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Child Care Centers Stress Quality

Does cooperation pay off? You bet it does—At least in the eyes of 6 local child care providers who were recently awarded a \$29,900 grant from the Northwest Area Foundation.

As the need for quality child care facilities rises, so does the need for professional training in the area of child care. The Northwest Area Foundation has demonstrated interest in the development and education of very young children and their care by funding a local child care consortium. The Consortium for Excellence in Child Care members include U/I Campus Child Care, Lewis-Clark School and Care, WSU Child Care Center, Moscow Day School, Kids' Room Child Care Center-Genesee, and the Little People Child Care

Center-Troy. CECC's main objective is to better equip staff of child care facilities to meet the cognitive, language, affective, and psychomotor needs of children in the preschool and kindergarten years.

The Foundations grant will be used to provide innovation staff development activities for all centers including peer consultation, training from local and regional consultants, and modeling and support from the consortium's trainer and key center staff. Part of the first year effort will include the development of a set of training materials to be used to both guide paraprofessionals and professionals and train them thru practical experience. The goals of the consortium include (1) developing a permanent cooperative relationship for staff training, (2) developing a curriculum and materials for training, and (3) developing a peer advising and program review cooperative.

The Consortium for Excellence in Child Care invites all interested people to join. Information sharing, curriculum development in early childhood education, and staff training will be developed thru workshops and center visitations. 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Exhibits Set at McConnell Mansion

John Cook of Elk River, has an exhibit at the McConnell Mansion a variety of hand-woven baskets. John Cook is 91 years old and is a former logger and magician. He learned the trade of basket weaving while growing up in Austria. Born in Austria in 1892, John came to the United States in 1915 and moved to Elk River in 1930.

The baskets he weaves are crafted from local willows of differing natural colors: green, red, or brown. Some baskets have stripes or patterns woven into them. Examples of the types of baskets he has woven are bread baskets, baby bassinets, fishing creels, fruit baskets, waste-paper baskets, clothes baskets, and picnic baskets.

People may be familiar with his work as he has sold many baskets at annual Renaissance Fairs in Moscow. The exhibit will be up through April 30, 1983. The McConnell Mansion is open to the public Wednesdays through Saturdays from 1:00 to 4:00 in the afternoons. It is free. 110 South Adams, Moscow.

Lind Retires From U. of I. After 32 Years

Moscow—After nearly 32 years and a variety of assignments at the University of Idaho, Leon Lind has retired. During his career he has held jobs as diverse as radio announcer and director of Audio Visual Services, his most recent position.

Lind began work at UI when its only broadcast program was the Radio Center under the Physics Department. He served as announcer and helped cut transcription disks which were mailed out to stations around the state. "There was no broadcast program from campus until KUID-FM went on the air in January of 1963." KUID-TV followed in 1965 as an outgrowth of campus closed-circuit TV.

In addition to his work as announcer, he developed and taught a course in radio recording and remote techniques which is still being taught.

There was no undergraduate major program in broadcasting, Lind said, until the Department of Communications was created in September 1958. "The old Speech Department, which included journalism and the new broadcast program were all moved to the new department then."

Lind was made director of Audio Visual Services when the Division of Instructional Services was created in 1970 with Dr. Waterten Owens as its dean.

Owens said Lind's "30 some years of devoted service to the university represents a significant contribution. He made significant contributions under typically difficult, underfunded situations as director of Audio Visual Services."

Lind was born in Kendrick and obtained a bachelor's degree in psychology from UI in 1951 and a master's degree in education in 1956.

He has been active in professional organizations and maintains an interest in steam power as a hobby.

He has lived in the Palouse area all of his life, except for 1942-45, when he served as psychiatric social worker with the U. S. Army in England.

He plans to continue living on an acreage near Viola.

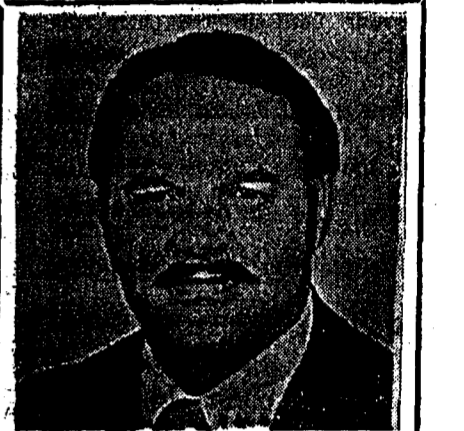

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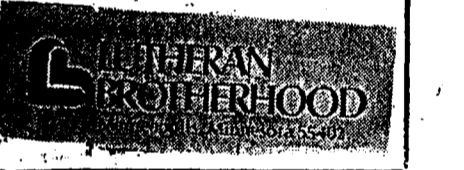
