





#### **Greyhound Bus Fares** Education Heads List | To Increase in Idaho

The Idaho Public Utilities Commission has approved a 20 percent increase in fares for all Greyhound bus routes within Idaho.

The Commission in late March had tentatively approved the fare boost, but said it first would wait to hear from anyone wishing to obiect to the increase. After public announcements, no protests were received.

Greyhound originally sought a 40 percent boost in its intrastate fares, saying the company as a whole lost money during the first 11 months of 1982. It also complained that fares for routes within the state were nearly 75 percent lower than interstate fares for comparable dis-

The IPUC said the company did not adequately defend its reasons for the 40 percent fare increase re-

The Commission said that a 40% ncrease would be too high and could result in less business and lower overall revenues for the bus company in Idaho. The Commission also noted that fuel prices have dropped significantly over the past year.


