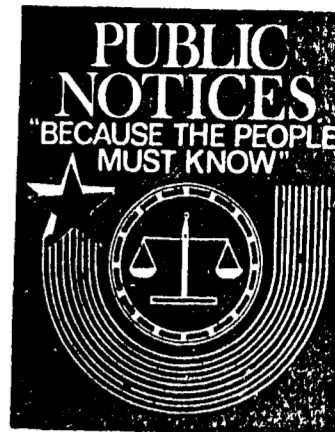

Special events are planned in Senior Citizens Centers and at Senior meal sites throughout the state to celebrate Older Americans Month during May.

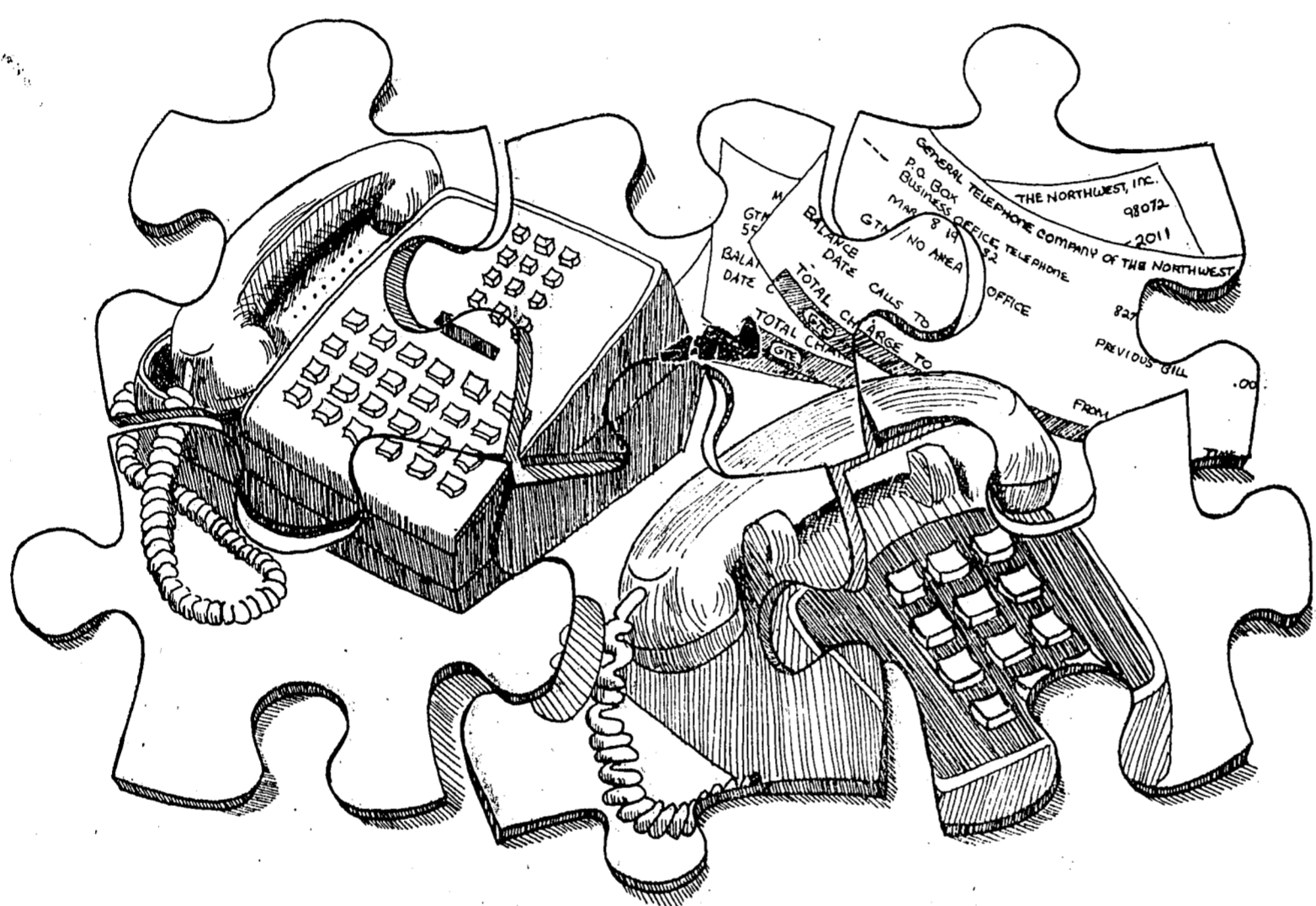

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Pleading Fifth Amendment Won't Work in Tax Matters

The Supreme Court ruled last week on a 8-to-1 vote that citizens cannot claim the Fifth Amendment protection against self-incrimination to withhold information from the Internal Revenue Service.
 IRS had argued a lower court ruling in the case of California Richard Rylander, Sr., of Sacramento, would have crippled its ability to deal with tax invaders.
 In reversing that ruling, Justice William Rehnquist indicated that a taxpayer still has the burden of showing why he cannot produce tax information sought by the IRS and cannot avoid the demand by remaining silent.
 "While the assertion of a Fifth Amendment privilege against compulsory self-incrimination may be valid ground upon which a witness such as Rylander declines to answer questions," Rehnquist wrote, "it has never been thought to be in itself a substitute for evidence that would assist in meeting a burden of proof."

