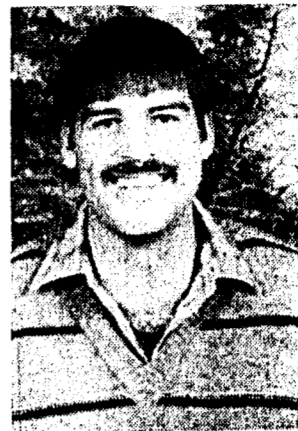

Genesee, Kendrick Coaches and Players Selected for State Athletic Honors

Coaches and athletes from Kendrick and Genesee High Schools received state-wide recognition this past week as they were named best in the state by the Boise Idaho Statesman newspaper as part of its annual all-state basketball teams. Ozzie Kanikkeberg of Genesee was selected as Class A-4 Boys Coach of the Year. Jay Henderson of Kendrick was named Class A-4 Girls basketball Coach of the Year.

Lisa Vallem of Kendrick was named the Class A-4 girl player of the year and her teammate Jane Glenn was selected for the second team honors. Don Rice of Kendrick was picked for the all-star boys second team by the Boise newspaper.

This was the third Genesee High School team that the highly respected Ozzie Kanikkeberg had guided to a state championship in 28 years

at GHS. His 1983 Bulldog boys team won the Class A-4 title in Twin Falls earlier this month.

The selection of Kendrick Coach Jay Henderson as A-1 Coach of the year in girls' basketball was a singularly impressive one, as this was the first time the young KHS teacher had assumed the responsibility as a head coach, but he brought honor to himself and his school as he guided his Tigers to an outstanding season, culminating with the winning of the state championship at Twin Falls in February.

Lisa Vallem's honor at being named "Player of Year" was a fitting climax to her high school basketball career. For the past three years Miss Vallem has consistently been considered one of the best girl players in the state. She is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Gale Vallem of Juliaetta.

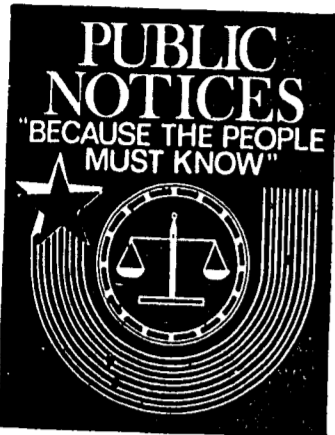

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF GENESSEE AMENDING TITLE TWO, CHAPTER THREE, SECTION EIGHT OF THE CITY CODE OF GENESSEE, IDAHO, BY PROVIDING FOR A THREE DOLLAR (\$3.00) LATE CHARGE ON WATER CHARGES NOT PAID BY THE 15th DAY OF EACH MONTH, PROVIDING FOR THE ISSUANCE OF A NOTICE OF DELINQUENCY ON WATER CHARGES NOT PAID BY THE 20th DAY OF EACH MONTH, PROVIDING FOR THE SERVICE OF A NOTICE OF DELINQUENCY ON WATER USERS, PROVIDING FOR MAILING OF A COPY OF THE NOTICE OF DELINQUENCY TO THE OWNERS OF PROPERTY ON WHICH WATER IS USED, PROVIDING FOR THE CONTENTS OF THE NOTICE OF DELINQUENCY, PROVIDING FOR WATER SERVICE TO BE DISCONTINUED AND THE WATER SHUT OFF FOR NONPAYMENT OF WATER CHARGES AND LATE CHARGES BY THE END OF EACH MONTH, AND PROVIDING THAT WATER SERVICE SHALL NOT BE RESTORED UNTIL THE PAYMENT OF APPLICABLE CHARGES, FEES AND DEPOSITS; AMENDING TITLE 2, CHAPTER 3, SECTION 11 (E) OF THE CITY CODE OF GENESSEE, IDAHO, BY PROVIDING THAT THE CITY SHALL NOT BE LIABLE FOR DAMAGES RESULTING FROM SHUTTING OFF OF WATER

ER DUE TO THE NONPAYMENT OF WATER CHARGES; AMENDING TITLE 2, CHAPTER 3, SECTION 11 (G), OF THE CITY CODE OF GENESSEE, IDAHO, BY PROVIDING THAT A WATER USER WHO HAS HAD HIS WATER SERVICE DISCONTINUED FOR FAILURE TO PAY WATER CHARGES SHALL DEPOSIT WITH THE CITY THE SUM OF THIRTY DOLLARS (\$30.00) AS SECURITY FOR THE PAYMENT OF SUBSEQUENT WATER CHARGES WHICH DEPOSIT SHALL BE APPLIED TO SUBSEQUENT UNPAID WATER CHARGES; AND PROVIDING FOR AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE MAYOR AND THE COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF GENESSEE, IDAHO:

SECTION 1. That Section 2-3-8 of the City Code of Genessee be, and the same hereby is, amended to read as follows:

2-3-8: DUE DATES: All water charges for water consumed shall be due and payable to the City Treasurer between the first day and the fifteenth day of each month and on failure to pay the same as prescribed every user shall pay, in addition to the amount due, a late charge of Three Dollars (\$3.00).

