## Spring Turkey Season Tests Hunting Skills

The hunter who is looking for a first-rate challenge will find it waiting when Idaho's spring turkey season opens April 23.

"Some advance scouting, skill with a turkey call, patience—and luck, improve changes for a successful hunt," said state game bird manager, Dick Norell, Department of Fish and Game.

Experienced hunters also wear camouflaged clothes and carry hunting gear that doesn't show up too easy, he added.

The nine game management units that are open April 23 through May 1 will be 11, 13, 14, 18, 19A, 22, 23, 32A and 39. Regulations set a bag and season limit of one wild, bearded turkey and legal hunting arms are a shotgun using BB-size shot or smaller, or bow and arrow.

A valid turkey license and a turkey tag are required.

Norell advised hunters to look for sign near tall trees, usually ponderosa pines where the birds roost at night, and tracks, feathers and scratchings. Seeds, nuts, grass and berries are favorite foods.

With very few exceptions, only those birds in established flocks of Merriams turkeys will be available for hunting. A few of the new birds that have been relocated are in hunting areas, but they will be elusive targets, Norell said.

It will be at least another 2 years before the season will be open for flocks that were introduced in 1982 and at least three years for birds that were brought in this past winter, he added.

## Construction Causes Traffic Delays on Bear Ridge Grade

Traffic will be delayed on State Highway 3 between Kendrick and Deary beginning Monday, April 11, 1983. The delays will be necessary as work by Murphy Brothers, Inc., contractor for the Idaho Transportation Department, begins excavation on 1.79 miles of reconstruction at the top of Bear Ridge Grade.

The contractor will post signs to inform travelers of the closed and open periods, which are:

Travelers may wish to use State Highway 99, Kendrick to Troy, and State Highway 8, Troy to Deary, if they do not expect to arrive at the construction site during the open periods.

The delays can be expected for the next three months while work is in progress regarding this narrow, steep section of highway. The public's patience and cooperation with the contractor and state during the construction of this needed improvement is appreciated.

**Economy Shows Improvement, says Bank News Letter**

Definite signs of improvement in Idaho's economy during the first quarter of 1983, according to James Hoogland, Jr. and Roselle Robinson managers, quoting the First Security Newsletter. The quarterly report, which will be published this week is edited by Dr. Kelly K. Matthews, vice president and economist for First Security Corporation, financial services company.

The significant increase in housing starts nationwide was good news for the state's construction and lumber industries. The outlook for Idaho's economy for the second and third quarters is for continued moderate recovery—heavily influenced by the national economic developments.

The unemployment rate in Idaho declined sharply in the first quarter, dropping to 7.6 percent in March. Much of this improvement reflects a reduced labor force, but since the end of the year the actual number of unemployed was down 3,000 and total employment on a seasonally adjusted basis has risen by 4,700 jobs.

Employment increases in key industries were as follows: Lumber industry plus 1,100 jobs; contract construction plus 800 jobs; food processing plus 400 jobs; electronic equipment manufacturing plus 300 jobs.

The residential construction industry improved sharply in the first quarter and additional growth is expected in the months ahead. During the first three months of 1983, 718 residential building permits were issued in Idaho, a gain of 88.9 percent over last year.

Conventional mortgage rates near 12-3/4 percent are helping to facilitate this sharp improvement in residential construction. Total construction value for the first three months was \$80.5 million, an increase of 5 percent.

Lumber production in Idaho improved steadily in the first quarter and is now only 10-15 percent below normal compared with the nearly 30 percent below normal which prevailed throughout most of 1982. Lumber prices varying near \$180 per thousand board feet, are 35 percent above prices prevailing a year ago.

Consumer borrowing improved noticeably in March. Retail sales tax collections for the first 9 months of fiscal year 1983 were up 2.6 percent but most of the gain occurred in the January-March period. Automobile sales in the first two months of 1983 averaged 2,906 vehicles compared with a monthly average of 2,571 in the second half of 1982.

The federal government's "Payment-in-Kind" program designed to reduce agricultural commodity surpluses was widely accepted by Idaho producers. A total of 741,380 wheat-producing acres in Idaho have been set aside for conservation use, equivalent to 41.4 percent of the total wheat acreage base. Because of the large number of acres nationwide included in the PEK program, some significant reduction should occur in commodity surpluses.

Wheat prices firmed in March in Idaho, averaging \$3.95 per bu., a gain of 38c above last year. Potato prices has increased significantly during the past six weeks and are currently priced in the \$4.00-\$4.50 per cwt. range—up from \$2.70 in February.

The United States economy has recorded three months of economic recovery but the growth was spread unevenly across various industrial sectors.