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Avoid Dealers in Disappointment Local Postmasters Advise

Most mail-order businesses are honest, but Postmasters Don Chrystal of Kendrick, Leslie Wilson of Genesee, and Floyd Helmgartner of Juliaetta offer you this advice on how to avoid swindlers who take your money and give you a disappointment in return:
 • Be wary of what seems to be an exaggerated claim or a price that seems unusually low.
 • Don't be rushed. Avoid offers that claim to be the last chance to get a bargain, "one day only" or for "cash only."
 • Keep a copy of the advertisement from which you are ordering. If you have doubts, check with the Postal Inspection Service, the Better Business Bureau or some other local or state consumer agency.
 • Never send cash. Use a check, money order or credit card because, if necessary, these can be traced through some banking system.
 • Keep a record of the date of your order and the number of the check, if you pay by check. Retain the cancelled check when it is returned to you.
 • The bottom line is "if it seems too good to be true . . . it probably is!"

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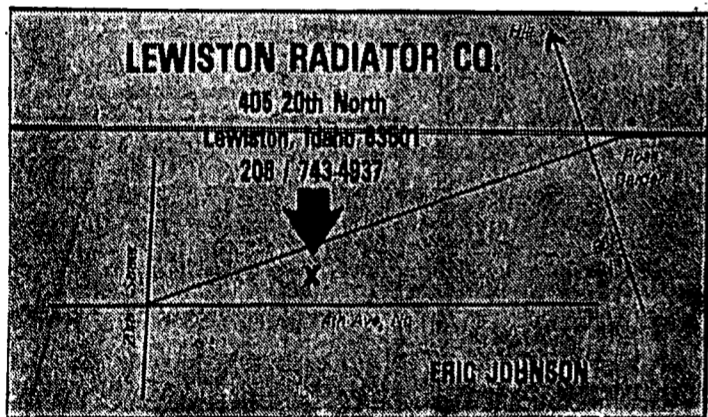
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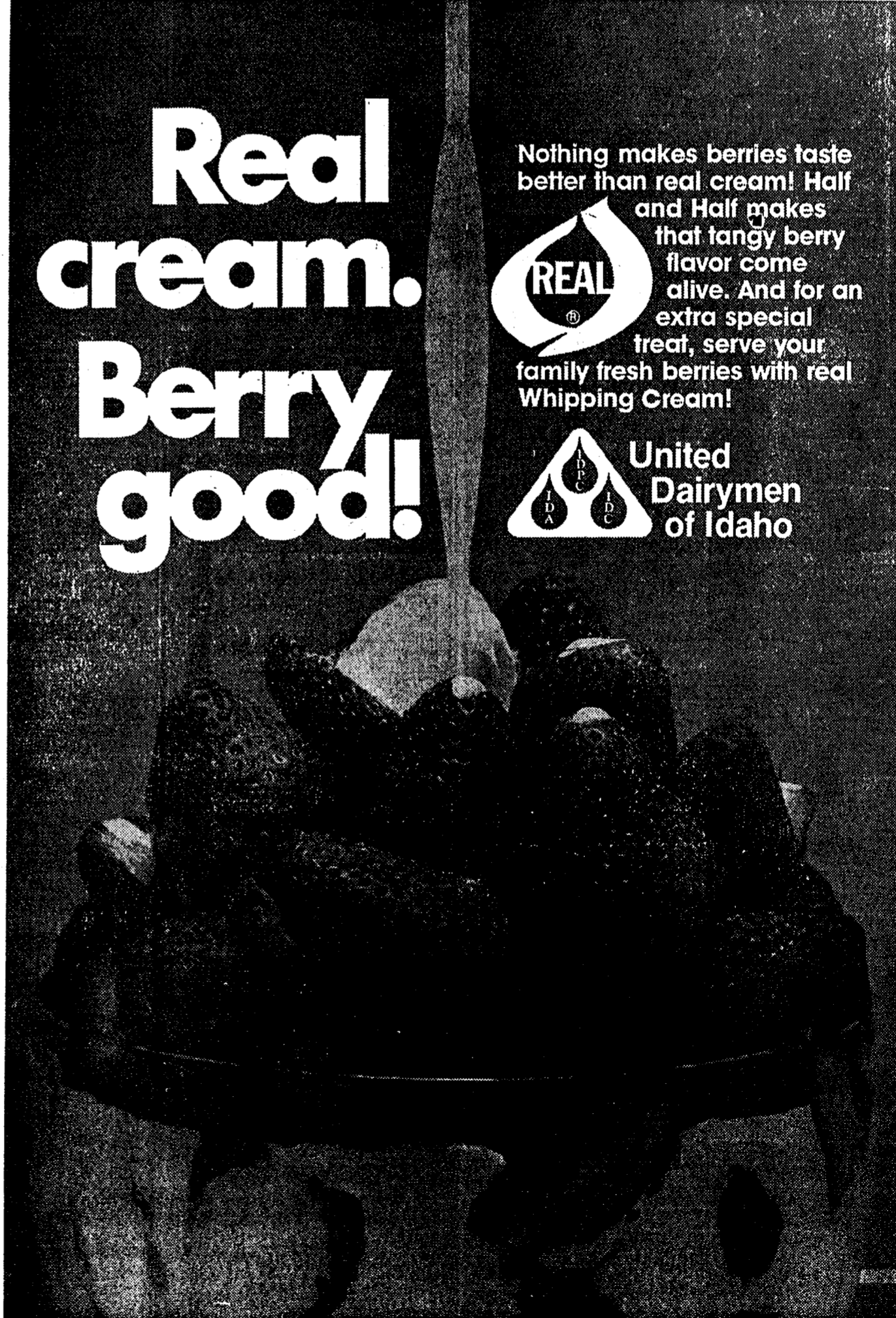
