Prevent hillside erosion by filling wire cages (gabions) made from reinforced galvanized mesh wire fencing with rocks, says Sunset Magazine. For stability, set each cage back into the slope above the one below. Water flows through the rocks, preventing pressure buildup.

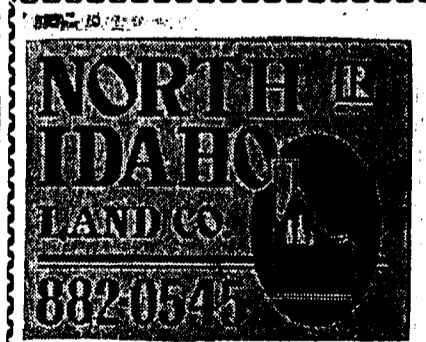

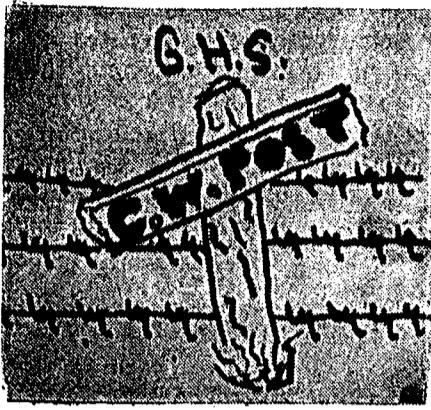

The purpose of the organization was to care for the widows and orphans of our servicemen and to see to the education of America's youth. They helped organize the National Education Association. The group works for veterans benefits and to instill patriotism and pride of country in the citizens of our country. Commander Stewart stated that there are between 20 and 25 million wartime and peacetime veterans living today and that the 64-year-old organization works for service to youth sponsoring the Girls

and Boys State programs, rehabilitation, etc.
 The Commander presented awards to the Legion Post and commended Doug Bennett, Post Membership chairman for a job well done. The Post has 60 members, or 100 percent. Anderson accepted the award for Commander Stout, and Rod Turner accepted for Adjutant John Whiteraft.

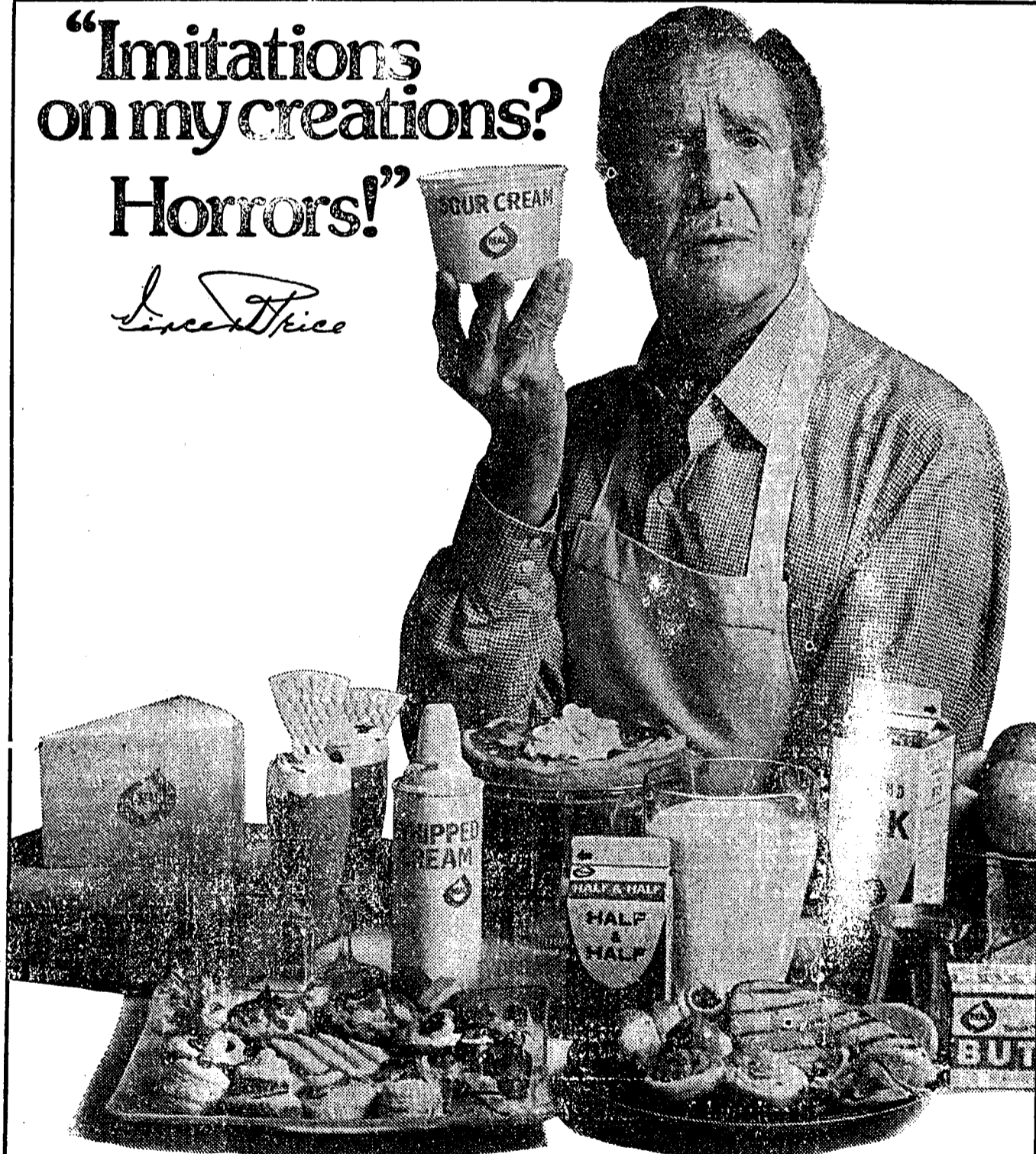

We stood as the music sang the living truth.

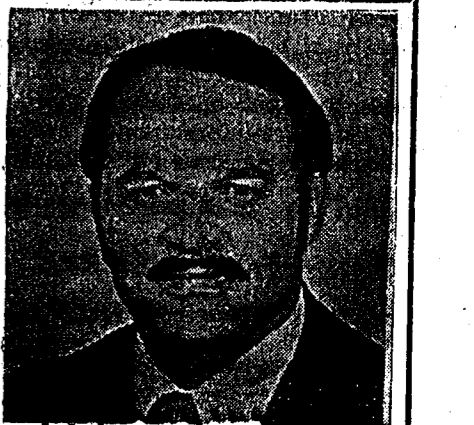

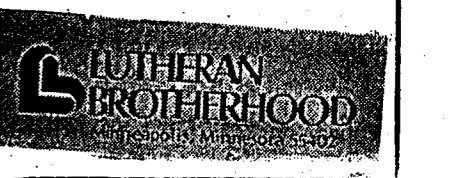
