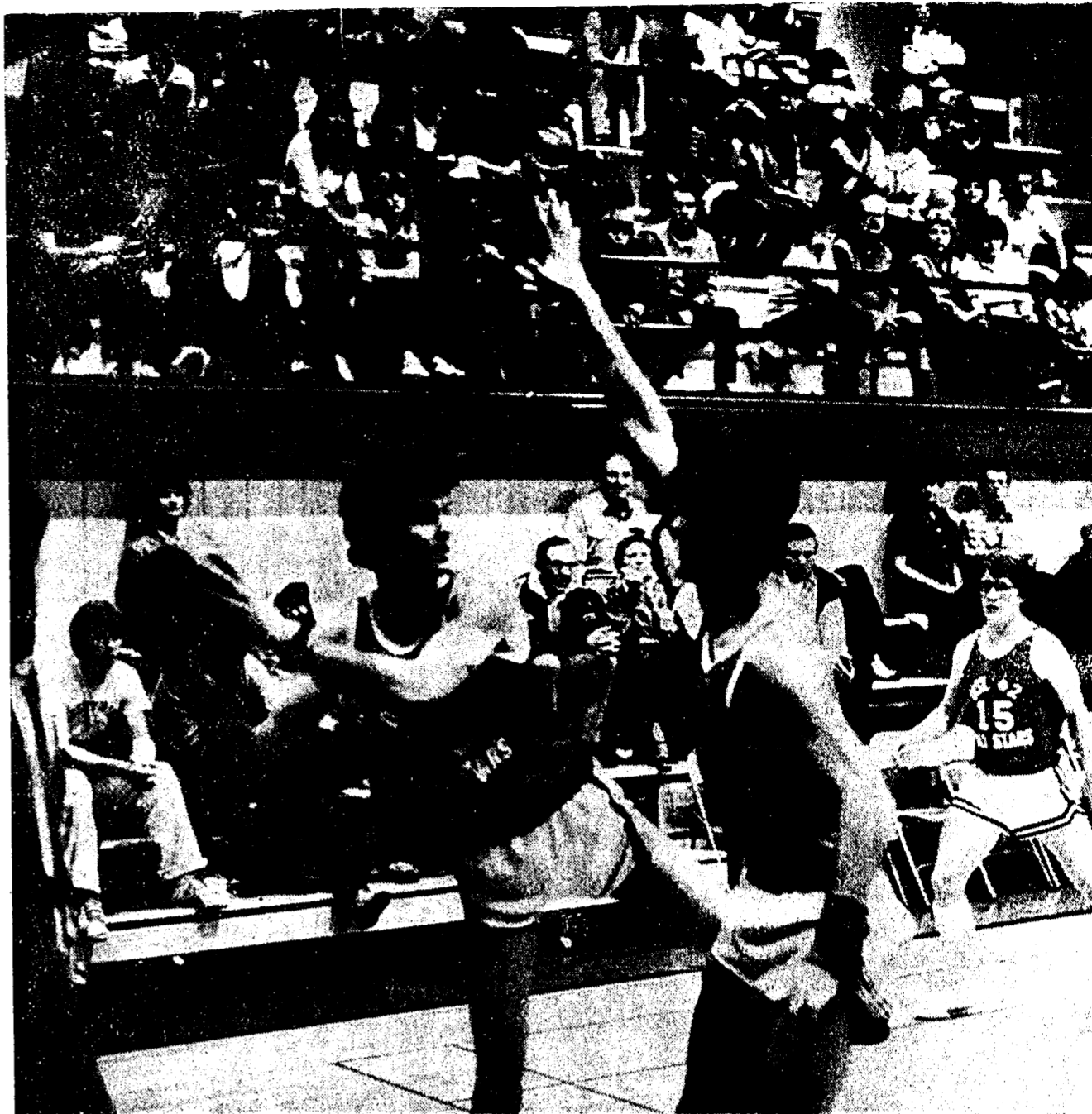
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Area Cagers In All-Star Game