The City Treasurer shall make up a list of all users, whose charges are not paid and add a late charge of Three Dollars (\$3.00) to the statement of each user.

The City Treasurer shall prepare a list of all water users whose charges are not paid on or before the fifteenth day of each month and shall add a late charge of Three Dollars (\$3.00) to the statement of each user on said list and shall deliver the same to the officer charged with the collecting of delinquent water charges and said officer shall accept payment of said water charges plus late charge

ges until the twentieth day of each month. If the water charges and the late charges are not paid on or before the twentieth day of each month, the collecting officer shall cause to be served a written Notice of Delinquency on the water user personally or by leaving said Notice of Delinquency at the premises of the user and shall cause to be mailed by certified mail a copy of said Notice of Delinquency to the delinquent user, and to the owner of said property if the user is not also the owner. The Notice of Delinquency shall include (1) the name of the user; (2) a statement that the water charges have not been paid; (3) the amounts of payment due, including the late charge; (4) a statement that unless the full amount due is paid on or before the last day of the month the water service will be discontinued and the water will be shut off; and (5) a statement that if the water is shut off it will not be turned on until the past due water charges, including the late charges, plus a charge of Seven Dollars and Fifty Cents (\$7.50) for turning the water on and plus a deposit of Thirty Dollars (\$30.00) as security for the payment of future water charges are all paid in full. If the water charges including the late charge is not paid in full on or before the first day of the month the collecting officer shall cause the water of such user to be shut off and shall cause the water to be turned on again upon the payment of all applicable charges, fees, and deposits.

SECTION 2. That section 2-3-11 (E) of the City Code of Genessee be, and the same hereby is, amended to read as follows:

(E) The City shall not be held liable under any circumstances for any damages resulting from a deficiency or failure of water, whether by shutting off the water to make repairs or connections or by shutting off the water due to the nonpayment of water charges, or for any other cause whatsoever.

SECTION 3. That Section 2-3-11 (G) of the City Code of Genessee, be, and the same hereby is, amended to read as follows.

(G) a water user who has had his water service discontinued for failure to pay water charges shall be charged Seven Dollars and Fifty Cents (\$7.50) to have water service restored and such water users shall also deposit with the City the sum of Thirty Dollars (\$30.00) as security for the payment of future water charges which sum shall be applied against subsequent unpaid water charges before a Notice of Delinquency is issued.

SECTION 4. EFFECTIVE DATE: This Ordinance shall take effect and be in full force from and after its passage, approval and publication as required by law of the State of Idaho.

Lori Anderson is airlife nurse



If Airlife Northwest were to fly into western Idaho to transport an infant or pediatric patient, chances are that one of the specially-trained flight nurses on board would be a native of this region, Lauren (Lori) Anderson.

Lauren, the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Laverne Anderson of Genesee, and a granddaughter of Mr. and Mrs. R. D. Stout Lewiston, is one of 15 airlift Northwest nurses who rotate standby and flight duties. She is a member of the infant/pediatric medical team. In order to prepare her for the special needs of caring for critical patients while airborne, she received two weeks of intensive training, which is now updated monthly.

Lauren's regular nursing position is at Children's Orthopedic Hospital and medical Center in Seattle where she is assigned to the intensive care units. Children's is one of four regional referral centers in Seattle which cares for patients transported by Airlift Northwest.

Fee Firewood Permit System to be in use on Clearwater Forest

Starting May 1 there will be a \$10 charge for firewood permits on five of the six Clearwater National Forest ranger districts according to Acting Forest Supervisor John Underwood.

The Kelly Creek District will be a free firewood area. A free use permit will still be issued for this district. The Pierce, Powell, Palouse Lochsa and Canyon ranger districts will issue 10 permits which entitle the woodcutter up to 10 cords.

Persons aged 62 and over will still be able to secure firewood free in all ranger districts but a free use permit will still be required.

Underwood emphasized the charge firewood program on the Clearwater is in keeping with national Forest Service firewood policy which calls for a fee in areas where there is significant demand for wood. Areas with abundant supplies and little demand, such as the Kelly Creek District, can remain free under the national policy.

Underwood pointed out a large percentage of the firewood fee will

be retained on a National Forest to help defray the cost of administering the program. The funds may be used to generate more firewood in high demand areas or to make it more readily accessible to firewood gatherers. He also pointed out that some of the receipts from firewood permits will contribute to the 25 percent fund which returns to local counties for schools and roads.

The Department of Fish and Game is mailing more than 5,200 questionnaires to anglers in its survey to estimate the 1982 steelhead harvest in Idaho.

Holders of steelhead permits are asked to report how many days they fished in any of the river systems where the fish run—the Clearwater, Salmon and Snake—and how many fish were caught.

The form also has a space for anglers to indicate how many steelhead they caught and released. Printed regulations include a request that wild steelhead be returned to the water as a means of protecting a resource that has been on the decline.

"Future management of steelhead in Idaho depends on complete and accurate information. Please take a few minutes to answer the questions and return the questionnaire in the enclosed postage-paid envelope," the department requests.
