The surplus food distribution will begin on Saturday, April 16 at noon according to Mary Hunter. The reason for the early starting time said Hunter, is that participants will receive fish this time also. The fish will come to Hunter frozen and the only way to keep it frozen and of good quality is to have participants pick it up immediately. There will be no cheese for April said Hunter. There is a hold up on the federal level and it has not been delivered to Lewiston. Although there will be cheese next month, the fish is expected to be given out only once. Hunter said it will not be long before the government releases new commodities.

Eligible persons who pick up their butter on Friday are assured of getting the fish also.

Those who wait until Saturday or Sunday to pick up their butter will not be guaranteed fish, as freezer space is a problem.

Hunter will be contacting all the merchants and churches in the Juliaetta and Kendrick area soon, asking them to contribute money towards the purchase of a small chest freezer.