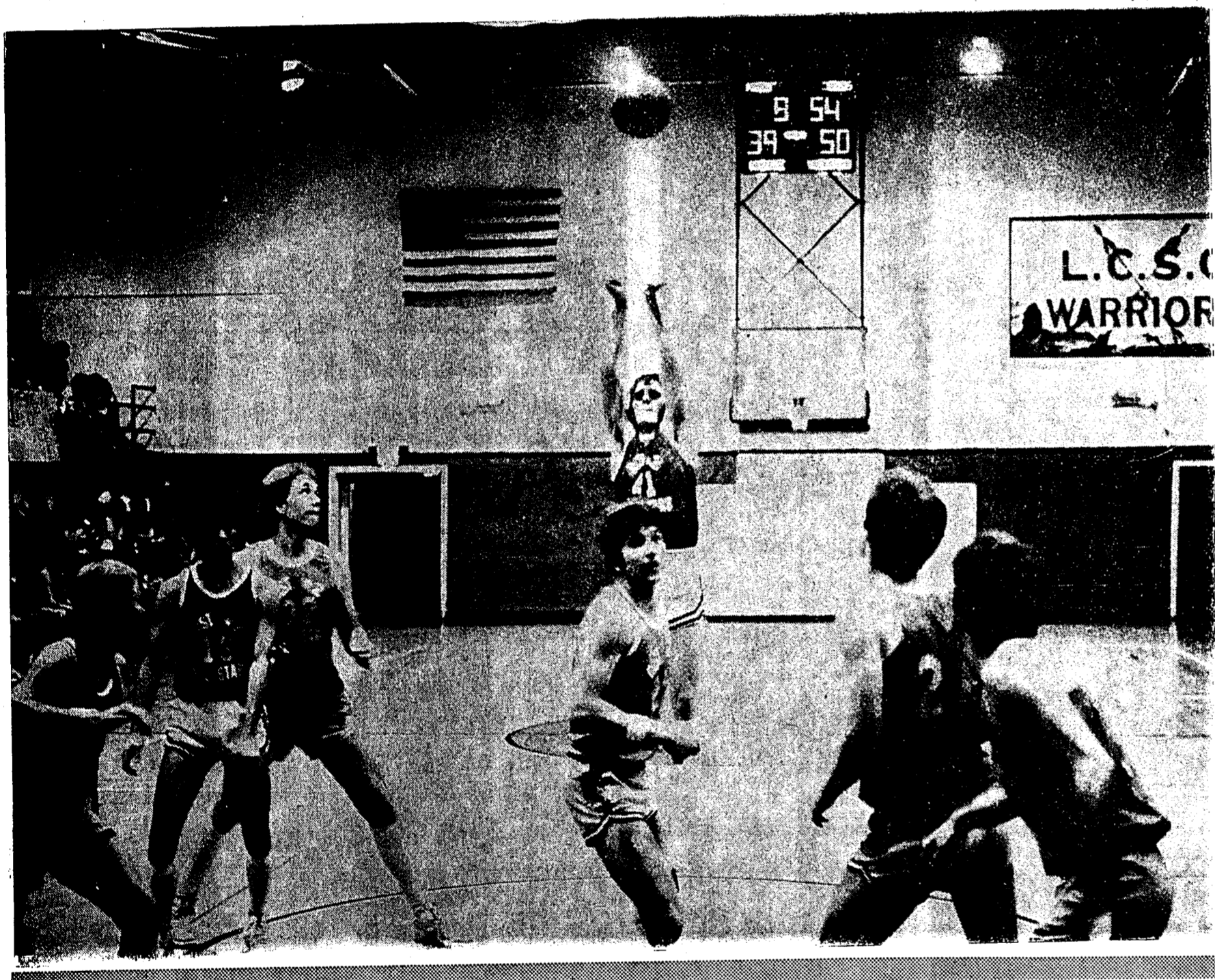

Cereals and Lentils Thrive Under Conservation Tillage

Conservation tillage is gaining acceptance in all erosion-prone farming areas of the Pacific Northwest, according to six farmers who spoke at the recent Idaho-Washington Conservation Tillage Conference.

Reporting on their experiences with no-till and minimum-tillage systems, the producers said their winter wheat and barley yields have been good and problems with plant diseases, weeds and insect pests have been manageable.

Cereal growers who include lentils in their rotations said the spring-sown lentil crop thrives under minimum tillage. Lentils apparently like the cool temperature conditions that prevail in untilled soil, said Jim Druffel of Colton, Wash.

