

Cereals and Lentils Thrive Under Conservation Tillage

Conservation tillage is gaining acceptance in all erosion-prone farming areas of the Pacific Northwest, according to six farmers prevail in untilled soil, said Jim Drufwho spoke at the recent Idaho-Washington Conservation Tillage fel of Colton, Wash. Conference.

Reporting on their experiences with no-till and minimum-tillage systems, the producers said their winter wheat and barley yields have been good and problems with plant diseases, weeds and insect pests have been manageable.