"People who've tried peas with no-till have been disappointed, but lentils work fine. Although we were told our land is too dry for lentils, we have good crops because no-till conserves the moisture. The lentils are real clean, too, seeded in wheat stubble," Druffel said.

Dick Bencoter, Kendrick Farmer, said he became sold on conservation tillage when he tried seeding lentils on barley stubble. "They were the best lentils I'd grown. Lentils do well on no-till since they need more moisture than peas or wheat," Bencoter said. He grew 85 acres of no-till lentils last year. He also grows wheat and grass seed.

Fields infested by Canada thistle need repeated herbicide treatments when conventional tillage is discontinued, Bencoter said.

Minimum tillage increases the soil's content of organic matter, said Dick Lloyd of Lewiston. "Organic matter helps the soil to take in water and grow a reasonably good crop even when it's a dry year," he said.

Growing wheat in an area where summer fallow is still being practiced, Lloyd plants a crop each year and finds that his yields average out better than those of summer-fallow farmers. Fertilizer placement must

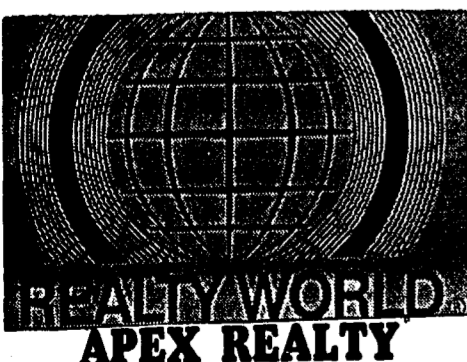
be managed carefully on fields that receive little or no tillage, he said. "You want to feed the wheat, not the weeds."

Straw and other crop residues pose problems for no-till farmers, according to two growers—Jim Scott of Pomeroy, Wash., and Sam Wade of Enterprise, Ore. No-till drills are difficult to operate on trashy fields, they pointed out.

Control of erosion in the Palouse will require changes in tillage and in all other crop production practices of the region, said Read Smith of St. John, Wash. He urged farmers to plant grass and trees on land that is highly susceptible to erosion damage.

"It's more economical to take out of production steep land that erodes badly and intensify production on less erodible land. Each farmer should add a conservation plan to his total farm program," Smith said.

Smith served as the moderator of the farmers' panel discussion of tillage practices. Scientists, extension specialists and agribusiness representatives also spoke at the conservation tillage conference. The two-day conference was sponsored by the Inland Empire chapter of the Soil Conservation Society of America, in cooperation with the University of Idaho, Washington State University, U. S. Department of Agriculture agencies, Idaho and Washington conservation districts, and the Pacific Northwest No-Till Assoc.



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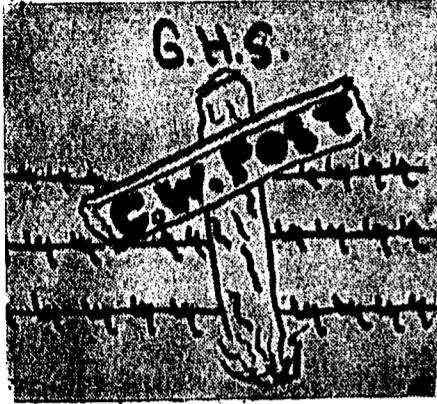

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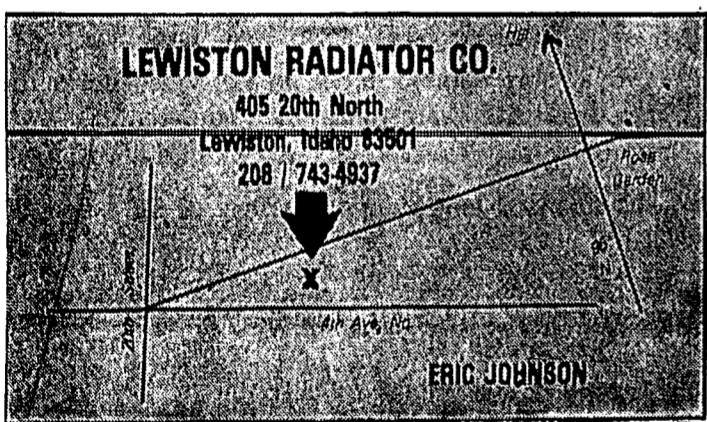
